THE VETO.

We give President Tyler credit for decent English in his veto remarks on the Veto; but a second proposal induces us to extract even this negative merit.

What does his advocacy mean by such language as these? "To execute the office of President," — "The highest moral and religious obligation of the nation and the Constitution." — This is plain gibberish.

Perhaps, however, Mr. T. may not object to the expression "to execute the office of President." — "Execute indeed!" A more wifely act of bethety than his has committed could not have disgraced the town executioner. He has exacted the office with a vengeance.

As for the high religious and moral obligations of the constitution, we suppose the phrase must be construed as a broad and striking image, in which the constitution is the metaphor called Protagoras, is personified as a moving and acting being having a conscience and bound by religious and moral obligations. This is a novel figure of speech, and one of which all others is most likely to occur to, and we can hardly be expected to suffer from it.
