



Londres 1.º de Agosto.
Una carta de la Habana dice que habrán dos expediciones para Méjico, la primera se compondrá de la mitad de las fuerzas de mar y de tierra disponibles.

El gabinete español está dividido en dos partidos, uno enteramente opuesto a la expedición, á cuya cabeza se encuentra el Sr. O'Calla. El Rey está á la cabeza del otro. El general Barradas tiene órdenes cerradas que las abrirá en alta mar, y entonces sabrá con certeza el punto de su desembarco. Campeche, instruido de las intenciones de la España, había reunido diez mil hombres, cuatro mil permanecen todavía en sus posiciones: los seis mil restantes se han retirado á lo interior hasta nueva orden.

Madrid 31 de Julio.
El Sr. Tavira oficial mayor en el ministerio de negocios extranjeros, sale mañana para Roma: lleva el Sr. Labrador, nuestro embajador cerca de S. S. los poderes necesarios para trasladarse á Nápoles, y pedir según la etiqueta la mano de la Princesa Cristina para nuestro soberano. El Sr. Tavira debe acompañar al Sr. Labrador en calidad de secretario en esta misión extraordinaria. El Duque de Calabria representará al Rey en la ceremonia del casamiento.

Los últimos oficios recibidos del comandante general de la Habana, inspiran tan poca confianza en los talentos del general Barradas, que el gobierno estaba dispuesto á quitarle el mando de la expedición.

Se asegura que al momento de la salida de esta expedición, el capitán general de la isla de Cuba ha reunido una junta de oficiales generales, que ha resuelto poner á la cabeza de la expedición, el mariscal de campo D. José María Cabezon.

Constitucional 19 de Agosto.

Madrid 23 de Julio.
Un correo de gabinete que ha llegado de Nápoles ha traído el consentimiento de la Princesa Cristina para el matrimonio proyectado con nuestro soberano. Igualmente la sanción dada para este casamiento por SS. MM. el rey y la reina de Nápoles.

Al día siguiente el rey anunció á las personas de servicio su casamiento con la Princesa de Nápoles, Princesa, ha dicho S. M. joven, muy afable, bonita y de un carácter alegre, y que esperaba pasar días felices. En seguida volviendo el rey la cabeza á algunos de sus favoritos, añadió en voz baja algunas palabras, que se dice, hacían referencia á las opiniones políticas de la joven Princesa.

S. M. ha comunicado despues la misma noticia á los infantes de España, á los ministros, y en fin, á todos los personajes de la corte que fueron este día á palacio. El rey ha anunciado que la Princesa Cristina vendrá á Madrid acompañada de sus augustos padres el rey y la reina de Nápoles, y á demas cuarenta personajes de los mas distinguidos de su corte.

Gobierno del estado libre de S. Luis Potosi.
El gobernador del Estado usando de las facultades discretionales concedidas por el honorable congreso del mismo decreto.

Art. 1. Los bienes de todo español que venga en la expedición invasora, quedan confiscados y se aplican á los gastos de la guerra.

2. Los bienes de todo español que se halle fuera de la república, por su voluntad ó espulso, quedarán secuestrados, poniéndose en administración, de cuenta del Estado, bajo las prevenciones que se dirán.

3. Se impone obligación á todo individuo, para que dentro de tres dias de publicado este decreto, manifieste la clase de bienes que tenga en su poder pertenecientes á los españoles que se hallen fuera de la república, explicando los raices, muebles, derechos ó acciones.

4. No quedan excluidos del artículo anterior, los bienes y acciñes sean de la clase que luesen aunque tengan el carácter de cambio, permuta, venta con plazo, compañía, encomienda ó cantidad á réditos.

5. Toda persona que oculte, será castigada como auxiliadora indirecta del enemigo.

6. No se comprenden los bienes de españoles que han dejado muger ó hijos en la república.

7. La nota de bienes se presentará al administrador de la aduana de la cabecera de cada partido, y éste propondrá al tesoro general los administradores que juzgue convenientes. El tesoro nombrará los administradores con la aprobacion del gobierno.

8. Los productos ingresarán á la tesorería general, para que conforme á la clase, unos queden en depósito, y otros se declaren confiscados.

9. Se estrechará á que enteren en numerario todo lo de plazo cumplido, y se procederá á la venta de lo consumible exceptuando lo necesario para la agricultura, cria de ganados, y fomentos de giro de campo.

10. Se llevará una cuenta por separado de la administración y venta de los bienes contenidos en este decreto, la que con su informe pasará el tesoro á la contaduría general á que la gloce, y ésta al gobierno para su aprobacion.

SPAIN AND MEXICO.

Extract of a letter from an officer of the Hornet, to his friend in New-York.

"Tampico, September 1."

