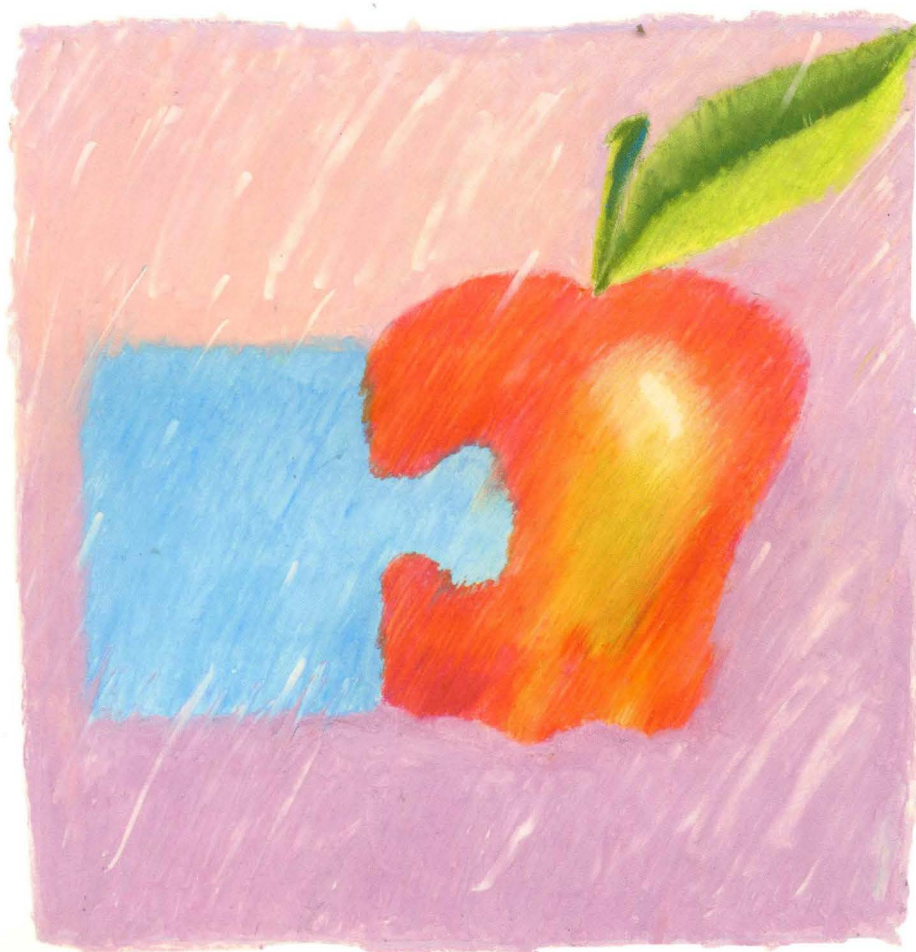

This book also describes how to install MacMainFrame Coax Workstation as both a **CUT** (Control Unit Terminal) terminal and **DFT** (Distributed Function Terminal) terminal.

## Audience

This book is for people who set up MacMainFrame Workstation machines and who administer MacMainFrame networks.

## How To Use This Book

If you've never used MacMainFrame Workstation before, follow the chapters in order.

If you have used MacMainFrame Workstation before, turn to the section you need and follow the instructions there.

# Chapter 1

## What You Need First

### Experience

To install MacMainFrame Coax Workstation, you should be familiar with basic Macintosh operations — pull-down menus, dialog boxes, using the mouse, and so on.

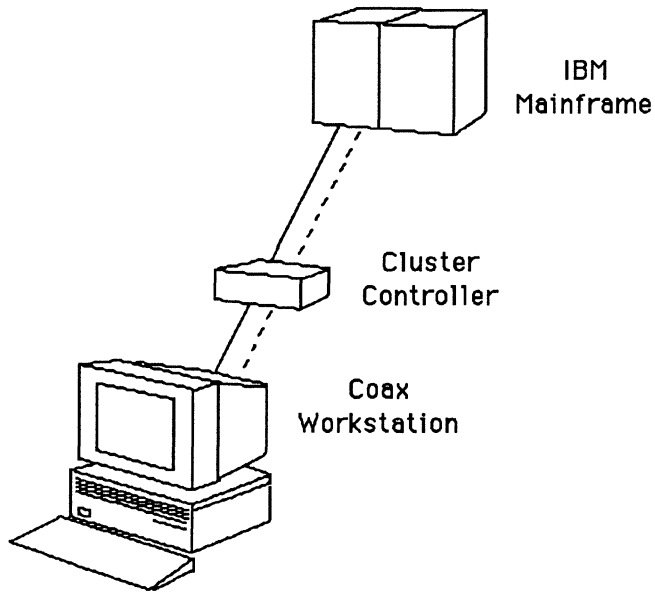
A working knowledge of the IBM operating environments with which you will be connecting is also helpful.

**Terminology:** For convenience, we'll refer to any MacMainFrame Series Workstation as a MMF Workstation hereafter.

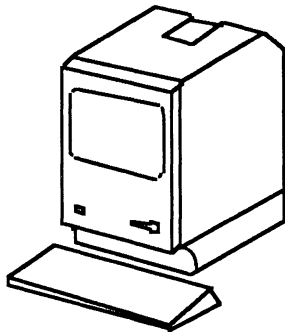
The diagram below shows a typical MMF Coax Workstation setup:



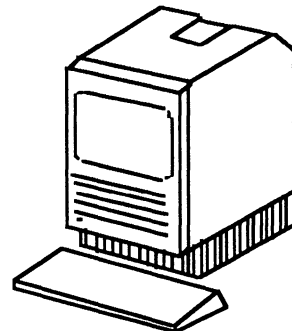
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## Hardware

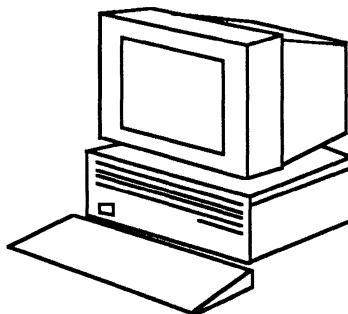
Your Macintosh must be one of the following to operate as a MMF Coax Workstation:



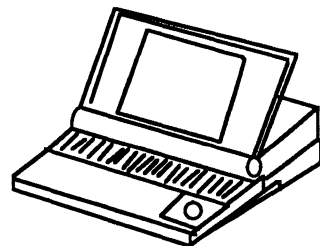
Macintosh Plus



Macintosh SE,  
Macintosh SE/30



Macintosh II Family



Macintosh Portable

**NOTE:** To use MMF Coax Workstation as a DFT (a multisession terminal), your Macintosh must be either an SE, an SE/30, or a Macintosh II.

## For Multisession Terminals

If you're running MMF **DFT** (multisession) Coax workstation, your Macintosh must have a free expansion slot in its chassis in order to install the MMF Workstation hardware.

- 
- The single slot on the SE or SE/30 must be free.
  - One of the slots on the Macintosh II must be free.

NOTE: For more information on the differences between CUT (single-session) and DFT (multisession) terminals, see the MacMainFrame Series *Coax/SDLC/Token-Ring Workstation User Guide*.

## For Single-Session Terminals

- ✓ CUT You can also run your MMF Coax Workstation as a MMF CUT (single-session) Coax Workstation. If your Macintosh does not have an additional expansion slot, you can still run MMF CUT Coax Workstation by using the Avatar DX Unit.

REMEMBER: We use these two markers throughout the text of this manual to indicate features related to MMF CUT Coax Workstations:

CUT terminals only:            ✓ CUT

Not for CUT terminals:        ✗ CUT

If you see a marker, follow the marker. If you don't see a marker, you can assume the text applies to your MMF Workstation no matter what kind of a Workstation it is.

## The DX Unit

- ✓ CUT The DX Unit offers several additional connectivity features:
  - Dial-up capability over asynchronous data communications lines,
  - MMF connectivity for Macintoshes without additional expansion slots — including the Macintosh Portable, and
  - External hardware alternative for MMF CUT Coax Workstations.

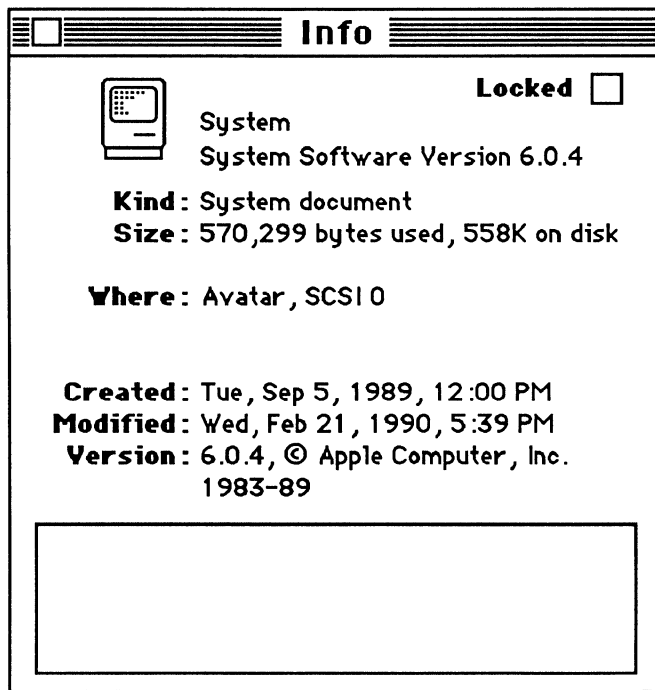

# Software

## Basic Requirements

To run the MMF Workstation software, your Macintosh must be equipped with System version at least 6.0.3.



