Explain, with examples, the meaning of 'guilty mind'. 2 Judicial precedent allows the law to be both flexible and certain. Consider the extent to which you think that this statement is true. [25] 3 Your friend becomes ill after eating at a local restaurant. Critically assess what she would have to prove in order to be successful in a claim in negligence. [25] 4 Decisions in criminal cases should not be made by lay people. Discuss. [25] 5 "If one party promises to forego or not to rely upon his strict legal rights and the other party, in reliance on that promise, acts upon it, then the promisor is estopped from asserting his full legal rights" Denning LJ in Central London Properties Trust Co. Ltd v High Trees House Ltd (1947). Discuss this statement and the development of the doctrine of promissory estoppel. [25] Explain why certain acts can constitute both a crime and a tort. Compare how each case might proceed in the courts. Why are sanctions and remedies different in criminal and civil cases? [25] 7 Critically assess the relevance of equity today. [25] Explain why there has been an increase in the use of administrative tribunals and discuss the 8 disadvantages of their use. [25] 9 All contracts are agreements but there are many agreements which are not contracts. Discuss this statement and consider what is necessary for a valid contract. [25]

10 Delegated legislation is only acceptable if it is strictly controlled. Discuss.
