# **JTF-GTMO Detainee Assessment**

# 1. (S//NF) Personal Information:

- 2. (U//FOUO) Health: Detainee is in overall fair health.

## 3. (U) JTF-GTMO Assessment:

- **a.** (**S**) **Recommendation:** JTF-GTMO recommends this detainee for Continued Detention Under DoD Control (CD). JTF-GTMO previously recommended detainee for Transfer Out of DoD Control (TRO) on 23 May 2007.
- **b.** (S//NF) Executive Summary: Detainee is assessed to be an Islamic extremist and an al-Qaida fighter. Detainee acknowledged accepting recruitment and facilitation from assessed al-Qaida commander Abd al-Salam al-Hadrami. Al-Hadrami provided detainee with a ticket, money and contact information for travel to Afghanistan (AF) to receive militant training at the al-Faruq Training Camp. Although detainee claimed he did not receive any training in Afghanistan, he acknowledged he was armed and present during hostilities against US and Coalition forces in Usama Bin Laden's (UBL) Tora Bora Mountain complex during which he was injured. Detainee's name is listed on several al-Qaida affiliated documents including

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one recovered from the computer of senior al-Qaida member Khalid Shaykh Muhammad, aka (KSM), ISN US9KU-010024DP (KU-10024). JTF-GTMO determined this detainee to be:

- A **MEDIUM** risk, as he may pose a threat to the US, its interests, and allies
- A **LOW** threat from a detention perspective
- Of **MEDIUM** intelligence value

# c. (S//NF) Summary of Changes:

- Upgraded recommendation from TRO to CD based upon analysis of his role as an al-Qaida fighter in Afghanistan, circumstances of his capture and his willingness to withhold information of intelligence value
- Added identification of detainee's commanders in Tora Bora
- Provided additional information on the Abd al-Aziz Center
- Corrected detainee's current last name to al-Dini<sup>1</sup>
- Removed the alias Muhammad Said Salem al-Dayi<sup>2</sup>
- Updated detainee's capture information
- Updated Evaluation of Detainee's Account

# 4. (U) Detainee's Account of Events:

The following section is based, unless otherwise indicated, on detainee's own account. These statements are included without consideration of veracity, accuracy, or reliability.

- **a.** (S//NF) **Prior History:** Detainee completed only six years of primary education in al-Mukalla, YM. Detainee dropped out of school to support his family when his father died. Subsequently, detainee worked in a camera shop, as a taxi driver, and as a mechanic. Detainee is married and has three children.
- **b.** (S//NF) Recruitment and Travel: In 2001, Salman, <sup>7</sup> a 30 year-old Yemeni, recruited Muslims to travel and attend military training in Afghanistan in order to return and fight with

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the Palestinians against Israel. Salman provided detainee with an airplane ticket and approximately \$500 US for travel expenses to Afghanistan. Salman also gave detainee a telephone number for Abu Muhjin, a Yemeni contact in Karachi, Pakistan (PK). In August 2001, detainee traveled from Sanaa, YM to Karachi, where Abu Muhjin met detainee. Detainee spent the night at the Dubai Hotel, and traveled the next day with Abu Muhjin to the Daftar Taliban Guesthouse in Quetta, PK where detainee met an individual named Abu Haytham, who was responsible for the Arab Room.

c. (S//NF) Training and Activities: Detainee traveled to Kandahar, AF by car and stayed for a month along with other Yemenis and Saudis at an Arab guesthouse run by Abu Zubayr, located near the al-Faruq Training Camp. However, on his first day in Kandahar, detainee reportedly fell ill with malaria and was unable to attend training at al-Faruq. In October 2001, all the Arabs in Kandahar were told to go to Jalalabad, AF due to the bombing of Kandahar. Detainee fled to Jalalabad, where he stayed one month at a Taliban safe house run by Abu Jihad. Detainee did nothing but sit around while at this safe house. Detainee fled to the Tora Bora Mountains for one month. He later returned to Jalalabad for five days due to frostbite, and then returned back to Tora Bora. Upon detainee's return to Tora Bora, Abd al-Qadus directed him to the position he would occupy. Detainee was issued an AK-47 assault rifle and assigned to a 10-12 man group of Arabs led by Zubayd and Juhaynah (assessed to be Shakir Abd al-Rahim Muhammad Aamer, ISN US9SA-000239DP (SA-239)), who communicated by radio with Abd al-Qadus. The weapons at detainee's fighting