To find out the version of your System, go to the Finder, select the System's icon, then pull down the File menu and select **Get Info**; the Finder will display a window like the one above.

---

# Network Requirements

## Connectivity to the IBM Host

Your Workstation Macintosh must have access the IBM host — or to a cluster controller that is connected to the IBM host — with which you want to communicate.

Once the MMF Workstation software is running, it automatically makes contact with the IBM host and automatically obtains **logical unit (LU) sessions** from the host.

## External Cables

For all configurations of the MMF Coax Workstation, you must provide an external coax cable to connect the Workstation to the cluster controller.

# Chapter 2

## Installing the Hardware

### Introduction

To install the MMF Coax Workstation, you install both hardware and software into your Macintosh computer, and you connect the Macintosh to the IBM host.

The basic hardware installation steps are:

1. Install the Avatar Coax board into an expansion slot in your Macintosh.
2. Connect your board-equipped Macintosh to the IBM host machine.

This chapter explains how to perform these two tasks.

Appendix C explains how to install a **DX unit**, an external hardware unit that provides several other Coax connectivity features.

---

## How To Use This Chapter

Since the MMF Coax Workstation hardware can run on several different Macintosh hardware platforms, this chapter is divided into several subsections.

- In the first half of the chapter, turn to the subsection that applies to your Macintosh and follow the directions there.
- In the second half of the chapter, follow the single set of instructions for connecting your Macintosh to the IBM host, since they apply to all Macintoshes.

**NOTE:** For complete information about your Macintosh hardware, please see your original Macintosh documentation.

✓ **CUT** If you're using a **DX Unit**, *skip this chapter and go directly to Appendix C, "The DX Unit."*

## Hardware Installation — Macintosh SE Machines

**WARNING:** The hardware for the SE version of the MMF Workstation is not user installable.

Please have an authorized Apple dealer install the MMF Workstation hardware on your Macintosh SE.

These instructions are provided for the authorized Apple dealer.



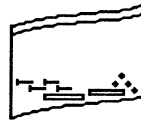

---

## Installing Hardware Into Macintosh SE

Follow these steps to install the MMF Workstation hardware into a Macintosh SE machine:

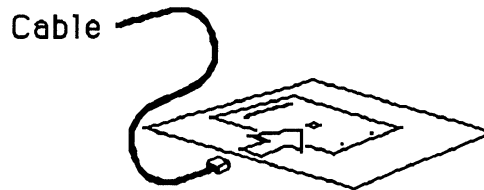
1. Power down the SE.
2. Open the SE's case.
3. Disconnect the cables to the SE motherboard.
4. Remove the motherboard from the chassis.
5. Take the Workstation board out of its anti-static bag.
6. Connect the Workstation board to the motherboard:
  - Press the two standoffs onto the motherboard until you hear them snap into place.
  - Line up the connector on the Workstation board with the expansion connector on the SE motherboard.
  - Gently but firmly press the Workstation board into place on the motherboard.



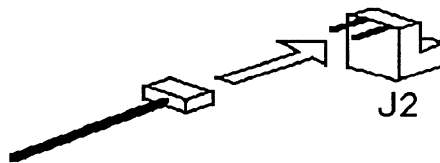
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7. Install the internal cable:

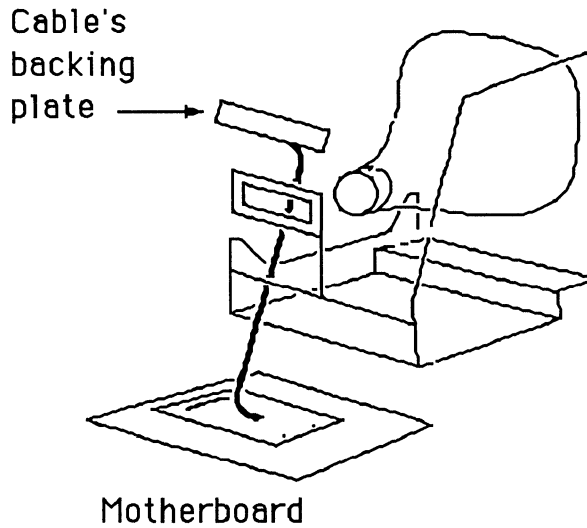
- On the Workstation board, find the J2 connector; it is a white plug near the center of the board:
- Plug the cable into this connector so that the green wire is towards C12.



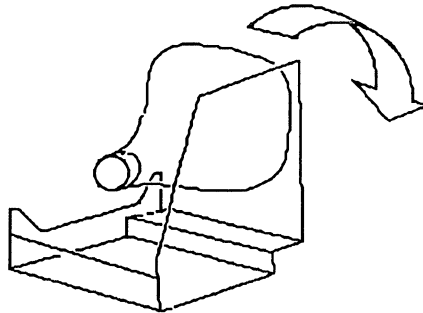

8. Thread the cable into position in the SE's chassis:

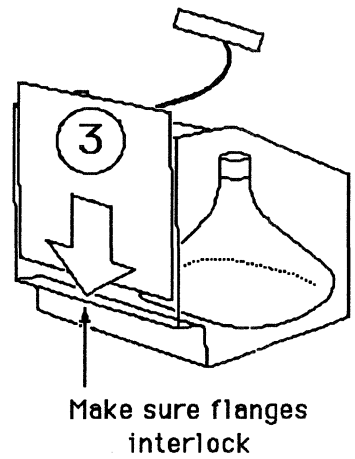
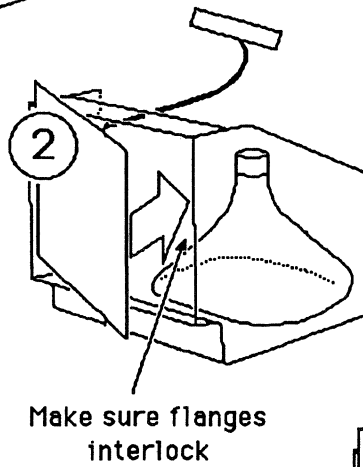
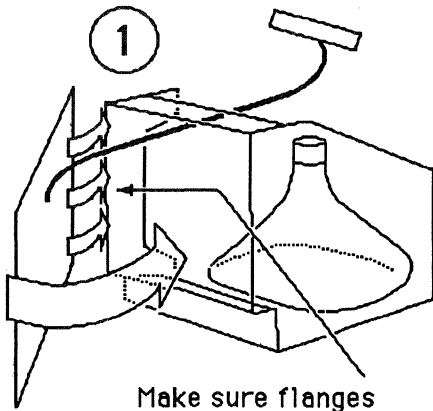


9. Slide the motherboard/Workstation board back into the SE chassis.  
First, rotate the Macintosh onto its face:

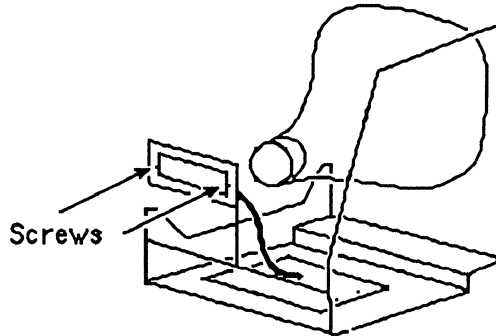


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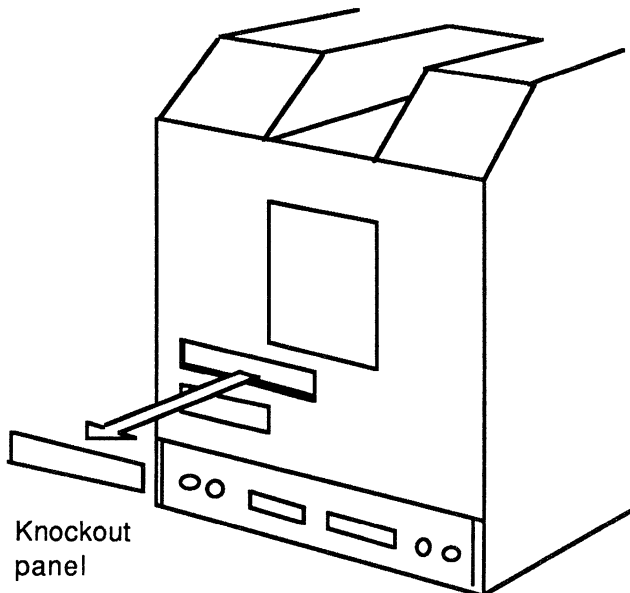
Then insert the motherboard:



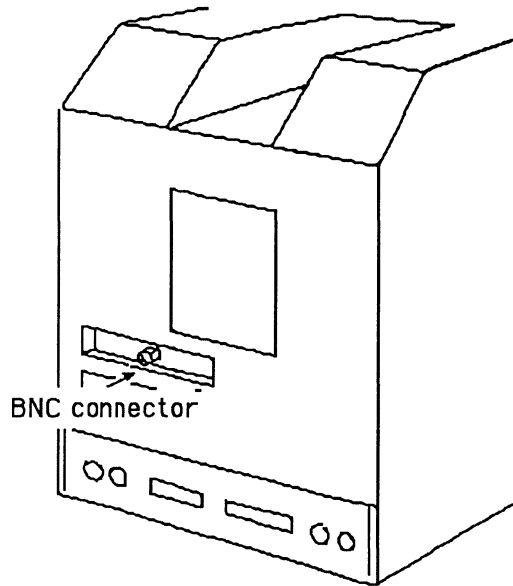
- 
10. Position the internal cable's backing plate in the backing plate mounting. Make sure the BNC connector faces outward:  
Screw the plate into the Macintosh chassis.



