The Treaty of Peace With Mexico.

Editorial from the Lafayette Statesman of March 25, 1848:

The treaty of peace between the United States and Mexico has been ratified by the Senate, and an armistice entered into between our troops and their enemy. If peace can be obtained and its permanence secured, it is an object worthy the labor of the statesman as well as the philanthropist; for so grave are the evils of war, and so severely are they felt even by the conquerors, that neither territory nor fame can offer any adequate compensation. Still when a resort to arms has been forced upon a nation, and life and treasure have been lavishly expended in seeking redress for wrongs, victory should not prove a barren acquisition. Yet the treaty now ratified, virtually places upon us the expenses of the war, and, while it surrenders three-fourths of the country in our possession, stipulates that we shall pay for what we retain. If it secured reciprocity in trade between Mexico and the United States, the right of way across the Isthmus of Tehuantepec, or religious toleration, only to our own citizens in that country, it might merit commendation, notwithstanding it was made under such circumstances as almost to be a burlesque upon negotiation. It is indeed divested of some of the odious features which it originally bore, but still it promises to be fruitless, even if ratified in Mexico, in all save peace. It was said when the territory of our enemy was occupied, and bloody battles fought, that we aimed "to conquer a peace;" we have failed to conquer, but, under the auspices of an English arbiter, have bought a questionable peace at a most enormous price—the best blood and the treasure of the nation. Its generosity towards a fallen foe is, however, one redeeming trait, and shows that last of dominion did not instigate the war. It releases us from further expenditure of blood and of treasure, save the payment for territory which opens to us the ports of the Pacific; yet it fails to give what our position led us to expect, and enabled us reasonably to demand.

Liberal to Mexico as are its provisions, will it be ratified by her? and if ratified, can it be maintained unbroken? It is difficult to know with any degree of certainty the popular sentiment of the Mexicans. They, more than any other people, are influenced by their leading politicians, and, consequently, are as changeable as the

wind. Their politicians are now obstinately silent, or studiously avoid any decided expression of opinion in regard to the important measure upon which the government must soon act. An attempt seems generally made to avoid responsibility, the governors of States declining any action and referring the matter back to congress, and the representatives of congress failing to attend the legislative sittings. The president, Penn y Penn, and his cabinet alone, have boldly committed themselves for peace; while a few military chieftains, looking to Santa Anna to lead them, fiercely clamor for a continuance of war. To secure peace, as well as to conduct war successfully, union of feeling and the co-operation of all parties are essential.

To Increase Attendance of Immigrants in Night Schools.

Washington, Sept. 4. — On September 1 the United States Bureau of Education in the Department of the Interior began its nation-wide campaign to induce 3,000,000 non-English-speaking immigrants to attend night school and learn the language of America.

The Commissioner of Education has designated men dealing with the immigrant's problems from every angle to serve on a National Committee of One Hundred to further the purposes of the campaign. This action is the result of resolutions adopted by two Americanization conferences held during the recent meetings of the National Education Association in Detroit and in New York, at which times it was decided that the removal of the inability of the foreign-born residents to speak English could be hastened by concerted effort and co-operation of all interested agencies and individuals working intensively on a nationwide basis prior to an immediately subsequent to the opening of evening schools in October.

Letters of appointment have been sent to representative industrial leaders, educators, labor and immigration officials, State officials, editors, officers of patriotic, civic and racial organizations and public spirited citizens in every section of the United States. The function of the committee will be to co-operate with the Bureau in enlisting the active interest of school superintendents, chambers of commerce, commercial organizations, industrial establishments, labor unions and private organizations.

For the purpose of enlisting native and foreign-born American citizens in the "America First" campaign, an enrollment blank headed "Sign this card and join the Americanization committee" will be used. Thousands of these cards, asking each signer for his personal help, will be disseminated in States and cities where immigrants reside. Through the active assistance secured in this manner, the Bureau expects to be able to reach thousands of immigrants which it could reach in no other way. Co-operating sub-committees will be appointed in the principal immigrant communities.
