JUAN GUIPARA vs. — SANCHEZ, musician, H. C. M. service.
We learn that Judge Preval, after two hearings of the counsel engaged in this case, and a further investigation of the evidence, has discharged this Spanish soldier, on the order of arrest and delivery, by which he was imprisoned. The reasons for the discharge, are not those which go to solve the most doubtful point in the case, and the question, of the right or duty of the American judiciary, to deliver to an officer of foreign government, a deserter from the military corps of that government when it is thought there is no provision of a treaty for the regulation of these affairs, is not only undecided in this case but will be untouched. The legal cause of his discharge, is the opinion entertained by Judge Preval of the insufficiency of the evidence to prove his enlistment. It is stated, that notwithstanding his discharge from the arrest, he is yet imprisoned on a charge of felony, alleged by some of his fellow soldiers. Mer.

Next President.—An election for the next president was held by the passengers on board the Steam boat Triton, which arrived here last week from Galena. Accounts from Washington City, represent the state of society, existing there as most gloomy. A highly respectable, intelligent and observing gentleman, under date the 30th ult. addresses his friend in this place as follows:

"It is melancholy to visit the City at this time.—All business appears to be at a stand, & all confidence between man and man gone. So terrible is the proscription that they even fear to disapprove any act, lest the vengeance of the administration should fall upon their family; and instead of the free, open, loud conversation which heretofore existed in the taverns and elsewhere, you see but a few persons talking together at a time and in whispers, fearing to be beard. And even in private houses, if the master has the most remote connection with government, when the acts of the administration are introduced as a subject of conversation the door of the room is immediately closed, and the conversation conducted in a low tone of voice. This is a real picture, for I have often witnessed it"—Reporter.

The President of the U. S. has recognised Goffredo Barmley, Esq. as Vice-Consul of His Majesty the King of the Two Sicillies, for the port of Savannah, and Antonio Pommar, Vice-Consul from the same government, for the port of New York.

The Corn Crops.—The prospects of an abundant corn crop, in this part of the Scioto valley, were never more flattering than they are at the present moment. The early part of the season was comparatively dry; but within the last six weeks, rain has fallen, in such quantities, as to have precisely adapted itself to the favorable growth of the plant. Corn in this valley may be considered as its great staple production; and every failure to raise, even, an average crop would be sensibly felt; as it would curtail the annual quantity of beef and pork sent out it. We have resided here for 24 years, and we have no recollection to have witness such a failure. Indeed, it may be set down as one of the peculiar characteristics of this great valley, that the husbandman, is just assure of being rewarded with an abundant crop, if he direct his industry faithfully to that object, as he is certain that moral honesty will be duly recompensed. Here, we have always, in their appropriate season, seed time and harvest—blessed with the early and the latter rain. For which as accountable beings we should be thankful.

Boston, July 31.

From Gibraltar.—We are indebted to Mr. Topliff of Merchants' Hall for a loan of the Gibraltar Chronicle of June 10, received by the brig Gazelle at this port. The only items in the shape of news which they appear to contain, are in the following paragraphs.

In consequence of the failure of the negotiations which, for some time past, had been carrying on between the Moorish Government and the Austrian Commissioners mentioned in the Chronicle of the Chronicle of the 30th of March last, with a view to the adjustment of the differences that had arisen from the detention of an Austrian vessel by Moorish cruisers; Baron Bandiera, who

had proceeded to the coast of Larache with the two corvettes and the brig which compose the Austrian squadron, landed on the 2d inst. at noon, 135 of his men on the neck of which separates that town from the sea, and is commanded by the cannon of the fort. The detachment moved, without loss of time towards a spot where two Maroqueen brigs of war were moored, burned one to the water's edge, and left the other full of rocket holes. The object of the landing being thus accomplished, the detachment withdrew in the best order, although closely pressed upon by the Arabs who had come down in great numbers. During the three hours that this coup de main took up, the sea had risen considerably; and, the embarkation of the Austrians being rendered more difficult by this circumstance, they lost 22 men. The fire of one of their ships destroyed one of the enemy's batteries, and even did some damage to the town; but none was sustained by the squadron, although exposed, the whole time, to that of all the cannon of the fort.

The paper of the 9th says—"On the 4th inst. the Local Authorities of Cadiz gave notice, that, notwithstanding the freedom of the port, the payment of the subsidy of Commerce would, for the present, be enforced, as heretofore.

THE RICHES OF THE EARTH.—The Miner's Journal states that a vein of coal, supposed to be 29 feet thick, has recently been discovered on the Broad Mountain, near the head of the West Branch Rail Road and that there are evident traces of still large veins in the same vicinity. A vein 17½ feet in thickness, was also lately obtained on the route of the Schuylkill valley Rail Road.