11. On the outside of the case in back, remove the knockout panel that covers the accessory port.



- 
12. Reassemble your SE, positioning the accessory port on the case over the mounted end of the cable that now projects out the back of the chassis.



Physically, your internal hardware installation is complete.

Before you can use your MMF Coax Workstation, you must also install the external coax cable. See the second half of this chapter for complete instructions.

**REMEMBER:** Test your MMF hardware. To do this, you use the MMF Checker program, which comes with your MMF software. Software installation is described in Chapter 3. The Checker program is also described in Chapter 3.

Please have an authorized Apple dealer install the MMF Workstation hardware on your Macintosh SE/30.

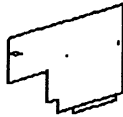

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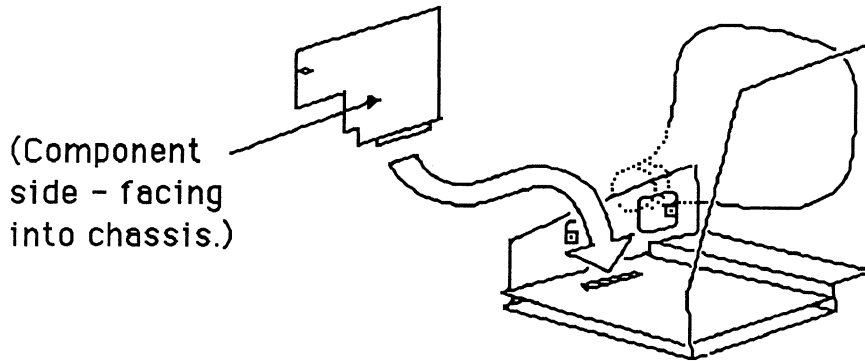
## Installing Hardware Into Macintosh SE/30

Follow these steps to install the MMF Workstation hardware into a Macintosh SE/30 machine:

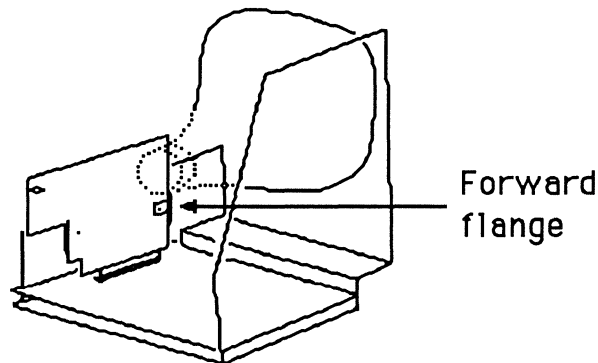
1. Power down the SE/30.
2. Open the SE/30's case. (The diagram below shows only the main features of the SE/30's internal hardware.)



- 
3. Take the Workstation board out of its anti-static bag.
  4. Position the Workstation board inside the SE/30's chassis.

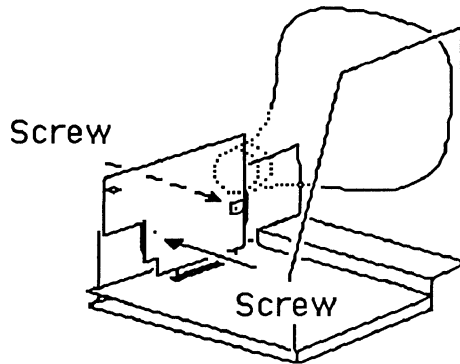


Make sure the Workstation board tucks under the forward flange on the side mounting plate.



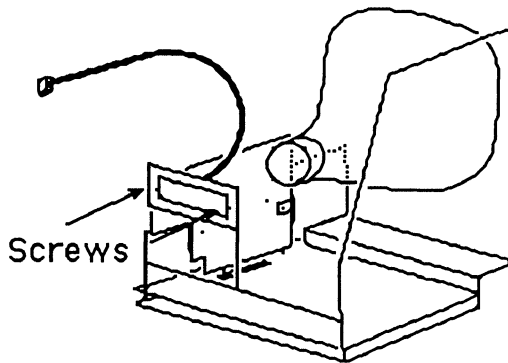
Press the Workstation board down on the expansion connector on the SE/30's motherboard.

- 
5. Screw the Workstation board to the side mounting plate.



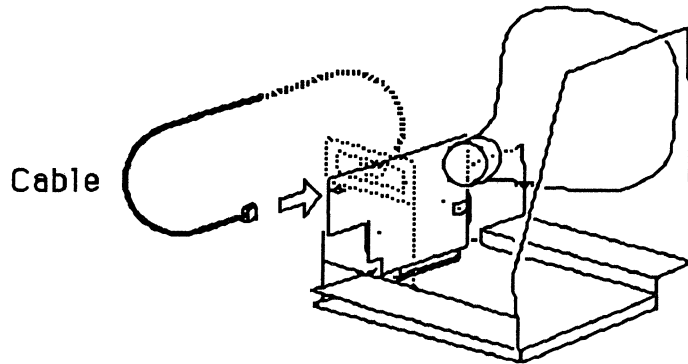
6. Install the internal cable.

Position the backing plate of the internal cable on the inside of the SE/30's chassis so that the BNC connector faces outward:

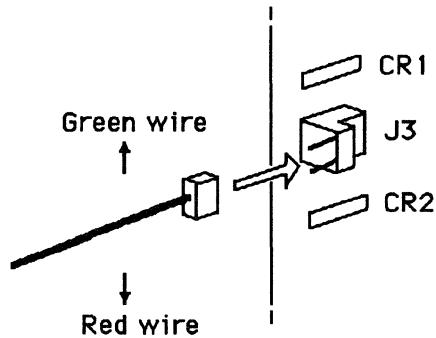


Screw the plate into the Macintosh chassis.

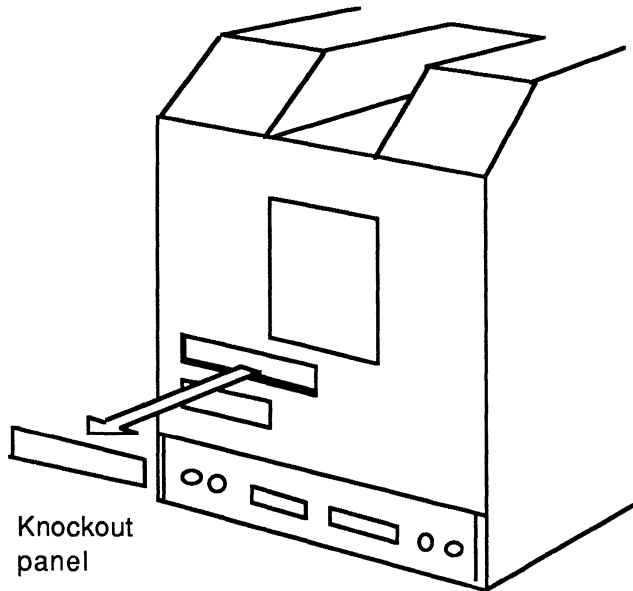
- 
7. Connect the other end of the internal cable to the Workstation board.
- On the Workstation board, find the J3 connector; it is a white plug near the edge of the board:
  - Plug the internal cable into this connector so that the green wire is towards CR1.



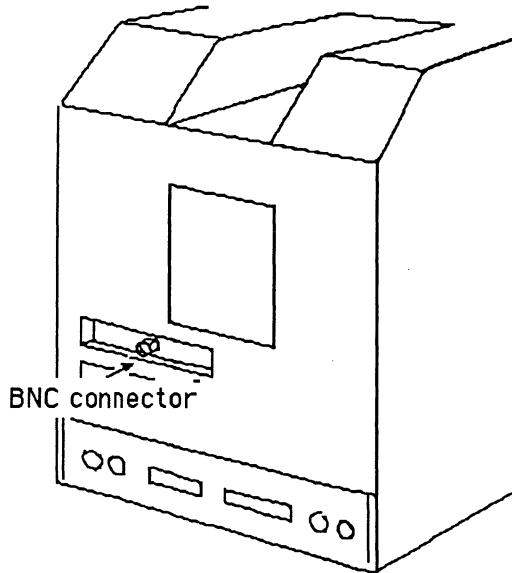
Close-up:

8. On the outside of the case in back, remove the knockout panel that covers the accessory port.



- 
9. Reassemble your SE/30, positioning the accessory port on the case over the mounted end of the cable that now projects out the back of the chassis.



Physically, your hardware installation is complete.

Before you can use your MMF Coax Workstation, you must also install the external coax cable. See the second half of this chapter for complete instructions.