The invading army had little or no difficulty in taking possession of Old and New Tampico. After leaving a detachment of his army at both those places, Gen. Barradas proceeded to Altamira, a small town 5 or 6 leagues in the interior; here he remained quiet until the 20th, when the Mexicans arrived from Vera-Cruz under the valiant Gen. St. Anna, who caught the Spaniards napping, and without the loss of a single man took Old Tampico—he then embarked his men in canoes, crossed the river and commenced an attack on the new town—here the scene of action became general, both armies fighting to desperation until the next day at 11 o'clock, when the Spaniards ceased firing and hoisted the white flag—the firing now ceased, both parties having suffered greatly in killed and wounded. The Spaniards were about capitulating when Gen. Barradas arrived with 2000 of his army, and compelled Gen. St. Anna to retreat to old Tampico, and would have drove him still further had not a reinforcement of the Mexican army arrived to their relief. Gen. Barradas remaining in possession of the new town—General Santa Anna wrote to the Consuls of the different nations, informing them that he would grant to foreigners 6 days to remove their property, and after that time he should not respect the property of any nation. This army consists of 11,000 men, and I have not the least doubt but he will exterminate the Spanish army, which now consists of 3400 men, 500 of which are at present down with the fever prevalent in this country. We have succeeded in getting the property of our merchants in places of security, and are now only waiting for the grand attack, and before this reaches you I expect there will not be a Spaniard in the country.—Both Generals have shewed the greatest respect to the property of our citizens, and have promised to do all in their power to save it from the plunder of either party. General Santa Anna is a fine fellow, and as brave as Julius Cæsar, and is beloved by the Mexicans. During the fight on the 27th, a ball passed so near him as to cut the collar of his coat; he turned to one of his officers with a smile on his countenance saying that he should be compelled to purchase a new coat. After the fight was over, he was passing by Mr. Harrison's house, (an American merchant) and saw one of his soldiers lugging away a piece of cloth; he called and asked him from what place he got it; the soldier told him that he took it out of Mr. H's. store, when the General drew his sword and killed the soldier on the spot, and published to the rest of his army that he would serve them in a like manner, if he found them stealing?

Aug. 9th. at Praya Bay, the blockading squadron commenced bombarding at 8 o'clock A. M., and continued until 4 P. M. The firing was returned from the castle. They then commenced landing their troops in their boats, about 800, when Don Pedro's officers allowed them to form a line; they still kept landing. Don Pedro's officers, with 200 cavalry, attacked them and put them all to death. The boats returned to the shipping, at which the castle commenced firing, cut the vessels so much that they had to cut their cables, and put to sea in a very disabled state. Two hundred soldiers were killed on board and it was supposed they lost about 2000 men in all. Don Pedro's loss was trifling. The 74 had twenty shot holes through her and the frigate thirty, and were so crippled that they will be forced to go to Lisbon to repair.

Post Office.—The Letters by the Packet Ship Tennessee from New Orleans were put into the Post Office at Staten Island on Wednesday last (the ship arrived at 10 A. M.) and were received in this city at 10 A. M. on Tuesday, after having been first marked with 10 cents instead of 61 postage. Mr. Governor very properly remitted the Postage, but he could not remedy the delay, nor could he prevent the deposit of Letters at a way Post Office when they should have come to this city direct from the Packet by the hands of someone attached to the ship. While on this subject we are prompted to refer to the change of land postage on Letters from New Orleans to the Balize, when those Letters are for this city and ought not to be charged with any more than the usual Ship letter postage. The Government is at no expense in transmitting the letters by these packets, and the charge is therefore founded in equity. If the Letters actually went by land to the Balize, the charge would be correct, but we can see no reason for the tax when Letters are put into the bags at New Orleans.

The soldiers plundered the crew of all their clothing. They came home passengers in the Sicily, the captain and mate remaining with their vessels. Captain R. himself, in the Galata, of and from New-Belford, bound on a whaling voyage, was boarded, July 4th, by a brig of Don M's squadron, and afterwards boarded and taken by one of his frigates, and taken to St. Michael. The cargo was taken out, and the second mate and eleven men were thrown into prison.—On the 26th, the captain, second mate, and an English captain and men were going on board of the G. with his papers, to proceed on his voyage, when they got near the ship the soldiers hailed him to keep off. They laid on their oars, the soldiers fired three guns at them, one of the shots went through the boat, one thro' the English captain's thigh and one through the second mate's foot. Captain J. R. then went ashore and abandoned his ship. On the 27th the Portuguese took charge of her, and on the 29th sailed for Lisbon, with despatches. They put the crew, 12 in number, into prison, where they still remained when Captain Russell sailed. The American Consul had demanded them, but Don Miguel's officers would not give them up.
