From the Nashville Courier, 26 Nov.
A rencounter, of a most serious and distressing nature, has occurred this morning in St. Dennis street, between Mr. Jared Cable, of this place, and Dr. J. DeLava, of the United States' army which resulted in the death of the latter. Mr. J. Cable, after receiving a few blows from his antagonist with a heavy stick, by which his leg was fractured and his head considerably hurt, shot him through the breast with a pistol, after receiving the fatal wound he retreated and staggered and Messrs. Hays and ... died in a few minutes.

LAST FROM LIVERPOOL.
Liverpool, Oct. 15.
Despatches were received by the government on Sunday, from Mr. Sturford Canaing, the British minister at Constantinople: they were dated the 15th ult. They merely announced that no change up to that date had been manifested by the Turk with respect to his professed determination to refuse the mediation of the allies.

The Egyptian fleet has landed 5000 men at Navairo, and the Pacha is said to have refused to listen to the British consul at Alexandria, who was instructed to exhort him to withdraw from the coast.

An officer in the service of the Pacha of Egypt, writes from Alexandria, under date of the 1st ult. that the Pacha had expressed great disappointment on learning that his fleet had been allowed to pass through the allied squadron, having calculated on its being ordered back to Alexandria, and on retaining it still at his disposal, while, by submitting to this compulsion, he kept up the appearance of fidelity to the Porte. His ships, being pent up in a port in the Morea, where wholly lost to him until the termination of the negotiation at Constantinople.

The Hon. Albert Gallatin, ambassador from the United States to this country, embarked on Monday, in the packet ship Sylvanus Jenkins, with his family, for New-York. His excellency left his charge d'affaires in London; and we apprehend, from the advanced years of Mr. Gallatin, that we shall not see that able diplomatist in this country again.

Government has built or laid down 30 steamers, carrying 10 guns each; and it has a frigate on the stocks, to be propelled by an engine of 400 horse power.

The latest accounts of the operations of the Greek forces are (if we may trust them) calculated to inspire confidence. Their arms are said to have been triumphant in more than one encounter, and what is of the highest importance, much has been effected by Church and Cochrane to reconcile the chiefs, and to restore subordination.

The following brief notice of our own gallant seamen, who are engaged in the service in the Mediterranean, maybe of some interest to the reader.

"We have (says the Davenport paper,) been favored with the perusal of several letters from the British fleet in the Mediterranean up to the 2d date as the 3d of Sept. when it was cruising between Hydra and Thermin, in expectation of meeting with the Egyptians which were reported to be bound for Hydra. All the ships were preparing for action. Sir Edward Codrington, too is represented as duly impressed with the importance of the political interests entrusted to his charge, and as fully acquiescent to fulfil the hopes of the country, in the difficult crisis which was approaching."

SPAIN—The old gentleman who is commonly supposed to know every thing in which there is mischief, would, we truly believe, find himself puzzled to comprehend rightly the condition of affairs in Spain at the present moment. The apostolical rebellion was going on as prettily as heart could wish that loves confusion. It was extending every where. The King gets down among

them, and mirabilis dictum, his approach to Terragona (there is the very centre of the rebellion) was a triumphal triumphal march. The very royalist volunteers, who have been levying war against him, suddenly resumed their loyalty and obedience.

Then comes (this intelligence in the Quotidien, how authentic we cannot tell) an amnesty, which produced the best effects, the heads of the insurgents laying down their arms.

Well, in the next day's papers we read of the army of observation (on the Portuguese frontier) which had been ordered to march for Cantabria, being suddenly ordered to suspend its march, a conventional insurrection having shown itself in Galicia and Estremadura.

The several channels through which we receive intelligence, so far as such facts as they are in possession of, according to their own wishes on the subject.

PORTUGAL—Affairs in this country appear to be in a condition to receive with thankfulness Don Miguel, in any other prince or intelligible authority, who will prescribe to himself some fixed principle of rule. At present the government of the Princess seems as precarious as that of any young child in the economy of her baby house.

Commercial.

Liverpool Cotton Market.
SATURDAY, Oct. 13.—There has been no change in our cotton market to day, and about 1,500 bags have been sold.
The import of this week is 7,059 bags, and the sales are 11,920 bags, at a slight reduction in the price of low American descriptions; viz: 400 Bel Islands at 11d to 12d; 4,000 Boulds at 6d to 6 1/2d; 1,140 Orleans at 8d to 8 1/2d; 2,250 Alabama, &c. at 5 1/2d to 6d; 440 Pernamb at 8 1/2d to 9 1/2d; 1,100 Bahia and Maranhams at 7 1/2d to 8d; 480 Demeraras, &c. at 7 1/2d to 8d; 200 Common West Indies at 5d to 6d; Egyptian at 7 1/2d to 8d; and 180 Bengal at 4 1/2d to 4d. The export of raw cotton from Great Britain, during the week ending 6th Oct. was not fewer than 2,920 bags. It is to be observed, that the export of raw cotton is on the increase; the export from London, Liverpool, and Hull, in the shape of only Calicoes, 2,063; and of Twist, 3,850, amounting to 6,300 bags of raw cotton. It is worthy of remark, that the prices of Upland on the 13th Sept. were still at 10 to 11 1/2d, not having varied for six weeks, and that on this side the water there has been very little alteration in price. The promise of exchange had advanced, it being quoted at 11 1/2.