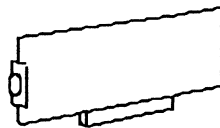

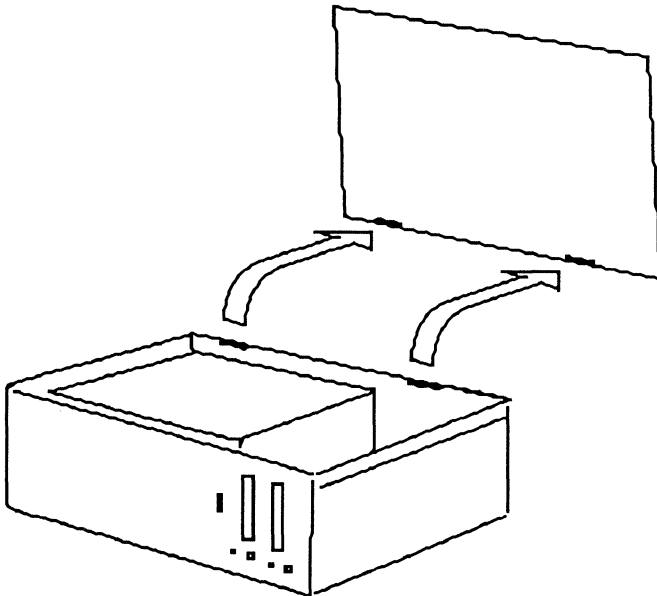


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## Installing Hardware Into Macintosh II Family

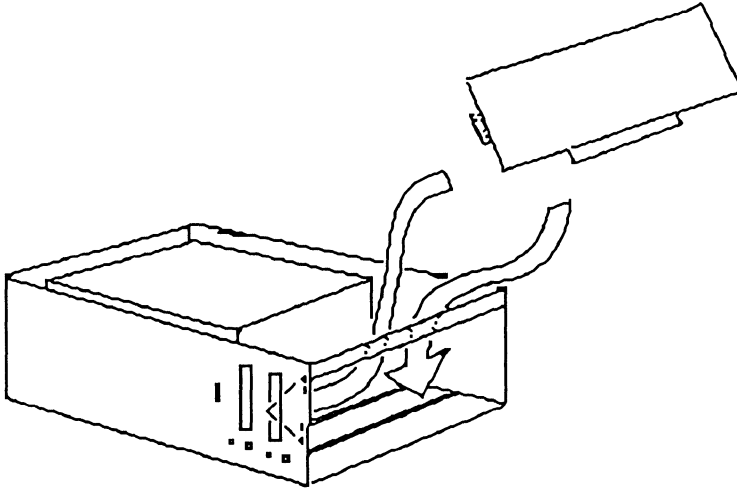
Follow these steps to install the MMF Workstation hardware into a Macintosh II machine:

1. Power down the Macintosh II.
2. Open the Macintosh II's case.

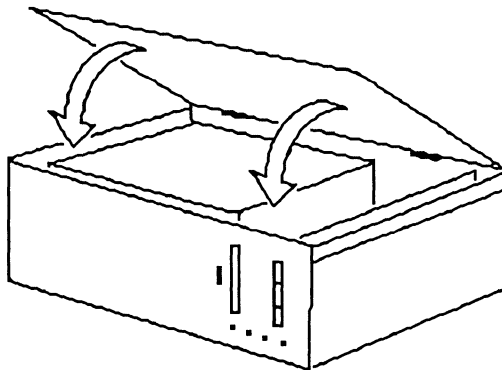


3. Select a slot for the Workstation board. Remove the knockout panel from that slot.
4. Take the Workstation board out of its anti-static bag.

- 
5. Slide the Workstation board into the slot in the Macintosh II's chassis:
- Make sure the BNC connector projects out through the rear panel.
  - Make sure the expansion connector on the Workstation board lines up with the expansion connector on the Macintosh II's motherboard; the motherboard is on the bottom of the chassis.
  - Gently but firmly press the Workstation board down into place.



6. Close the Macintosh II's case.



Physically, your internal hardware installation is complete.

---

Before you can use your MMF Coax Workstation, you must also install the external coax cable. See the second half of this chapter for complete instructions.

**REMEMBER:** Test your MMF hardware. To do this, you use the MMF Checker program, which comes with your MMF software. Software installation is described in Chapter 3. The Checker program is also described in Chapter 3.

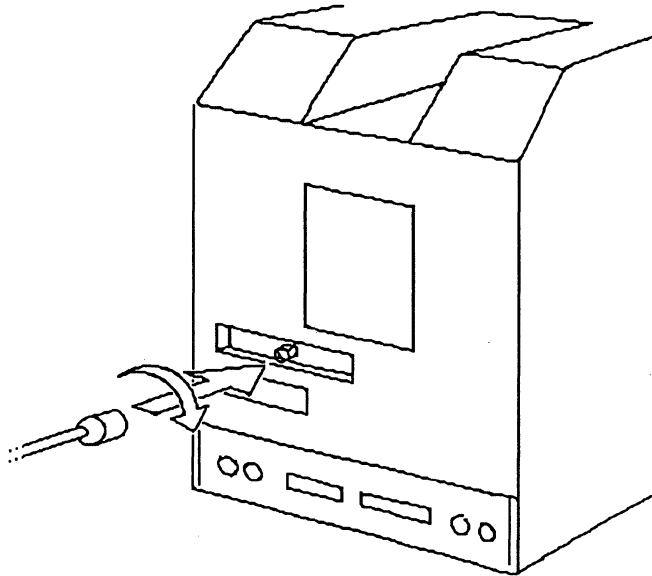
## Attaching the External Cable

After you have installed the Workstation board in your Macintosh and closed the case, install the external coax cable that connects the Macintosh to the IBM host.

The following sections show how to attach the external cable to Macintosh SE and SE/30 machines and to Macintosh II machines.

### Attaching External Cable to Macintosh SE and SE/30

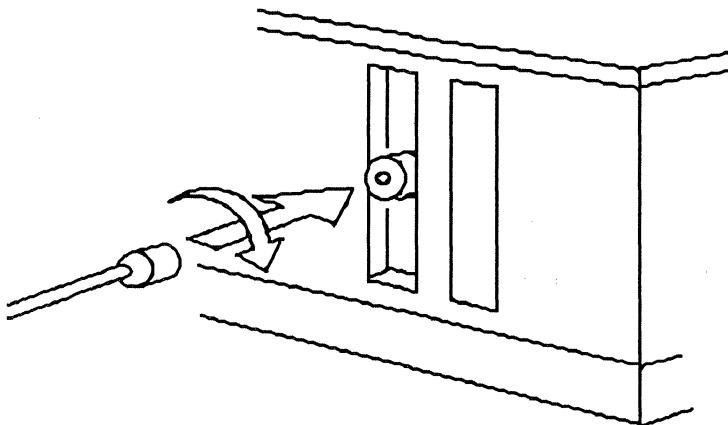
Plug the coax cable into the Workstation board's BNC connector, which extends out of the back of the Macintosh SE and SE/30, as shown here:

## Attaching External Cable to Macintosh II Family

Twist the coax cable onto the Workstation board's BNC connector, which extends out of the back of the Macintosh II, as shown here:



---

# Connecting the Workstation to the IBM Host

To connect the MMF Coax Workstation to the IBM host, you connect the coax cable from the Workstation machine to the IBM cluster controller.

## Ports on the Cluster Controller

The Workstation will connect to a port on the cluster controller.

- ✗ **CUT** If you're running MMF **DFT** (multi-session) Coax workstation, make sure the port is configured for:
  - A distributed function terminal (DFT).
  - Multiple LU sessions.
- ✓ **CUT** If you're running MMF **CUT** (single-session) Coax workstation, make sure the port is configured for a CUT terminal.



# Chapter 3

## Installing the Workstation Software

### Introduction

The steps to install the MMF Workstation software on your Coax Workstation are the same for all Macintosh hardware platforms:

1. Check your MMF Workstation components.
2. Open the Workstation diskettes.
3. Drag files to the System folder.
4. Install the Workstation application.
5. - 12. Go to the Control Panel and perform various set-up tasks.
13. Restart your Macintosh.
14. Run the MMF Checker application.

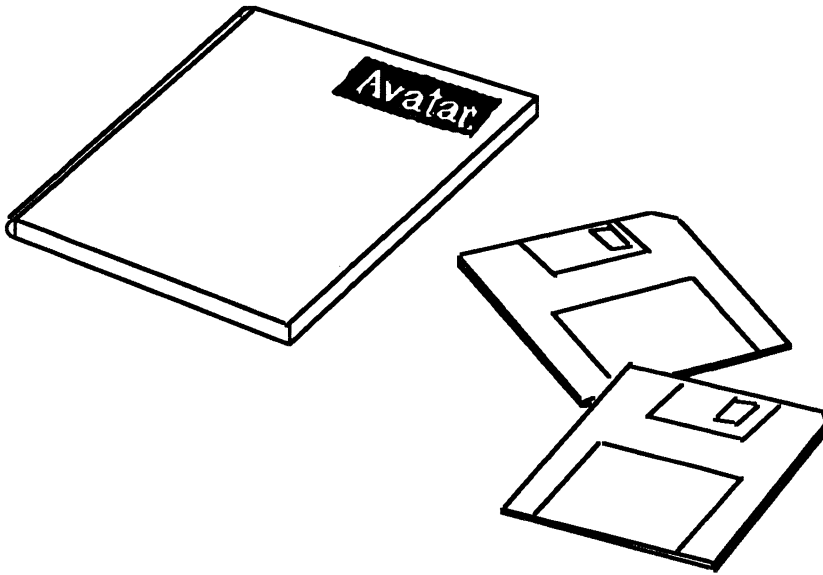
The following sections explain each step in detail.



