Gorbachev warns against rapid globalization

Former Soviet leader Mikhail
Gorbachev has warned that rapid
globalization without governance
has led to a growing gap between
the world's rich and poor. He has
also asserted that global
cooperation is needed to address
problems such as such as poverty,
terrorism and environmental
damage.

"We need new thinking for the new world," said Gorbachev during a speech last month at Miami University of Ohio in the United States. "You cannot make people happy by using tanks and missiles."

Gorbachev, leader of the Soviet Union from 1985 to 1991, has

been credited with ending the Cold War. As Soviet leader, he implemented wide-ranging political and economic reforms. However, his reforms have been blamed for inadvertently causing the dissolution of the USSR in 1991.

In 1993, Gorbachev founded the Green Cross International, of which he was one of three major sponsors of the Earth Charter.

First casualty of French riots reported

Jean-Jacques Le Chenadec has been reported as the first casualty of recent rioting in France. The 61-year old man had been reported as being beaten by a hooded man last week and been in a coma since the attack. This is the first death related to rioting in mainly immigrant communities following the death of two teenagers in an electricity sub-station.

The French prime minister,
Dominique de Villepin, announced
on Monday plans to allow the
nation's regions to impose
curfews. Mr. de Villepin appeared
the day before on television with
an appeal to end the violence.

The president, Jacques Chirac, ended his silence on the rioting on Saturday, when he spoke to the press. "Those who want to sow violence or fear will be caught, tried and punished," he said. "But we also understand very well that we must move towards respect for each individual, justice and equality of opportunity. We are all completely determined to go down this road and pursue the efforts

that are already under way in this domain."

The Minister of the Interior, Nicolas Sarkozy, called for a radical overhaul of the French social model that he said, "in every aspect, needs to be fundamentally rebuilt."

Arrests in the rioting total nearly 400 following the deaths of two youths on October 27. The unrest, which started in a Paris suburb, has spread to over 270 towns across France. More than 300 cars have been torched across the country, and 2 schools were burned.

in 25 years arrives in Tehran

The first Iraq-Iran passenger flight since war broke out between the two nations 25 years ago, has arrived safely in Tehran. The plane left Baghdad International Airport with 65 passengers and touched down in the Iranian capital a few hours later. It was an historic event, marking the end of a quarter-century of hostilities during which all flights from and to storm of this ferocity is quite rare Iran were suspended by the former Ba'athist regime.

A spokesperson for the Iranian civil aviation authority, Reza Jafarzadeh, told Agence France Presse that there were plans to resume regular commercial flights from Baghdad to Tehran on November 16, although Iran would not consider flying its own aircraft to Iraq until the security situation was resolved.

Iran's president, Mahmoud Ahmadinejad told reporters that the "protection of Iraq's territorial integrity, independence and might is of special significance to Iran."

The United States and Britain have repeatedly accused Iran of allowing militants to cross its border to help Iraq's insurgents fight the US occupation. Earlier today, Major-General Jim Dutton, a British soldier commanding a multinational force in Basra, gave a press conference in Washington during which he claimed that insurgents were getting the technology to create increasingly sophisticated bombs from across the border.

Indiana tornado kills at least 19

A tornado with winds up to 300 km/h has killed at least 19 in First Iraq-Iran passenger flight Indiana and Kentucky. The tornado touched down at around 2.00 AM local time on the 6th of November in northern Kentucky and then crossed the Ohio River into southern Indiana. "At least five people were confirmed dead in Warrick County and at least 18 were killed in Vanderburgh County, according to county officials."

> Peak storm season for the region is generally April through June - a at this time of year, according to the National Storm Prediction Centre.

The death toll varies between sources, but between 19 and 23 is the current estimate, with most of those in Indiana.