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position included rocket-propelled grenades (RPGs), AK-47s, and anti-aircraft guns. <sup>18</sup> The members of the group received no advanced warning of bombing, but ran into caves whenever they saw or heard bombing in the distance. Detainee was at this position for one month before he was knocked unconscious and his leg was broken in several places. <sup>19</sup>

# 5. (U) Capture Information:

a. (S//NF) Khalid Qasim, ISN US9YM-000242DP (YM-242), reported Pashtun tribesman captured detainee, YM-242, and Yasin Qassem Muhammad Ismail, ISN US9YM-000522DP (YM-522), together in Tora Bora in December 2001. Both detainee and YM-522 were injured in Tora Bora, and the Afghans transported them to Jalalabad where detainee stayed in a hospital for approximately two months. <sup>20</sup> The timing and account of his injuries and detention coincide with the first attempt by al-Qaida forces to escape from Tora Bora. UBL appointed military commander in Tora Bora, Ali Muhammad Abdul Aziz al-Fakhri, aka (Ibn al-Shaykh al-Libi), ISN US9LY-000212DP (LY-212), attempted to arrange a cease-fire with anti-Taliban forces approximately 13 December 2001 in order to secure safe passage for the fighters to their embassies in Pakistan. Following failed negotiations with anti-Taliban Afghan commanders, LY-212 arranged for Afghan guides to lead a large group of fighters out of Tora Bora into Pakistan to escape. The group of about 60-70 fighters departed, and that night the group was attacked from the air. The guide and many others were killed or wounded; detainee was probably wounded during this attack. The survivors straggled back and LY-212 instructed those who could travel unaided to follow him to Pakistan, the wounded who could walk were directed to seek help with local villagers or enemy forces. Detainee was captured in Tora Bora approximately 15 December 2001.<sup>21</sup> Detainee was transferred by US forces to a prison in Kabul, AF, then to another detention facility in Kandahar, <sup>22</sup> and processed by US forces on 14 February 2002. <sup>23</sup>

- c. (S) Transferred to JTF-GTMO: 15 February 2002
- **d. (S//NF) Reasons for Transfer to JTF-GTMO:** To provide information on the following:
  - Al-Qaida and Taliban members
  - Taliban safe houses and al-Qaida training camps
- **6. (S//NF) Evaluation of Detainee's Account:** Detainee's account is only partially truthful and detainee is withholding extensive details. While detainee has identified key facilities and locations, and the ranking individual associated with them, he has omitted disclosing information about other individuals with whom he associated in Afghanistan. Detainee acknowledged serving under Abd al-Qadus in Tora Bora, but has not identified others who occupied the fighting position with him. Detainee also uses well known counter interrogation techniques to avoid answering questions. These range from simply refusing to make any statement, to feigning medical issues and demanding treatment before he will provide information. Detainee was wounded and declared he would not talk unless he received treatment, although all detainees are given a medical examination and quality medical treatment upon arrival if needed and continuing care during their detention at JTF-GTMO. Despite his demand for medical treatment, detainee has refused medications and medical treatment on occasion and over the last five years detainee was witnessed exercising, running, climbing a fence and kicking a soccer ball with his injured leg. Detainee is currently uncooperative indicating continuing support to extremism.

# 7. (U) Detainee Threat:

**a. (S) Assessment:** Detainee is assessed to be a **MEDIUM** risk, as he may pose a threat to the US, its interests, and allies.

**b.** (S//NF) Reasons for Continued Detention: Detainee is assessed to be an Islamic extremist and al-Qaida fighter. Detainee was recruited and facilitated through the al-Qaida network and traveled to Afghanistan for militant training. Detainee's name is listed on al-

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Qaida affiliated documents and he acknowledged occupying al-Qaida facilities. Detainee participated in hostilities against US and Coalition forces in Tora Bora.