---

# 1. Check Your MMF Workstation components.

To install the MMF Workstation software you need the software and the manual.



You're reading the manual now.

The software comes on two diskettes.

---

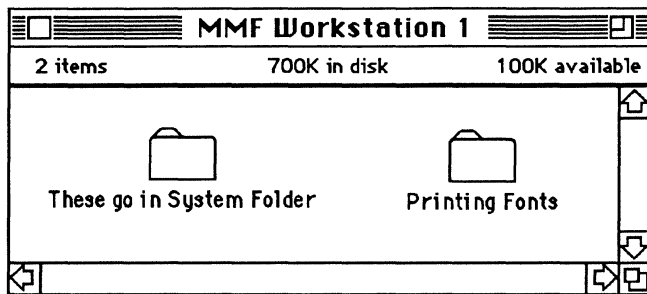
## 2. Open the Workstation diskettes.

Double-click the mouse on the diskette icon to open the diskettes.

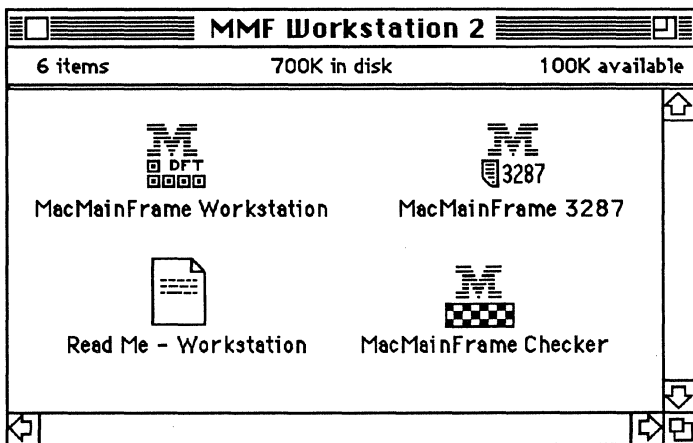
Make sure you have all the documents shown below. If anything is missing, Contact Avatar.

**x CUT** NOTE: MMF 3287 is not available on MMF CUT terminals.

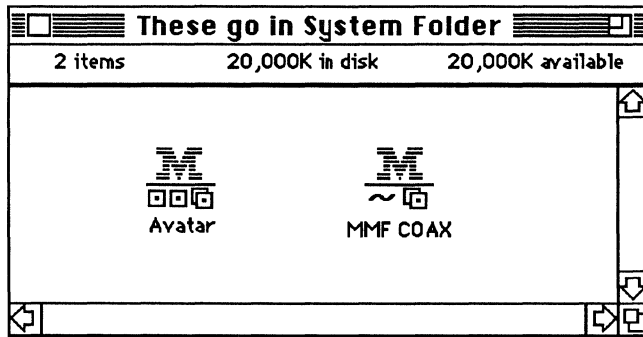
Make a backup copy of each diskette.

**Read the Read Me - Workstation document first.** It contains important information about the current release of the Workstation software. Read Me - Workstation is a Macintosh text document, which you can read with the TeachText application.

### 3. Drag files to the System folder.

Insert Diskette 1 and double-click on the folder entitled, "These go in System Folder."

Make sure the following documents are there: (If you're not sure which documents are which, Appendix A contains a key to the MMF Workstation icons.)



NOTE: We've used a stand-in icon — MMF COAX — in the above illustration to represent the seven possible Coax Workstation driver icons. The seven Coax drivers are:



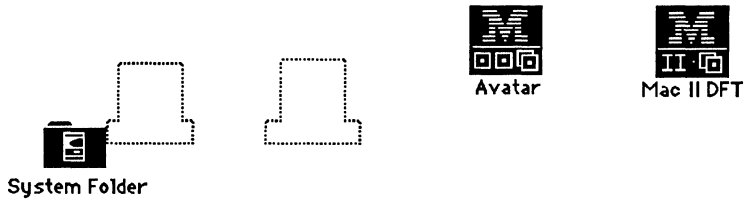

---

Drag the Avatar icon and the driver icon that's appropriate for your Macintosh to the System folder. Here, we're dragging Avatar icon plus the driver for a Mac II DFT Coax Workstation:

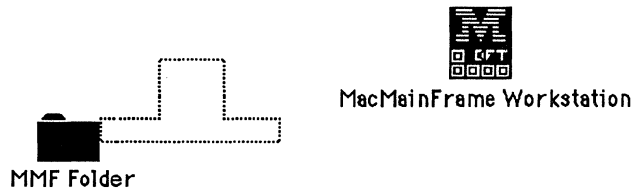


Close the System folder.

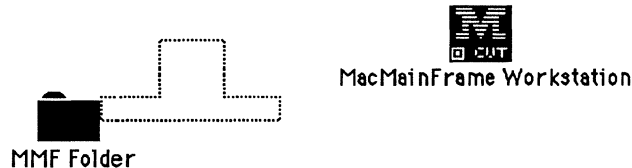

## 4. Install the Workstation application.

Insert Diskette 2 and drag the MMF Workstation application icon from the diskette to a convenient place on your Macintosh's start-up disk.



✓ CUT REMEMBER: If you're using MMF CUT Workstation, the application icon looks like this:



### MacMainFrame 3287, MacMainFrame Graphics

✗ CUT MMF 3287 and MMF Graphics are not available on MMF CUT terminals.

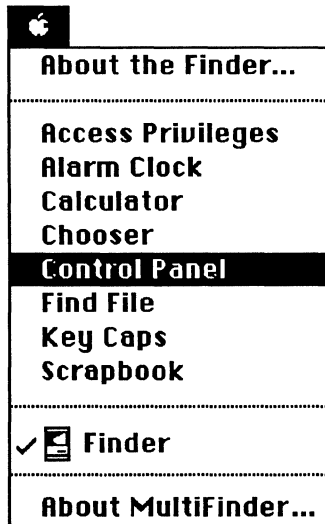
You may also install these other MacMainFrame products at this time:

- **MacMainFrame 3287**, Avatar's printer emulation software. For complete information on MMF 3287, see the MacMainFrame Series *Coax/SDLC/Token-Ring Workstation User Guide*.
- **MacMainFrame Graphics**, Avatar's IBM host graphics software, for use with MacMainFrame Series products. For complete information on MMF Graphics, see the MacMainFrame Series *Graphics Option User Guide*.

---

## 5. Go to the Control Panel.

Pull down the Apple menu and select the Control Panel.



In the Control Panel, you'll do the following:

- Go to the Avatar panel; select a driver for the Coax hardware.
- Select the language conventions for your workstation.
- Identify your LU session(s) as being for Terminal or Printer.
- Optionally lock all the Avatar panel settings.

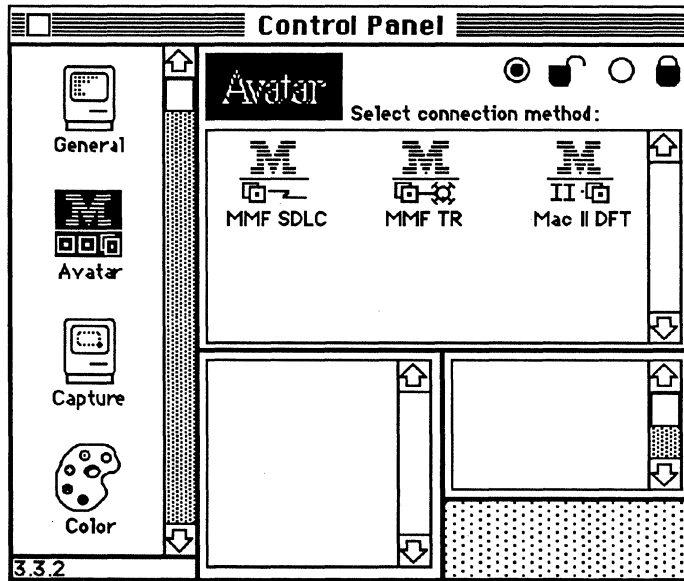
The following sections — steps 6 through 12 — show you how to do this.

---

## 6. Go to the Avatar Control Panel.

Click the Avatar icon.

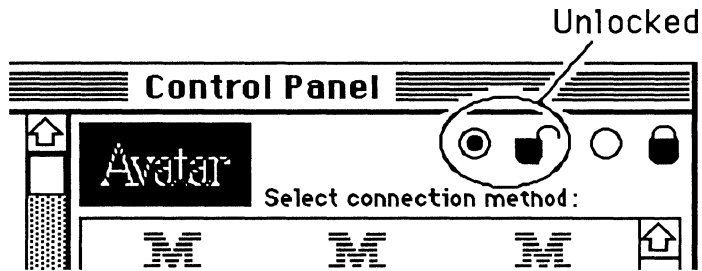
The Avatar panel will appear, displaying a list of MMF Drivers.

