As a testimonial of respect for the late and much lamented PETER DEMBIGNY, Governor and Commander in Chief of the State of Louisiana, all the Officers of the Militia throughout the State, will wear craps at the left arm for the space of one month, and the colors of the seral corps shall be dressed in mourning for the space of three months.

From Liverpool—DIRECT.—The ship Perfect, Captain PRINCE, from Liverpool, which port she left on the 21st August, arrived in the offing yesterday, and her Letter-bag was brought up to town last evening.

Mr. HUSKISSON, M. P. for Liverpool, had recently paid a visit to that place—he was received with great enthusiasm by his constituents, and many public demonstrations of respect and confidence were extended to him.

The late French papers contain a Circular addressed by M. DE LA BOURDONNAYE, the new Minister of the Interior, to the Prefects of Departments, in which he remarks that "it is the firm will of the KING to maintain the public liberties."

Every body thinks that the Austrian and English influence are to be recognized in the creation of the Polignac and Bourmont Administration. The choice of the men, the course that things must take under such men, have appeared to be sufficient indications of the part the Cabinets of Vienna and London have taken in this ministerial revolution.

It is asserted that the Duke of Wellington and Prince Metternich, alarmed at the progress of the Russian armies, and at the irresolution display by the Turkish troops, proposed to the Cabinet of the Tuileries, about three months ago, a triple alliance, of which the principal conditions would be—

1. England, on her part would employ all the disposable naval force in the Mediterranean and the Black Sea, to destroy the squadrons of Ricord and Hevden, and the maritime establishments of the Russians.

2. France on her part, was to place at the disposition of England an expedition of 30,000 men, to be landed upon the coast of the Gulf of Saros, to succour Constantinople or to attack the Russians, as circumstances may require. These troops to be increased in number according to the difficulties and exigencies of the climate.

3. Austria on her part, would send to the frontiers of France a body of troops, in order to keep parties in respect during the absence of our troops. The Austrian force would not enter the kingdom unless the Government thought it advisable, and that a popular movement appeared inevitable.

There is something so anti-national in a project of this description, that its author had the prudence, it is added, to conceal the knowledge of it from the last Ministry. The negotiations are said to have been conducted with the greatest secrecy by Prince de Polignac, and M. Portalis alone was let into the secret.

to be expected from those who are at the head of affairs? The previous conduct proves that they do not dread for their country either civil war or foreign invasion.

Meanwhile the reports in question gain ground, and already the Duke of Ragusa is designated for the command of the expedition.

The reports we give have circulated in places where the information is generally so good, that we have thought it our duty to publish them. We shall have rendered a service to the country and to the Minister, even should we have merely furnished him with an opportunity of giving some explanations relative to the projects attributed to him, and which do not want the appearance of truth.

One of the latest Paris papers, says we may expect to receive very shortly the news of peace with Algiers being concluded.

Very late from the Pacific.—The ship Orbit, Fish, arrived at this port yesterday in the remarkably short passage of 55 days from Valparaiso bringing our advices from that quarter to the 18th July. The leading item of intelligence is the occurrence of a REVOLUTION IN PERU effected by the party friendly to Bolivar.

Delaware and Chesapeake Canal.—This work is now completed. Passengers through the Canal arrive in superior barges. Travellers which leave New-York for Philadelphia at 6 o'clock A. M. in the steam boat Citizen of the Despatch Line, can proceed on at half past 6, following morning, in the Canal Line for Baltimore, affording a complete water conveyance from Philadelphia to Baltimore.

Eggs.—A French paper, the Journal des Connaissances Usuelles, gives a recipe for the preservation of eggs. They should be placed in a vessel containing some water, with as much lime as can be held in solution, and a little salt. Experiments are said to have been made, by which it is shown that eggs may be preserved in this manner for an almost incredible length of time, and when taken out will be as fresh and of as good flavor as if they had been only kept for two or three days.