- (S//NF) Detainee is assessed to be an Islamic extremist who accepted recruitment from an assessed al-Qaida commander and was facilitated through the al-Qaida network. Detainee's name is listed on al-Qaida affiliated documents.
  - o (S//NF) Detainee acknowledged accepting recruitment from an assessed al-Qaida commander for training in Afghanistan. Detainee stated Salman recruited Muslims to travel and attend military training in Afghanistan in order to return and fight with the Palestinians against Israel. Salman provided detainee with an airplane ticket and approximately \$500 US for travel expenses to Afghanistan. Salman also gave detainee a telephone number for Abu Muhjin in Karachi. 27
    - (S//NF) Analyst Note: Salman is assessed to be Abd al-Salam al-Hadrami, aka (Muammar Said Abbud Dayan), a known al-Qaida recruiter and facilitator in Yemen. Al-Hadrami was also a unit commander in UBL's 55th Arab Brigade.<sup>28</sup>)
  - o (S//NF) Detainee was facilitated through the al-Qaida network. Detainee traveled from Sanaa to Karachi, where Abu Muhjin met detainee. Detainee spent the night at the Dubai Hotel, and traveled the next day with Abu Muhjin to the Daftar Taliban Guesthouse in Quetta, PK where detainee met an individual named Abu Haytham, who was responsible for the Arab Room. <sup>29</sup>
    - (S//NF) Analyst Note: Abu Muhjin is probably deceased al-Qaida member and facilitator Abu Muhjin al-Taifi. The Daftar Taliban Guesthouse was a known transit point for al-Qaida recruits en route to Afghanistan. The Sadar Bazaar is an area known for al-Qaida transient berthing. Numerous detainees used one of several hotels in this area including the Dubai, Mustafa, and Embassy hotels during their travel to Afghanistan. At least one of the 11 September 2001 hijackers used hotels in this area approximately four months before the attacks. Abu Haytham is possibly senior al-Qaida facilitator, Sharqawi Abdu Ali al-Hajj, aka (Riyadh the Facilitator), aka (Haytham), ISN PK9YM-001457DP.
  - (S//NF) Detainee's name and alias were found on al-Qaida associated documents.
    (S//NF) A variant of detainee's name and alias, Omar Saeed al-Deen, aka
    (Abd al-Rahman al-Hadrami), was found on a list of 324 names recovered in the

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> raid of a safe house associated with al-Qaida in Karachi. Next to his name was the comment detainee had possession of a Yemeni passport.<sup>31</sup>

- (S//NF) Analyst Note: This list identifies guesthouse residents and the contents of their trust accounts. Such lists are indicative of an individual's residence within al-Qaida, Taliban, and other extremist guesthouses, often for the purpose of training or coordination prior to travel to the front lines or abroad. Trust accounts, also referred to as safety boxes or safety deposit boxes, were simple storage compartments such as envelopes or folders that guesthouse administrators used to secure the individual's personal valuables, such as passports and plane tickets. These items were entrusted to the guesthouse until completion of training or other activity.)<sup>32</sup>
- (S//NF) Detainee acknowledged staying in the guesthouse operated by Abu Zubayr near the al-Qaida al-Faruq Training Camp in Kandahar. 33 (Analyst Note: Abu Zubayr was al-Qaida operative Abu Zubayr al-Haili. Al-Haili operated the al-Nibras Guesthouse in Kandahar.<sup>34</sup> This guesthouse served as an in processing point for trainees going to and coming from the al-Faruq Training Camp. 35)
- (S//NF) Detainee stayed at the Najm al-Jihad Guesthouse operated by Abu Jihad in Jalalabad. 36 (Analyst Note: Adel Bin Muhammad Abbess Ouerghi, ISN US9TS-000502DP (TS-502), reported this guesthouse was an al-Qaida facility owned by UBL.<sup>37</sup> UBL reportedly visited the guesthouse in November 2001.<sup>38</sup>)
- (S//NF) A variation to detainee's alias, Abu Abd al-Rahman al-Hadrami, was found on separate lists of names of captured militants. One list was found on a computer hard drive belonging to senior al-Qaida operational planner KU- $10024^{39}$
- (S//NF) Detainee is assessed to be an al-Qaida fighter who acknowledged participating in hostilities against US and Coalition forces in Tora Bora.

