DISURBANCES IN POPAYAN. Head Quarters in Seja, Jan. 20. (To his Excellency the Minister of State and of War.)

An extraordinary messenger has just arrived from Popayan with positive information of the partial destruction of the guerrillas of the factious Obando. General Heres, second officer of the army of the South, on the morning of the 16th Dec. completely defeated Col. Paredes and Cart. Villota, chiefs of the guerrillas who infested the province of Pastos, making them prisoners, and taking possession of all their baggage, arms and ammunition.

General Cordova, commander in chief of the division of operations on the Cauca, says, (Jan. 18.) that the two hostile guerrillas which he held in check on the frontiers of Popayan, had almost intirely dispersed, on account of the terror occasioned by the march of two columns to Timbio and Tambo; that the dispersed had come and presented themselves to him, and had assured him that Obando had been taken himself to the borders of the Mayo; and that Gen. Heres was by that time in Pastos.

Col. Cordova had reunited in Popayan the division of operations there with the column under his command, and the commander in chief marched immediately upon Peña and Pastos with the whole division, to destroy entirely the remainder of the Patian faction.

On the whole, there is reason to believe that order and tranquillity will be restored in the Southern part of the Republic, and that the national representation already convoked, will be reunited under the auspices of peace and independence necessary to establish on a firm basis the government which constitutes the happiness of Columbia.

SIR—The maritime forces of Peru, under command of Admiral Guise, forced the chain which barred the entrance of the river of Guayaquil, and burnt the fort de las Cruces on the 22d of Nov. This advantage enabled them to place themselves in front of the City, and to pour upon the inhabitants a heavy fire of grape-shot, which carried terror and death in its progress. But the indefatigable activity of Gen. Illingrat, prefect of that department, and of the worthy officers who assisted him, aided by the people en masse, has covered the City with glory, by the heroic resistance which they made against the invaders on the 23d and the 24th. By means of a small battery hastily thrown up, the valor and coolness of the artillery, the intrepidity and firmness of the garrison, and even of the unarmed citizens, the hostile squadron was compelled to withdraw, after suffering severely both in damage to their ships and loss of men.

The official communication which I have the honor to enclose, will furnish you with the particulars of these important events, which have been confirmed by Col. Charles Eloi Demarquet, who has sent to this station the head officer of Buenaventura, bringing interesting letters from the chief commander of the South, and from other officers and respectable persons of these departments. The department of Guayaquil, which was one of the most active in achieving the independence of Peru, (obtained at immense pecuniary sacrifices on the part of Columbia.) has not only had to bear the expense of an army created for its own defence, but has been foremost in resisting the unjust aggression of the Peruvians. Guayaquil has given to Peru a sad lesson of what national honor can do, when contending against the most infamous ingratitude.

Reward of Treason.—Jose Camunes presented himself to Admiral Guise on his arrival, with his squadron, at the Island of Punta to blockade that port. It was he who piloted the frigate on the 22 Dec. to the City of Guayaquil. He had the misfortune to get the ship aground on the morning of the 24th, and was immediately put to death;—a just reward for his perfidy and treason. Gaceta Extraordinaria. Admiral Guise.—Admiral Martin Jorge Guise fell in the engagement of Dec. 24 at 10 o'clock in the morning. We regard him as a brave soldier, who has rendered distinguished services to the American cause; and it is a matter

of sorrow that in the last days of his life, he should have degraded himself by becoming the instrument of a faction.—It gives us pleasure to announce to our readers, that Admiral Guise, on receiving orders from the Peruvian government to burn this city, manifested the utmost repugnance to such a barbarous act.—Amanuense Extraordinaria de Cartagena.

(From the N. Y. American.) Among the personal anecdotes which we see in the London papers concerning the prominent individuals who, in the Catholic question have suddenly changed their opinion, we find it said of M. Peel, that when the address from the throne, recommending to parliament the consideration of the laws disqualifying Catholics, was finally agreed upon at Windsor, the Home Secretary could not, though in the presence of the King, refrain from murmuring, as to the difficulties of the part he would have to play;—whereupon the King is said, with equal keenness and wit to have observed, "Oh! your part is not near so difficult as mine, for you can resign, you know, which I cannot." This significant speech, adds the London Sphynx, "completely silenced the Joseph Surface of the Cabinet."

Another royal plesantry, on this subject, is stated in the following paragraph: "His Majesty's Dilemma.—The king, it said, occasionally makes severe remarks on the violence of the opponents of the Catholic bill. He is reported to have said to the Duke of Wellington—"I suppose, Arthur, they intend to send you to the d—l, and me to Honover; but what am I to do there when the duke of Brunswick is bent upon a war? We are in a dangerous way among them."

The Barbadoes Mercury, Feb. 14, says—"A sight of rather a novel description, presented itself yesterday, in Carlisle Bay. A ship belonging to the United States Government of North America, put in here in a distressed state, in want of provisions. She is called the Tuscaloosa, is from Rio Janeiro with a cargo of coffee, &c. and was on her way to the United States."

PUBLIC DEBT.—The Secretary of the Treasury has notified the proprietors of the unredeemed six per cent stock of 24th March, 1814, amounting to \$6,789,722 92 that it will be paid upon the surrender of the certificates, on the 1st of July next.

RUSSIA. ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 9.—Yesterday, 8th February, a solemn Te Deum was celebrated at the Winter Palace, in presence of the Emperor and Empress, on account of the capture by assault of the fortress of Kala, on the 25 Jan. by the Russian troops. The members of the Council of the Empire, the ministers, senators, and generals, the Court and the Diplomatic corps all assembled at the ceremony.

News from the army.—Field Marshal Count Wittgenstein, reports, that the Turkish fortress of Kala, on the West bank of the Danube, opposite Nicopolis, and near Turno, was carried by assault by the troops of the 5th division of infantry, under the orders of Gen. Maliof sky.—Thirty-two pieces cannon, five standards, & about 400 prisoners have fallen into our hands; among the latter, Ibrahim a pacha of two tails, who formerly commanded at Silistria.

During the assault of Kala, our troops also attacked the suburbs of the fortress of Turno, and carried them, after driving the enemy back into the citadel. Our loss, as well at Kala as at Turno, amounts to about 400 killed and wounded—among the latter is Colonel Orsippoff, commanding the Ladoga regiment, and Lt. Col. Tchirikovsky, commanding that of Schlussemburg.

The fortress of Kala, separated by the Danube from Nicopolis, is almost under fire of Turno.—Its fortifications were found in the best condition.