## 7. Check the lock panel.

Supply a password if necessary, and make sure the unlocked icon is selected:



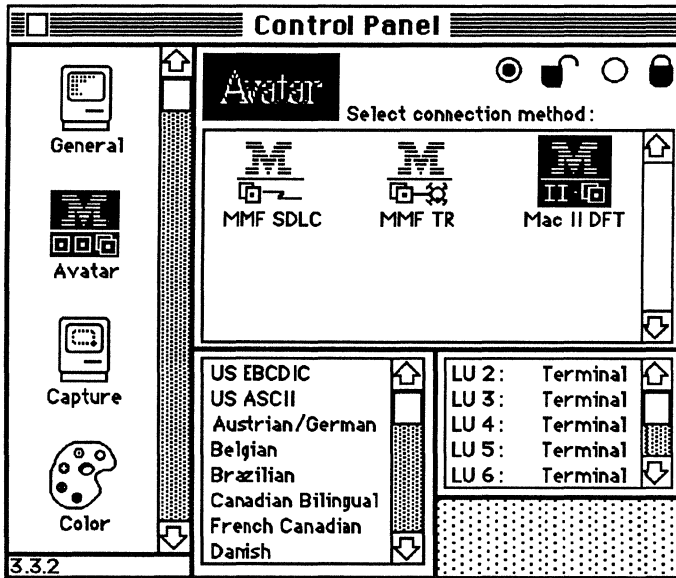

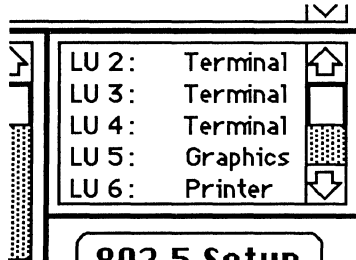
## 8. Select the Coax driver.

Click on the appropriate driver for your Macintosh hardware. Here we've clicked on the driver for a Mac II DFT Coax Workstation:



---

## 9. Go to the LU panel.



- x CUT** Make sure your LU sessions are set to the appropriate type, either Terminal or Printer. To do this, position the cursor over the desired LU and hold down the OPTION key. The cursor will change from a cross to a double-ended arrow:

|| LU 4: + Terminal [dotted pattern] ||

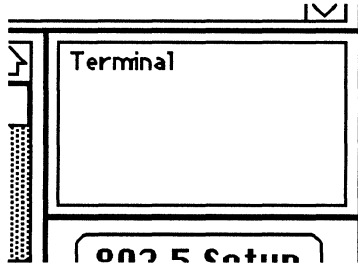
|| LU 4: ↔ Terminal [dotted pattern] ||

Click the cursor on the desired LU to have the LU's type change from Terminal to Printer to Graphics to Terminal, and so on.

- LU sessions of type **Printer** are for use by the **MMF 3287** printer emulation software. Only one LU session at a time can be a **Printer** session. For complete information on MMF 3287, see the *MacMainFrame Series Coax/SDLC/Token-Ring Workstation User Guide*.
- LU sessions of type **Graphics** are for use by the **MMF Graphics** software. For complete information on MMF Graphics, see the *MacMainFrame Series Graphics Option User Guide*.

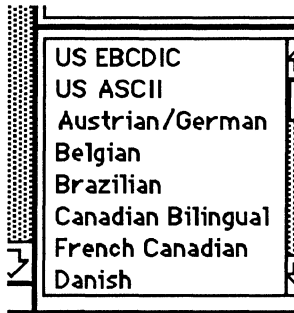
✓ CUT If you're using MMF CUT, you'll see sessions of type Terminal only:



---

## 10. Go to the language panel.

The language panel appears in the Avatar Control Panel:



Scroll through the list of languages and click on the language that's configured on your IBM host or cluster controller. See your host system manager for information about this language.

The language panel lets you select the language conventions that your MMF Workstation will follow when it transfers data to and from the IBM host . (Example: When you select Austrian/German, MMF Workstation will recognize and reproduce characters that have umlauts over them — ä, ë, etc.)

This selection applies to all LU sessions on this Workstation.

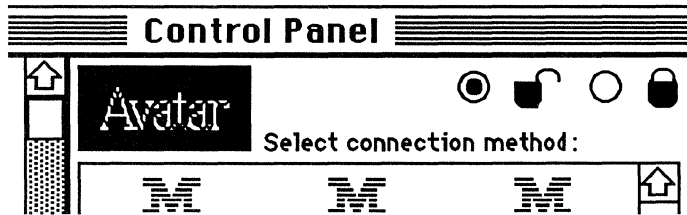
The language choices are:

US EBCDIC	English (UK)	NewSpanish
US ASCII	Finnish	Norwegian
Austrian/German	French AZERTY	Portuguese

## 11. Check the lock panel.

Go to the Lock panel again and make sure the icon you wish is selected — either locked or unlocked. Supply a new password now if you wish.

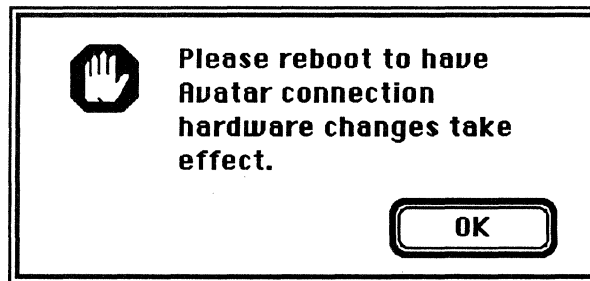


The Lock panel lets you optionally lock the parameters in the Avatar control panel. For complete information on how to use the Avatar lock panel, see Appendix B.

## 12. Close the Control Panel.

Close the Macintosh Control Panel by clicking the Close box in the upper left corner.

You'll see an alert box:



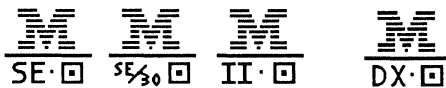

## 13. Restart your Macintosh.

Select **Restart** from the Special menu:



As your Macintosh comes up, the Workstation icon will appear. Here are the seven possible Coax Workstation icons again:



**C U T   I c o n s**



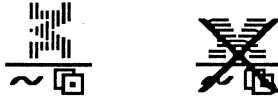
**D F T   I c o n s**

(See Appendix A for a complete list of MMF Coax Workstation icons.)

## Bad Start-up

At power-up time, if the Workstation icon turns on its side or has an X through it, make sure your MMF Workstation hardware and software are installed properly.



(We've used stand-in icons again here to represent the seven possible Coax Workstation icons.)

(You can force the MMF Workstation not to run by powering up your Macintosh with your finger on the OPTION key or the mouse button. The Token-Ring Workstation icon will also appear with an X through it in that case.)

When your Macintosh is up again (and no sideways or X-ed out icons have appeared), MMF Workstation is running again.

---

## 14. Run the MMF Checker Application

The MMF Checker application tells you the current status of your MMF hardware and software. You can use MMF Checker as soon as your Macintosh has powered up.

To check your entire MMF Workstation configuration:

1. Make sure the MMF Workstation hardware is properly installed in your Macintosh. See Chapter 2.
2. Make sure the Macintosh is physically connected to the IBM host via the external cable. See Chapter 2.
3. Make sure the MMF Workstation software is properly installed in your Macintosh. See the instructions above.
4. Load the MacMainFrame Checker application from the MMF Workstation distribution diskette to your Macintosh's start-up disk.



MacMainFrame Checker

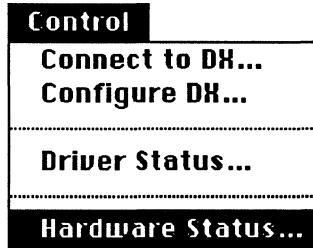
The Checker provides options to check an external **DX unit**, which you might have if you're running a MMF CUT Coax Workstation. For information on using the Checker to check a DX unit, see Appendix C.

5. Double-click on the MMF Checker icon. The menu bar will change to the Checker's:

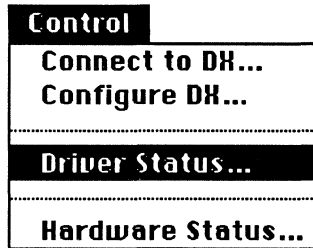

6. To check your MMF Workstation hardware status, select **Hardware Status...** from the Control menu:



- To check your MMF Workstation software status, select **Driver Status...** from the Control menu:



7. When you've finished running the Checker, pull down the Checker's File menu and select **Quit** to quit the Checker.

## Software Installation Done

Your MMF Workstation software is now installed.



To start and configure the MMF Workstation software, follow the instructions in the MacMainFrame Series *Coax/SDLC/SDLC Workstation User Guide*.

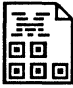

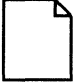

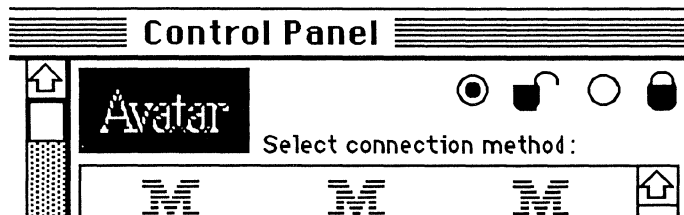
## The Avatar Lock Panel

### Introduction

The lock panel lets you secure some of the MMF Workstation's parameter settings so that no one can change them without a password. The lock panel does not prevent users from using the Workstation.