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- $\circ$  (S//NF) Detainee acknowledged traveling to the Tora Bora Mountain complex during Operation Enduring Freedom where he stayed for two months. <sup>40</sup>
- o (S//NF) Detainee acknowledged al-Qaida commander Abd al-Qadus directed him to his fighting position in Tora Bora where he was placed under the command of Zubayd and SA-239.<sup>41</sup> (Analyst Note: Abd al-Qadus was Abd al-Qadus al-Bahraini, the commander at al-Faruq Training Camp. Abd al-Qadus served as a senior commander in Tora Bora when al-Qaida abandoned al-Faruq in preparation for US retaliatory strikes.<sup>42</sup> SA-239 was also part of the al-Faruq staff as a trainer, prior to serving as a sub-commander in Tora Bora.<sup>43</sup> Detainee was possibly attending training at the time al-Faruq was abandoned.)
- o (S//NF) Detainee acknowledged Zubayd issued detainee with an AK-47 in Tora Bora. <sup>44</sup> YM-242 and YM-522 were also present with detainee in Tora Bora. YM-242 reported he met detainee and YM-522 in Tora Bora and was arrested with them. <sup>45</sup> YM-242 stated when detainee was wounded, detainee knew he was going to the hospital and feared the Afghans would take his money, so detainee gave \$300 US to YM-242 and \$200 US to YM-522. <sup>46</sup> YM-242 also stated detainee was part of his camp, the Abd al-Aziz Center, in Tora Bora. <sup>47</sup> (Analyst Note: YM-242 reported UBL visited the Abd al-Aziz Center, assuring the fighters "that everything will be okay." Detainee may have occupied multiple positions in Tora Bora.)
- o (S//NF) Detainee acknowledged his fighting position in Tora Bora was equipped with RPGs, AK-47s, and anti-aircraft guns. <sup>49</sup> Detainee stated he saw and heard bombing from his position and is assessed to have been injured due to US bombing of the al-Qaida forces. <sup>50</sup>
- **c.** (S//NF) **Detainee's Conduct:** Detainee is assessed as a **LOW** threat from a detention perspective. His overall behavior has been compliant and rarely hostile to the guard force and staff. Detainee currently has 27 Reports of Disciplinary Infraction listed in DIMS with the most recent occurring on 11 May 2008, when he was in possession of a small white piece of plastic that had sharp corners. He has two Reports of Disciplinary Infraction for assault

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with the most recent occurring on 12 May 2006, when he threw a pair of shoes at a guard. Other incidents for which he has been disciplined include failure to follow guard instructions and camp rules, unauthorized communications, damage to government property, assaults, and possession of food and non-weapon type contraband. In 2007, he had a total of two Reports of Disciplinary Infraction and two so far in 2008.

# 8. (U) Detainee Intelligence Value Assessment:

- **a.** (S) Assessment: Detainee is assessed to be of MEDIUM intelligence value. Detainee's most recent interrogation session occurred on 10 December 2007.
- **b.** (S//NF) Placement and Access: Detainee stayed at guesthouses in Kandahar and Jalalabad, and supported the hostilities in Tora Bora. Detainee was also assigned to the Abd al-Aziz Center in Tora Bora, and served under the leadership of known al-Qaeda members YM-242, SA-239, Zubayd, and Abd al-Qadus. No reporting indicates detainee served in a leadership or operational planning capacity.
- **c.** (S//NF) Intelligence Assessment: Detainee can provide dated information on recruiters, facilitators, guesthouse managers, and Tora Bora leadership. Other JTF-GTMO detainees have provided such information, and further reporting by detainee would probably be of little tactical or strategic value.

# d. (S//NF) Areas of Potential Exploitation:

- Zubayr and Najim al-Jihad Guesthouses and personnel
- Tora Bora leadership and weaponry
- Terrorist/foreign fighters-movement and logistics
- Terrorist recruitment of juveniles (levied HUMINT collection requirement)
- Terrorist operational activities, extremists, and facilitation efforts based in Yemen