From the Gazette de France.
Paris June 15.—The last letters from the Levant bring us certain news that the blockade of the Dardanelles has received Admiral Heyden, instead of revoking the declaration of Admiral Ricord, has fully confirmed it; on the other hand the Greeks, who have passed the Isthmus of Corinth, which was assigned as their boundaries, and now masters of Missolonghi and Lepanto, make every where declarations of blockade.

Accounts to the 4th of June, received in Paris from Madrid confirm the report of an approaching change in the ministry.

The man of war which is to convey the Ambassadors of England and France to Constantinople, did not leave the Bay of Naples till May 22d.

The *Messenger des Chambres* says, the latest accounts received at Odessa state that the Grand Vizier is concentrating all his forces at Shumla. There are no news from Varna, however, no military operations of importance could take place. The grass was but just springing up, so as to afford forage for the horses; and the cavalry and artillery cannot act till the ammunition and provisions can be conveyed.

There was another report current in London that Kean was dead. By the next packet we shall probably hear that he is playing somewhere with more ability and vigor than ever.

A paragraph, under date of Kilrush, June 13, states that Mr. O'Connell, coming from Kilgory to that place was met by throngs of people, the children of schools, &c. and that on reaching the main street, he found it so crowded that it was difficult to proceed. It was estimated that there were assembled together, when he commenced speaking, between 80,000 and 100,000 people. It is said that Lord James O'Brien will certainly oppose Mr. O'Connell.

Montpelier, Vt. July 7.

Capt. J. D. Granham, United States Topographical Engineer, and Lieut. A. D. Mackey, Lieut. E. French, and Lieut. Chase, are now on a survey for a canal route from this place to Connecticut river, through the valley of Wells river; and it is expected that they will likewise make a survey through the valley of Wait's river, in order to find the best water communication, between this place and Connecticut river, to unite with the New Hampshire canal, in the Oliverian valley, at Haverhill, New Hampshire. The object, we understand, is to ascertain the practicability of uniting the Northern and Western Lakes with the seaboard through Vermont and New Hampshire.

A letter from the Rio de la Plata, dated 12th May, 1829, has been seen by a correspondent of the New-York Courier, stating that affairs on board the Hudson frigate are in a terrible state, that armed sentinels with bayonets fixed are parading the ward room before the state rooms of two lieutenants, who are compelled to be content with playing ho-peep, through the small aperture of their state room doors. Sundry midshipmen are in confinement and it is expected all will be tried by court martial, the moment that the Boston and Vandalia arrive from their cruise.

FLORIDA TOBACCO.—It is found that Tobacco, of the quality and properties of that of Cuba, can be raised in abundance in East Florida. Much has already been produced.

An unfortunate circumstance occurred on board the Spanish line of battle ship *Soberano*, as she was getting under way with the fleet, at Havana, on the 4th instant. In heaving up the anchor, the captain suddenly gave way, and killed from 10 to 24 men.

A horse of one hundred and three years old is shown at Berlin. It belongs to a Polish merchant. This remarkable animal has always fed upon sugar, since it was 70 years old.

The Directors of the steam boat Chancellor Livingston, running from this city to Providence, have resolved to discountinue the custom of placing Spirituous Liquors on the table of their atern boat.—*Dai. Adv.*

Malt Liquors a preventive of Fever.
It is a curious fact, and one which is worthy of investigation by medical men, that persons who are in the habit of drinking largely of malt liquors are rarely known to be seized with the typhus, or other low fevers, whatever other effect these liquors may have upon the constitution. In corroboration of this fact, we have been assured by those whose opportunities for observation have been extensive, that there is not an instance known of a brewer's servant being entered as patient under these diseases, in any of the public hospitals. *York (England) Courant.*

ALL FOR REFORM.
At an election held in Boston Township, in this County, on the 6th instant, JAMES BROWN of countertent notoriety, a thorough going Jacksonian, was elected a Justice of the Peace.—There were two other candidates, men of respectability; yet it appears that Mr. "Cashier" Brown was the choice of a majority of the "people," as he received 32 votes out of 63, the whole number polled.

We learn that a petition has been forwarded to the Post Master General, by the friends of "reform," praying for the appointment of this same notorious James Brown, as Post Master at Brandy-Wine Mills, in place to George Y. Wallace, Esq. the present incumbent, who stands charged with the enormous crime of having supported Mr. Adams for President.

QUEBEC, July 23.
It appears by the Mercury of Tuesday that the American gentleman who was arrested after some conversation with a sentry near the Chateau garden was not discharged, but is under recognition to appear in September, and has petitioned the Governor to be enlarged. The whole affair was silly enough and not deservins of the notice taking of it.

The *Majestic*, from Belfast, has arrived, after some weeks passage, with 350 settl'rs. As there are reports in circulation that the fever to a considerable extent existed on board, we have made enquiry, and find that two groggy persons died on the passage; but that they Here ordinary cases, and that there is not the slightest cause for alarm. One or two cases of inflammation have been admitted into the emigrant Hospital from this vessel, but they are not of any consequence. One of the remaining children infected with small pox is dead, the other doing well.