To get to the lock panel, go to the Macintosh Control Panel and select the Avatar icon in the scroll list on the left. (If there's no Avatar icon in the list, your Workstation software is not fully installed. See Chapter 3 for instructions.)

The lock panel looks like this:



If the locked lock is selected, you must supply a password before you can change any parameters in the various parameters panels.

---

## Locked Items

On MMF Coax Workstations, the items that the Avatar lock panel locks include:

- LU panel settings.
- Language panel settings.

When the items are locked, you can view the parameter settings, but you can't change them unless you click the unlock radio button and fill in the passwords as MMF requests.

**CAUTION:** Once you give a user the password for their Workstation, they can change the password at that Workstation, which means they can temporarily prevent you, the network administrator, from changing the settings at that Workstation any further.

## Items the Lock Does Not Affect

The Avatar lock panel's mechanism does *not* affect the following items:


- Applications, such as the MMF Workstation application.
- The contents of MMF Session Settings documents.

---

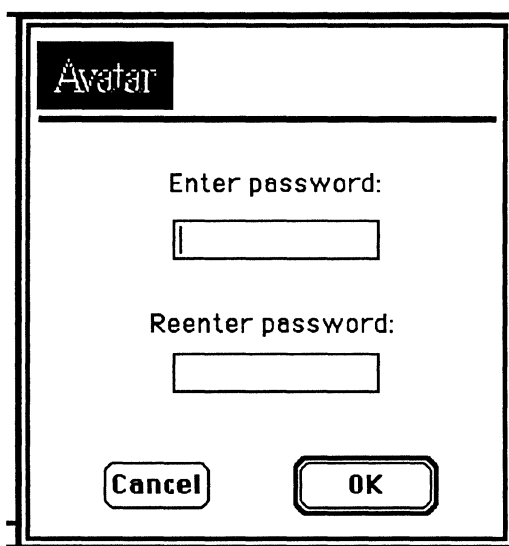
## To Set The First Password

Avatar ships the lock panel in an opened state; that is, there is no password and anyone can use the lock panel and the parameters it controls.

To set the first password:

1. Click the "locked" radio button:  

You'll see the following dialog box:

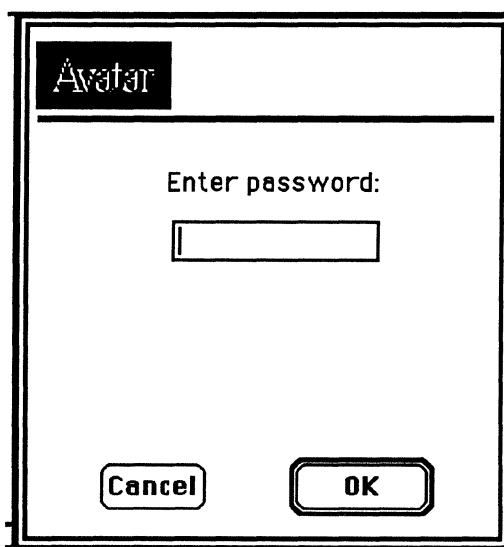

To change the password:

1. Unlock the lock, as described above.
2. Then follow the same procedure as to set the first password: click the unlock radio button, then supply the new password in both password items.

## When You Forget Your Password

If you forget the password, you won't be able to unlock the lock; you also won't be able to change the password (for example, to one you can remember).

To solve this problem, you must install a new copy of the Avatar Control Panel document in your System Folder, then go to the Avatar Panel and follow the steps in "To Set the First Password," above.

Don't forget to get rid of the old Avatar Control Panel document.

**REMEMBER:** The password.



# Appendix C

## The DX Unit

### Introduction

✓ CUT The DX Unit is an external hardware device that provides single-session IBM connectivity for MMF Coax products. The DX Unit has several benefits:

- The DX Unit is an alternative to internal Coax hardware.
- The DX Unit allows Macintoshes with no extra expansion slots to get MMF Coax connectivity. This includes Macintosh Portables.
- The DX Unit allows a dial-up capability over asynchronous data communications lines; you place the DX Unit at the cluster controller and dial up the DX Unit's modem with your Macintosh's modem.

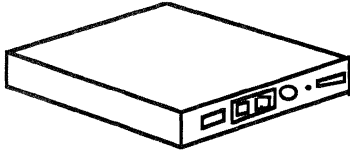
To use the DX Unit, you first install it, then configure it, then simply power it up each time you wish to use it. The following sections explain how to perform these tasks.

✓ CUT NOTE: The DX Unit supports single-LU-session operation only; that is, it operates in CUT (Control Unit Terminal) mode. For more information on the differences between CUT (single-session) and DFT (multi-session) terminals, see the MacMainFrame Series *Coax/SDLC/Token-Ring Workstation User Guide*.

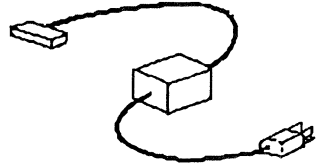

## Installing the DX Unit — Summary

You can place the DX Unit near the Macintosh or near the host, depending on your needs and the kind of communications lines you are using.

- In the local installation, the DX Unit is at the Macintosh and talks to the host via the cluster controller or via a modem.
- In the remote installation, the DX Unit is at the cluster controller, and the Macintosh must talk to it via a modem.

Here are the steps to perform each type of installation:

**To install a  
LOCAL DX Unit:**

- Connect the DX Unit to the cluster controller.
- Connect the DX Unit to the Macintosh.



**To install a  
REMOTE DX Unit:**

- Connect the DX Unit to the cluster controller.
- Connect the DX Unit to host-side modem.
- Connect the Macintosh to Macintosh-side modem.
- Open the modem-to-modem link.



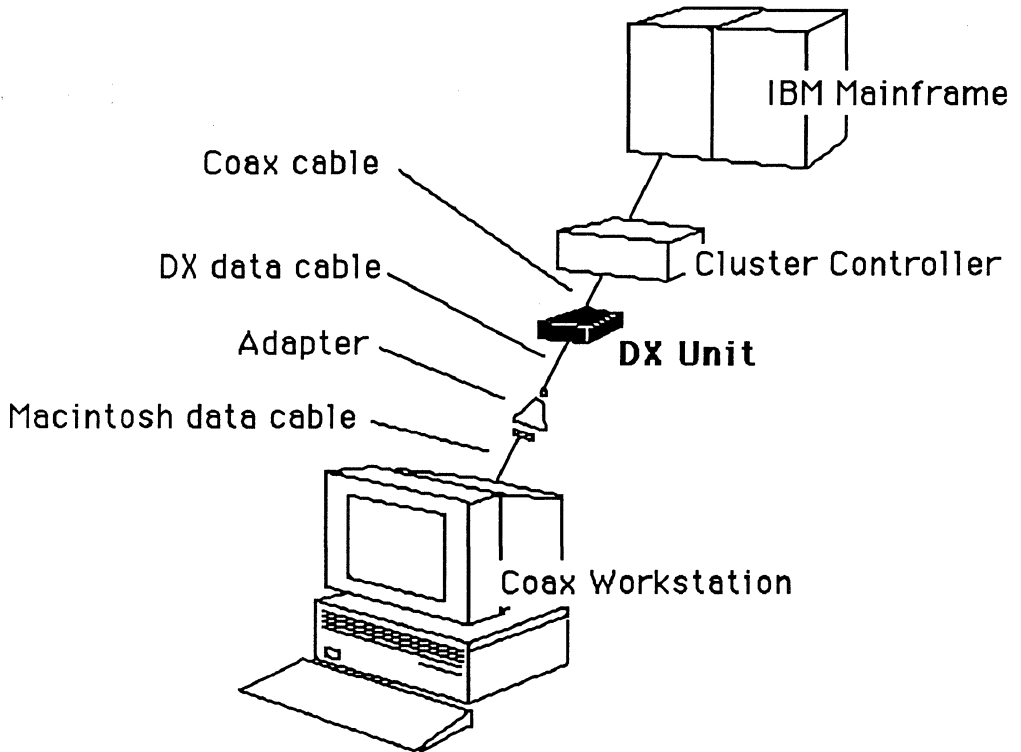
- Configuration steps common to both installation types:

## Configuring the DX Unit

To configure the DX Unit, you use the Checker application.

The Checker application comes with your MMF software. Follow the steps in Chapter 3, "Installing the Workstation Software," to get the Checker installed on your Macintosh.

*The DX Unit must be connected to your Macintosh, either locally or remotely, as described in the previous sections in this chapter.*

However,

- The DX Unit can be connected or not connected to the cluster controller.
- The MMF software can be present or not present, and the DX CUT driver can be present or not present on your Macintosh.

## Using The Checker to Configure the DX Unit

The Checker application lets you contact the DX Unit and store configuration information in the DX Unit's non-volatile memory. The DX Unit uses this information whenever MMF users use the DX.

