**PANORAMA**  
DE PARIS.

Une grande peinture panoramique de la  
ville de Paris est maintenant ouverte au  
public dans la place du cirque.  
La vue est prise du haut de toit de la  
partie méridionale des Tuileries; sa consé-  
quence le spectateur doit se figurer qu'il  
est placé dans cette situation élevée qui  
domine toute partie considérable de la  
capitale.

Immédiatement sous les yeux du spec-  
tateur, vers le nord, sont les combles des  
appartements du Roi, et sur la droite la  
vaste galerie des tableaux se prolonge à  
Paris jusqu'au Louvre. Cette galerie borne  
la place du Carrousel vers le sud et la  
petite galerie vers le nord. Au milieu  
de cette place, s'élève l'arc de triomphe;  
c'est là que Napoléon avait coutume  
de passer en revue ses légions avant leur  
départ pour leurs immortelles campagnes.  
Et cette enceinte à mille fois retentit de  
la musique guerrière. Du côté occidental  
du palais, le spectateur plane sur le jar-  
din des Tuileries, et au delà, dans le loin-  
tain il aperçoit le palais du garde-meuble  
et les Champs Elysees.

**CONGRESS.**  
The Third Bill is now before the  
House.—An amendment offered by  
Judge Clark to increase the duty on  
cotton bagging to 1-2 cents, and an-  
other amendment to increase the duty on  
sugar to 30 cents, were adopted in  
committee of the whole. All amend-  
ments for the protection of the manu-  
facturer of wool were rejected.

From the N. Y. American.  
Extract of a letter from an American  
now in Europe, to his friend in this  
city, dated December, 1827.  
"In the progress of a month we shall  
be anxiously looking for the Message  
of the President, at the opening of the  
session of Congress.

Every year this document excites  
more and more interest upon this side  
of the Atlantic, where the friends of  
freedom welcome it as a renewed proof,  
that men conscious capable of self-govern-  
ment. Americans abroad perceive it  
with a mixed feeling of gratification and  
pique,—gratification at the prosperity  
of the nation which it annually devel-  
opes;—pique, that our Chief Magis-  
trate, can produce a State paper so cre-  
ditable to the literary character of our  
country; for heretofore these messages  
had done honor to the republic of let-  
ters. What would be their character  
if we were to place a Soldier of Fortune  
at the head of the nation, it is not diffi-  
cult to divine. Whilst mentioning this  
subject, I cannot refrain from observing,  
that the disposition which a portion of  
our countrymen have evinced to place  
Gen. Jackson at the head of the nation,  
has alarmed the friends of freedom  
throughout all Europe.

Since the General returned to  
Congress, at the last election, as one of  
the candidates for the Presidency I have  
travelled upwards of two thousand  
miles upon the continent, and have not  
conversed with a single individual upon  
the subject of our country who has not  
expressed surprise, that with all his  
power and influence, Gen. Cass to Is-  
rael, we should be about to commit  
political suicide. This you may easily  
perceive; but so certain as the  
precedent be once established, that  
military service, alone, can give a man  
a claim to the highest civil honours, so  
certain must our constitution perish.

The great experiment of self govern-  
ment we have fairly tested for upwards  
of half a century, and we have clearly  
proved that the wisest and the happiest  
of all governments, as a government of  
laws. You would be surprised to find  
how many friends we have upon this  
side of the Atlantic, even under the  
most despotic government. In fact,  
nearly all men of education, with the  
exception of the nobility, (and even man-  
y of them,) take a deep interest in our  
prosperity.

They know the moral influence which  
our government has upon all nations.  
They see that our example has already  
called into existence seven independent  
nations in our own hemisphere, and if  
we only remain faithful to the cause of  
freedom, that we shall eventually be the  
means of redeeming the world from  
bondage. But the character of Gen.  
Jackson is as well known in Europe, as  
at home; and the efforts made to place  
him at the head of the nation, have  
alarmed the friends of freedom in this  
quarter of the world.

