Still later from Europe.

Report also by the best accounts from Constantinople (March 21.) and from Odessa (March 24.), that the preparations for war were going on with the same energy. The Swedish Ambassador, it is said, had been endeavoring in vain to bring the Sultan to his senses.

The *Courier* of the 18th, gives the following as the substance of the proposed Law upon the Liberty of the Press in France, which it says deserved unqualified approbation, as the Freedom of the Press has gained greatly by the ambition of the Censure. The law is said to render greatly the regulation existing in England with respect to the Periodical Press:

Any person may set up a Journal—but he or they must give before it is set up, security, &c., to the word; however, he published only once a month, and containing nothing but advertisements, no security is to be required.

Where there are several, partners, two or three responsible managers are to be appointed, who shall superintend the Editing of the Journal.

The title of the Journal, and the periods of publication are to be declared—together with the names of all the proprietors, their residence, and the services he has in the undertaking—the names and studies of the responsible managers, and the printing-house where the journal is to be printed.

Every number of a paper shall be signed by the proprietor or manager, and deposited in the office of the Procurer du Roi. The name shall also appear at the bottom of each published sheet. Judicial proceedings may be had against the author of any article, not the person whose name appears at the end of the paper.

The tribune, under very grave circumstances, may order the suppression of the journal for a time, not more than three months, nor less than one month. The Examination has begun to go on again.

The Emperor Nicholas has fixed his coronation for the 1st of May, at Warsaw.

It was reported in London, that Ibrahim Pacha has consented to evacuate the Morea, provided England and France will guarantee to his father and himself quiet possession in Egypt for the space of twenty years. How could they guarantee this? The resort seems to be an idle one.

Paris, April 16.—We have just received, by express, a letter from Vienna of the 14th April.

The report in the capital is of a movement of the Russian army in advance.

Decidedly, the first corps, which are composed of the 8th and 14th divisions, are to pass the Pruth on the morning of the 14th.

Brazil.—An arrival at Baltimore, in 36 days from Rio Janeiro, brings advices to April 1.—The authorities of Monte Video, after considerable difficulty, permitted vessels to clear that had not taken in cargoes there. No goods but flour would bring cost: that was selling at \$16 M. V. currency; duty 92 per bbl.

The Brig Sicily, of Boston, was taken off Buenos Ayres, where she got ashore—the B. A. gun boat came out, best of the Brazilians, took possession of the brig, and recovered part of the cargo. The Brazilians resisted the attack, when the B. A. fired at her to the brig and left her.—The capt. and crew were on board the Brazilian squadron.

Brig Hannibal, of Portsmouth, and brig St. Joseph, had been captured by the Brazilian blocking squadron. The latter under trial.

Conyngham, arrived here last evening from St. Ubes, that, on the 18th of February a gale of wind commenced from the South East to the South West, a number of vessels were driven ashore and lost, as also many lives. PANORAMA EXHIBITION.
THE great Panoramic picture of the

City of Paris, the Capital of the Kingdom of France, is now exhibiting in the building on the public square of

Republique square.

The view is taken from the roof of the south end of the palace of the Tuilleries; the spectator is therefore himself placed on this elevated situation which commands an extensive prospect over the whole city.

Immediately under the eye of the spectator in a northern direction, is the roof of the King's apartments, and on the right that of the long picture gallery stretching eastward under the Louvre;

This gallery bounds the place de la Carrousel on the south side and the new gallery on the north, in the centre of this square is seen the triumphal arch. On this square Napoleon was wont to review his battalions previous to their departure for their respective destinations, and here oft the walls resounded with the clang of martial music. On the west side of the palace the spectator looks down on the Guard of the Tuilleries, and beyond that is the distance is seen the palace of the Garde des Meubles, and the woods of the Champs Elysees in the distance.

When we consider that Paris has been the theatre of so many great political events which have convulsed Europe for thirty years past, but, if any subjects of equal interest to the American could be offered in the public—