To use the Checker application to configure the DX Unit, follow these steps:

1. Make sure the DX Unit is connected to your Macintosh, either locally or remotely.
2. Open the Checker application by double-clicking on the Checker icon:

The menu bar will change to the Checker's:





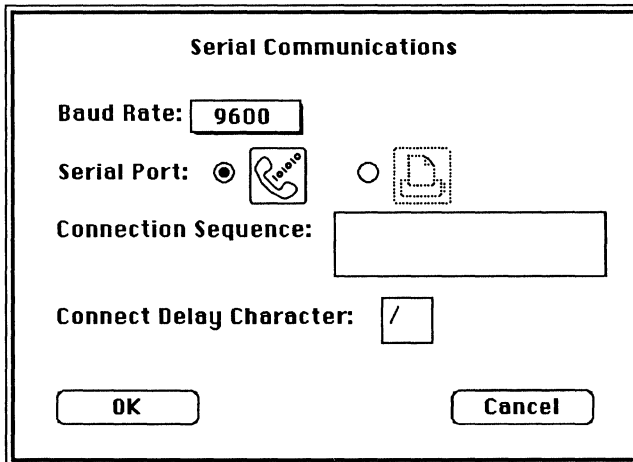
- 
3. Pull down the Control menu and select **Connect to DX... .**  
The Checker will now display the Serial Communications dialog box.  
Fill out the Serial Communications dialog box as described in the section below.  
**NOTE:** The information you supply in this box is for the Checker's use only; it does not affect the operation of the DX Unit or the DX driver.
  4. Pull down the Control menu and select **Configure DX... .**  
The Checker will now display the DX Configuration Settings dialog box.  
Fill out the DX Configuration Settings box as described in the section below.
  5. When you've finished filling out both DX-related dialog boxes, pull down the Checker's File menu and select **Quit** to quit the Checker.

---

## The Serial Communications Dialog Box

This dialog box lets you specify how your Macintosh will communicate with the DX Unit; it does not directly affect the way the DX Unit communicates with the IBM host.

**REMEMBER:** The information you supply in this box is *for the Checker's use only*; it *does not affect* the operation of the DX Unit or the DX driver.



Items in the DX Configuration Settings dialog box are:

**Baud Rate:** The baud rate the Checker will use to communicate with the DX Unit.

Range: 300, 600, 1200, 2400, 4800, 9600, 19.2K

**NOTE:** 19.2K baud is available only when the DX Unit is connected to the Macintosh locally, not when it is connected remotely.

**Serial Port:** The port on the Macintosh to which your DX Unit is connected.

---

**Connection Sequence:** (Applies to remote DX Units only.) A phone number that the Macintosh should dial to reach the DX Unit. You can edit the sequence by using UPARROW, DOWNARROW, DELETE, etc.

The connection sequence is for use when the DX lies on the other side of a modem link.

Example of a connection sequence that the Macintosh might send to a Hayes-compatible modem: ATDT 1/555-1212

Where:	AT	Indicates that a command to the modem follows.
	DT	Command to the modem — requests tone dialing rather than pulse dialing.
	1	First digit for the modem to dial.
	/	Command to the Checker — Tells the Checker to delay before sending more characters to modem. (See Connect Delay Character, next item below.)
	555-1212	The remainder of the number to dial.
	-	(Ignored)

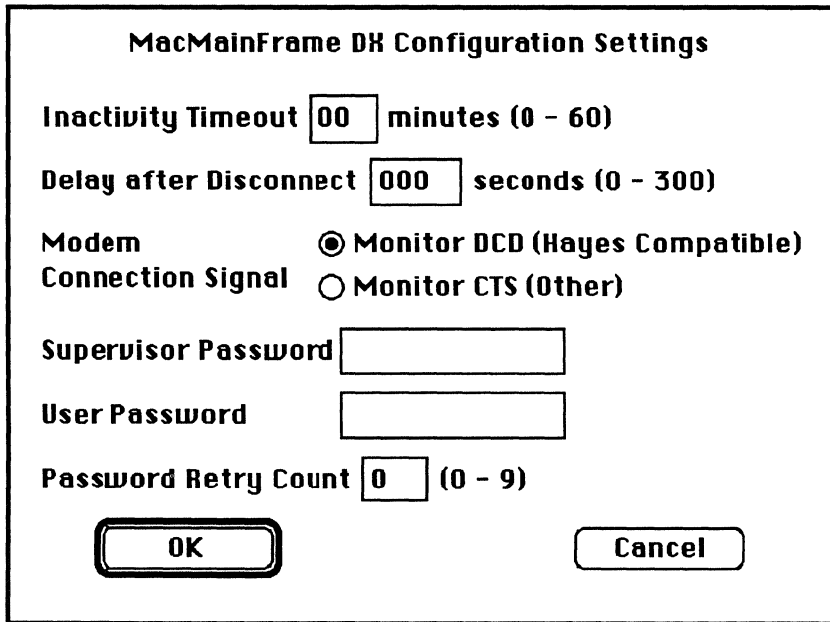
**Connect Delay Character:** (Applies to remote DX Units only.) The Checker will delay one second for each of these characters that it sees in the connection sequence. (You specify the connection sequence in the previous item.) These delays are useful when the Macintosh must wait for the DX Unit's modem to answer its phone.

In the above example, the connect delay character is a slash (/).

---

## The DX Configuration Settings Dialog Box

The DX Configuration Settings dialog box lets you supply basic information about how the DX should communicate with the host. It also lets you set passwords for using the DX Unit and for changing its parameters.



The dialog box is titled "MacMainFrame DX Configuration Settings". It contains the following fields and controls:

- Inactivity Timeout**: A text box containing "00" followed by "minutes (0 - 60)".
- Delay after Disconnect**: A text box containing "000" followed by "seconds (0 - 300)".

Items in the DX Configuration Settings dialog box are:

**Inactivity Timeout** After the time period expires during which there is no activity on the Workstation (activity here means either the user typing at the keyboard or the IBM host updating the Workstation's 3270 screen), the DX will release the LU session to the IBM host.

0 (zero) means the DX Unit will never time out.

**Delay after Disconnect** The DX will delay this amount of time until it makes itself available for use, following:

- 
- A disconnect that results from the user exceeding the password retry count,
  - A disconnect that results from the user releasing the LU session,
  - A disconnect that results from the user quitting out of the MMF application, or
  - An inactivity timeout.

Delay after Disconnect is also useful for modems that require some time to reset themselves after disconnects.

0 (zero) means no delay.

**Modem Connection Signal** Causes a remote DX Unit to listen for and interpret data that arrives on the RX data line from its modem, as follows:

- **Monitor DCD (Hayes Compatible)** Remote DX Unit will listen for and interpret data that arrives on the RX data line from its modem.
- **Monitor CTS (Other)** Remote DX Unit will *not* listen for or interpret data that arrives on the RX data line from its modem.

**Supervisor Password** A password that a network administrator must supply in order to use the Checker to configure the DX.

Range: Up to 8 alphanumeric ASCII characters; case-sensitive.

**User Password** A password that a user must supply in order to use the DX Unit to communicate with the IBM host.

Range: Up to 8 alphanumeric ASCII characters; case-sensitive.

**Password Retry Count** After this number of retries, the DX Unit will wait according to its delay after disconnect period before making itself available again.

---

This feature allows the DX Unit to pause after multiple erroneous dial-ins to resist attempts to guess its password.

---

## Software for the DX Unit

When you're using a DX Unit with your MMF Coax Workstation, *you must use a special driver*, called DX CUT:



This driver will run on all Macintosh hardware platforms that support MMF Coax Workstation.

Install the driver the same way you install the drivers for non-DX-unit Coax Workstations. (See Chapter 3 for details.) Briefly:

1. Make sure the DX CUT driver is in your system folder.
2. Make sure the DX CUT driver is selected in the Avatar Control Panel.
3. Restart your Macintosh at least once after you select the driver and before you open the MacMainFrame Workstation application.

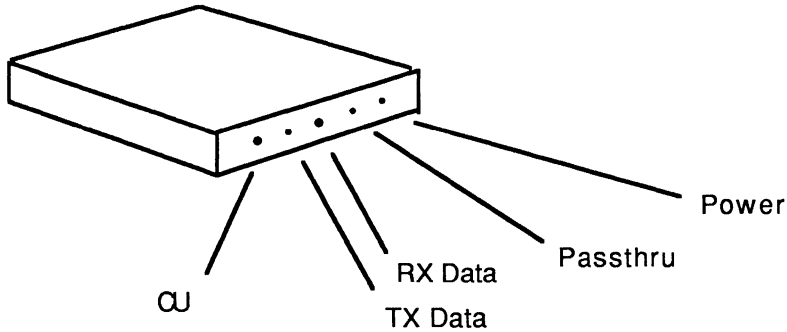
## Using the DX Unit

The DX Unit requires no operating procedures other than to power it up and power it down. The configuration data you supply remains in the DX Unit's non-volatile memory across power-downs.

**REMEMBER**, before you use the DX Unit, make sure the DX driver in your Macintosh's Avatar Control Panel is selected and your Macintosh has been restarted once since then.

---

To view the DX Unit's functions, observe the lights on the front panel:



<u>Light</u>	<u>Meaning</u>
CU	Control Unit. When ON solidly, indicates that the DX Unit is connected to a host.
TX Data	Transmit Data. Indicates that the DX Unit is currently transmitting data to the Macintosh.
RX Data	Receive Data. Indicates the DX Unit is currently receiving data.
Passthru	Pass Through. When FLASHING, indicates the DX Unit is waiting for data.  When FLASHING slowly (and the CU light is also FLASHING slowly), indicates that data is in transit through the DX Unit between the MMF machine and the IBM host .
Power	Indicates the DX Unit is powered on.
