Mejico 5 de diciembre.

Si acaso han figurado en la república mexicana un Sila y un María, éstos han desaparecido del teatro político conservando solo la memoria de sus nombres, no para escucharlos, sino más bien para recordar los males que causaron a la patria. Existían algunos escritores en el empeño de pintar el pronunciamiento del ejército de reserva, y de una gran parte de la nación, como teniendo por objeto la persona del general Guerrero: todo esto es muy ageno de los gesta y soldados que siguen aquellas huestes; solo si es indispensable que si la constitución se ha de restablecer, se renuevan aquellos funcionarios que designados por ella, la hacen un nuevo ultraje en cada uno de los momentos que permanecen en su puesto, donde la ley no los ha calificado.

El acuerdo celebrado por el senado declarando justo y legítimo el pronunciamiento del ejército de reserva, mal se puede comparar a las resoluciones tomadas por el senado italiano aprobadas por las cortes pretorianas: menos se puede afirmar con verdad hincar Sila, quien con el puñal en la mano amenaza a los cuellos de sus conciudadanos, ni que haya conquistado con la espada, ni la dignidad que surge, ni el establecimiento de su autoridad. El digno vice presidente de la república, quien está a la frente de los negocios públicos, es el designado por las leyes, sin que pueda ocurrir duda alguna que esa fundación sobre este punto. El senado ha tenido por objeto en su acuerdo, establecer una justa distinción entre los pronunciamientos que solamente han acarreado males muy graves a la república, y la reacción nacional que comenzando en el ejército de reserva, se ha propagado rápidamente por todo el hemisferio oceánico. La nación ha manifestado ya ser sus votos ante mí con los de aquéllos valientes militares, ó comunes propietarios, estos pusieron a aquella en apetito para manifestarlos. Pudiera dejar de calificarse como justa una acción tan laudable. Pudiera reputarse dig a di una amnistía. Eto sería suponer definitivamente a la nación mexicana cuando de nuevo emite sus votos por conservar la forma de gobierno que ha sido tanto, cosa con fundir la voz de J. L. con su asiduidad de la Accordade; y en fin unir a Fernando VII constituyendo a los pueblos americanos que lo habían por su adicto el pasado año, con los primeros en su mano usurpadora, e si se concibe aun la gran diferencia que maha entre unos y otros acto?

Podrá después de esto ponerse en duda la justicia de un del senado, calificando de justa el pronunciamiento de la tapa?

Microscopio Solar

El punto blanquecino que se nota sobre los bigotes pasos, los representa del tamaño de un puerco espín, vivos y moviéndose de una parte a otra. Los animalillos que contiene el vinagre, se ven abolutamente idénticos a las anguilas, y de 5 a 10 pies de largo. Se distingue, visiblemente, la circulación de los fluidos y el movimiento de los músculos de los cuerpos animados.

La cristalización de diferentes substancias salinas, produce un efecto tan maravilloso y tan alabado a la vista que no hay expresión capaz de dar la más remota idea. Una infinidad de objetos microscópicos, proporcionan á la vez, placer e instrucción tanto al curioso como al pensador.

Es enteramente imposible con el auxilio de las artes y de las ciencias, hallar un medio más razonable, al mismo tiempo más filosófico que destruirte de un modo tan satisfactorio las obras de la naturaleza y de los hombres.

El curioso se divertirá mucho; el filosofo se sentirá movido, y el religioso contemplando las regiones ocultas, donde siempre se encuentra la mano divina. Ninguno podrá menos que exclamar: grandes y maravillosas son todas las obras del señor Dios todo poderoso! solo tu, con tu sabiduría, pudiste formar lo que ven mis ojos.

Incendiaries will infest our city, notwithstanding the utmost vigilance of the police, and the citizens have to be much upon the alert to prevent and detect their wicked intentions. Last evening, between the hours of 7 and 8 o'clock we were aroused from our slumber by the appalling alarm of fire. We hastened to the scene of desolation, and discovered it to be in Marigny street, in the faubourg of that name, in the building occupied as a rope walk by Mr. Lanoir. That it was the work of an incendiary there appears to be little doubt; but what their intentions were in calling the citizens to so great a distance cannot be immediately told. The loss, so far as we could ascertain, amounted to some three or four thousand dollars.

Shipwreck—The John Adams, Alarion, from New-Orleans for this port, with 925 bales cotton, 5000 lbs lead, 15 bales twine, and 5 bales merchandise went ashore on Fire Island, Monday morning last, at 4 o'clock. We learn from a passenger that she has bilgeed, and yesterday morning has been free of water in her hold. They had commenced discharging the cargo. She cleared at New-Orleans January 1st, and was consigned to Mr. H. W. Field, Passengers and crew safe.

Washington, January 27.

The Tariff—Contrary to the indication hitherto held out by the proceeding in Congress, it appears that the subject of a revision of the Tariff will be seriously agitated at the present session of Congress. A bill for that purpose has been reported in the Senate, by Gen. Surratt, the Chairman of the Committee of Finance, of a very important character, if it is likely to pass, of which likelihood we can form no opinion.

The bill proposes to modify, from and after the 30th day of June next, the duties on iron, in bolts, hemp, molas-

ses, sail-duck, manufactures of wool, all cotton cloths whatsoever, wool, unmanufactured, clothing ready made, cotton bagging, coffee, teas, Woollen carpeting, shot, flax, salt, and some other articles. It proposes to abolish, from and after the passing of the act, all duties on iron, in bars, prepared for rail ways; and, from and after the 30th day of June, 1832, to admit, free of duty, wines of all kinds, teas of all kinds, spices, coffee, cacao, various fruits, silks, chintz, lace, tin, salt, canton cranes, linen, cambrics, lawns, gauze, and a variety of other articles.

We protest against the principle, that because Gen. Jackson may have expressed an opinion on the policy which ought to be pursued towards the Indians, it must therefore be made a party question; and we do so, both for his own sake, and because in this way the claims of justice and the honor of the country are in danger of being sacrificed on the altar of political devotion.

By acknowledging their attachment to the present Administration, men do not pledge their acquiescence in every particular measure of that Adminstration, right or wrong,—much less, in every opinion which may be expressed by its Head; and we are confident that those who carry the opposite doctrine into practice, do but injure the cause which they seek to promote.

In the Northern States at least, there is a unanimity of feeling on the Indian question, which seldom exists on questions of public policy; and it is too evident to be denied, that vast multitudes, and indeed an overwhelming majority, of those who feel strongly on this subject, are actuated by principles as distinct from the jarrings of party as light is from darkness. Why? because men mean to sever themselves from a party to which they are honestly attached.