The great error into which some of  
our countrymen appear to have fallen,  
is, that the office of President of the U-  
nited States was instituted as a reward  
for public service.  
This is a great error. The office of  
President of the United States, is a  
high public trust, created by the people  
in their sovereign capacity, for the pur-  
pose of authorizing him, to hold it  
to represent the nation in its inter-  
course with foreign powers. To appoint  
and commission the civil and military  
authorities; To see that the constitu-  
tion and laws be faithfully obeyed. It  
is therefore, self evident, that the indi-  
vidual upon whom these high trusts  
may devolve, ought to have a thorough  
knowledge of the constitution and laws  
—a sound judgment, and talents of the  
first order.

Our present chief magistrate is known  
throughout Europe, as a statesman, ci-  
vilian, and scholar, and it is wholly in-  
comprehensible to the people here, that  
we should wish to exchange him for an  
individual, whose principal merit con-  
sists in having conquered one victory.  
If victories alone can constitute a claim  
to the Presidency, certainly our Naval  
Heroes have an undoubted right to that  
honor; and we may trust them with  
safety, for history furnishes no record  
of the liberties of a country being sub-  
verted by an Admiral or a Commodore.  
I hope however, that the good sense of  
the people will soon overcome this mi-  
litary mania.

May God preserve our country from  
military idolatry, which in every age,  
and in every nation has heretofore pro-  
ved the grave of Freedom."

The remains of the late President  
John Adams, and of his wife, have been  
removed from the family tomb, and de-  
posited under a new steeple Church in  
Quincy. A marble monument is to be  
erected over them in the interior of the  
Church.

Ship Isabella, Libby, from N. Orleans  
for Havre, put into Charleston 18th ult.  
in distress, lately.

From the N. Y. Journal of Commerce.  
On Friday last a young gentleman,  
eighteen years of age, left his friends in  
Boston, taking with him money to the  
amount of 700 dollars. On investigat-  
ing the affair it was discovered that he  
had absconded in company with a cele-  
brated cyprian who is known as Miss  
Barrett, but whose real name is Curtis.  
It appeared also that this girl had acted  
the part of a Millwood, and seduced the  
unfortunate young man from his paren-  
tal roof, by her fascination of manner  
and heartless affection. They were  
traced to this city and were seen in the  
evening in the third tier of the Park  
Theatre, and this morning it was discov-  
ered that they had taken up their resi-  
dence in an establishment in Church st.  
The officers having pursued them, ar-  
rived just in time to be too late, for the  
parties had a very few minutes previous  
left to embark on board the steam boat  
for Philadelphia; they immediately  
went to the slip and were fortunate en-  
ough to meet with the objects of their  
search. The young man was brought  
to the police and committed to Bridg-  
well, until his friends in Boston had an  
opportunity of shipping him on a voy-  
age likely to wean his attachment and  
improve his morals. Miss Barrett was  
brought up in the afternoon, and we un-  
derstand from the evidence adduced,  
the magistrate (Alderman Valentine)  
intends to send her to the Penitentiary  
for 6 months.

The Dog.—Leonard Zolnikoff, a  
Swiss Nobleman, who went to Paris on  
the conclusion of the Swiss Union as  
ambassador, had a large dog, whom on  
his departure he had ordered to be shut  
up for eight days, the dog was so, and  
and yet at the end of eight days traced  
his way to Paris, (400 miles,) and on  
the day of audience made his way, all  
covered with mud, and leaped up mad  
for joy, upon his master. In the family  
castle, at Thuringa, there is a painting  
of the story.—The dog is the only ani-  
mal that dreams; he and the elephant  
the only animals that understand looks:  
the dog is the only animal that has been  
brought to speak. Leibnitz bears wit-  
ness in his History of the Academy of  
Sciences at Paris, to a hound in Saxony  
that he could speak distinctly thirty

**King Charles First**

A letter written by King Charles First  
to the Duke of Buckingham, dated  
Oaking, the 7th of August, 1636.  
"SIR,—I have received your let-  
ter by Dic Grenc; this is my answer—  
I command you to send all the French  
away (his Queen's train of French ser-  
vants) tomorrow out of the town, if  
you can by fair means, (but sticks not  
loop in disparting,) otherwise force them  
away like so many wild beasts, until  
ye have shipped them, and so the Devil  
go with them. Lett me hears no an-  
swer but of the performance of my  
command.  
"So I rest your faithful, constant,  
loving friend,  
CHARLES R."

ham.
