Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana, in General Assembly convened, That in all clases where oaths are required by law to be taken in courts of probates, the same may be administered by the judge, the clerk of the court of probates, or his deputy clerks, and in the parish of Orleans, by the judge of the court of probates, or by the register of wills, or any of his deputice; and all caths of tutors, cuarators, appraises, and other oaths of office required by law, shall be recorded in a bound book, kept for that purpose.

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, &c., That in the parish of Orleans, it shall saffice in all cases and to all legal intents and purposes, that the pablic notices and advertisements which the law requires to be given-by the court of probates, be published in both languages French and English, in two of the newspapers printed in New-Orleans, all laws to the contrary notwithstanding.

Sec. 3. Be it further enacted, &c., That it shall be the duty of said clerks of courts of probates, and of the register of wills, of the parish of Orleans, to record in a bound book all bonds, particularly those given by tutors, administrators of successions, and curators; and for such recording of any bond, there shall be allowed fifty center.
