LATE FROM FRANCE.
We have received by the ship Harriet, a Havre price current of the 25th of May, and Paris Journals up to the 20th, from which we make the following extracts:—

At the sitting of May 21, the House of Deputies passed with a great majority (284 against 65) a law appropriating eight million francs for equipping France in such condition as may enable her to meet such events as the undecided state of Europe may occasion.

A letter from Constantinople dated April 25, says:—The Porte has made with the United States of North America a Convention which permits their vessels to enter the Dardanelles but not the Black Sea, on paying a duty of 5 per cent. on the value of their cargoes. Several American vessels have in consequence entered the straits this week.

PARIS, MAY 25.—The Russians have crossed the Danube, and taken possession of Jassy. The Turks made their retreat on Brailow, after having set fire to Jassy.

Twelve thousand Russians were to be landed at Verua, from the fleet of the Black Sea.

It was supposed that Bucharest would be taken by the Russians on the 10th May.

According to news received from Lisbon to the 7th May, it appears that the Inquisition was to be re-established in Portugal.

We are assured that all the accredited ministers at the court of the Emperor of Portugal have just received orders to quit Lisbon. This general order has been given in the last acts of the Regent. We can certify that the Baron Dumand de Martigny, executing the orders of his court, will depart from Lisbon the 15th of May, in company with the ministers of England and Austria.

A letter from Toulon of the 19th May, says:—We have just been informed that the 74s Brilaw, Scipion and Syrene, have received orders to sail on the 18th for the Levant. The troops who were assembled here for the expedition, have been ordered to withdraw into the interior, to their former garrisons.

Yesterday, Mr. Marquisse, major general of marine, passed in review the thirty-six vessels of war which are in this port.

The Gazette of France announces as certain that the Russian admiral Heyden has received orders from his government to blockade the Dardanelles.

All the foreign consuls have been asked to block the Dardanelles. An experience was to be made at Visennes (France) with the gun of Perkins' invention.

The admirals of the three Allied powers have rejected the demand which had been addressed to them by the Porte, asking of them to use their influence with the Greeks and cause them to accept the decree of amnesty which Turkey had presented them through the medium of the three Greek bishops.

It is said that admiral Rigny declared that he had no orders on that head and that he would advise the Porte to accept within the shortest possible delay, the stipulations of the treaty of July 6, as the best means of avoiding the still greater sacrifices she must necessarily make if she continues a state of things that every day becomes more serious to her.

Corfu, April 27.—We are assured that the distinguished post of generalissimo of the Greek troops formerly occupied by general Church, is about to be given to a French colonel.

A naval expedition is preparing, said to be for the Gulf of Ambrosia. At Corfu they await impatiently for the conference already determined upon and it appears that about the end of May the three ambassadors will occupy themselves with the situation of Greece.

It is no longer intended to blockade the Dardanelles, and the Russian fleet in the Mediterranean will merely cooperate for the pacification of Greece and protect those Russian subjects who are in the Turkish provinces. But if the Russian land forces should advance on Constantinople and should approach the Archipelago or at any rate the sea of Mormona, it is possible that the Count Heyden would attack the Dardanelles, whilst a Russian fleet in the Black Sea would appear before the Bosphorus. We are ignorant what may be the intentions of the Pacha of Egypt with regard to the evacuation of the Morea. Mehomed-Ali who knows better than any

one else the power of the Porte, cannot be ignorant of the danger that threatens the Turkish empire. It is not probable that after his misfortune at Navarino he would again be willing to make sacrifices for the Porte.

The fleet at Alexandria is armed and prepared for sea, but has not received orders to sail, as for Ibrahim he continues at Modon but without making any preparations for his departure.

Maratilles, May 19.—A letter from Alexandria dated March 25, confirms what has already been stated concerning the cotton crops which will not amount to 800,000 bales, it further states that the Basha is determined to furnish to sell the crops in Egypt.

Although we differ in our political opinions with the Editor of the Green Country Republican, concerning the great question now before the public, we cannot but render due honour to a man so impartial and so firm a friend to truth, who, especially exposes to the scorn of his fellow citizens those perfidious authors of the divisions are hired at present existing between the different states of the Union.

From the Journal of Commerce.
Late from Mexico.—By the political Captain Simmons of the brig Aurora, who arrived yesterday morning from Tampico, we have received advices from Tampico of the 10th, and the City of Mexico to the 7th ult. inclusive.

We mentioned in a postscript yesterday, that Capt. S. left Tampico the Spanish fleet under Commodore Laborda was daily expected, and arrived on the 10th.

The Government had commenced building a fort at the bar to prevent his entrance, and troops were collecting in all quarters to repel him. The old Spanish ships had only three days allowed them to leave, and most of them had already left for the interior.

The Mexican Government was looking with a jealous eye toward some rebellious symptoms in Coatepec, one of the towns included in the state of Vera Cruz. A movement was made at the same place in January last in favor of Bravo and his party, and it appears the rancorous feelings of the citizens, instead of subsiding upon the death of their favorite, have been excited to greater violence.

A detachment of cavalry had been ordered to Coatepec to maintain order. Other parts of the republic were evidently viewed with suspicion by the government, as individuals were not wanting in all parts who would seize any opportunity to avenge the death of Bravo.

The government of the state of Coahuila, and Texas has granted to Col. John D. Bradburn and Stephen, M. C. L. Staples the exclusive privilege of navigating the Rio Bravo del Norte by steamboats and horse boats for the space of fifteen years.

The following items are from El Sol: The governor of Vera Cruz issued a proclamation on the 28th of April, setting forth that an attack upon the Coast might be expected from the Spanish squadrons under Com. Laborde, and commanding all Spaniards visiting on the coast, as soon as the squadron should come in sight, to retire twenty leagues into the interior, and not to return till they received permission from government.

Information has been received in Vera Cruz by the crew of the Guerrero, who has been sent back from Havana, that the governor of Cuba has agreed to a regular exchange of prisoners with the Mexicans, excepting therefrom, however, the nations of the peninsula (Old Spain) of Havana, and Porto Rico, who shall be taken in arms against the Spanish flag.

The debates of the Mexican Congress were only reported to the 9th of April. They were entirely occupied with local concerns, and contain nothing of interest to our readers.

Anecdote.—It is related of an old gentleman who was crippled by a painful bile, that in attempting to go down cellar to draw some cider, taking with him a blue and white mug which was highly valued in the family, he fell and broke the bile, which put him in great pain. His tender spouse, more anxious for her darling mug than for the welfare of her better half, ran to the head of the stairs and called out:—"My dear, have you broken the mug?"
