It appears that on the 31st of January last, the amount of their notes in circulation was 445,660 dollars; specie 687,366 dollars 99 cents; bills and notes discounted, amounted to 1,328,951 dollars 01 c.

A resolution of the senate and house of representatives was read for the first time, which authorizes the board of internal improvement to examine which is the best place for the opening of a canal between the Passagemarin and the river Mississippi, and to estimate the dimensions and expenses of that undertaking, and to make known the result of their researches to the next Legislature.
