From the Southern Galaxy, of Natchez.
STATISTICS.—We commenced, a few
 days since, the collection of such statisti
 cal information, as we thought might
 be useful or interesting to our readers.
 Our enquiries, thus far have been nec
 cessarily limited. Some of the facts
 that we have hastily collected, we now
 publish without comment, with the in
 tention hereafter of extending our en
 quires to every county in the state, the
 result of which we shall give publicity.
 We shall be obliged to persons, feeling
 an interest in the subject, who will
 afford us any facilities in the prosecu
 tion of our designs.

POPULATION.—In 1820 the popula
 tion of Adams county was 12,076.
 Judging by the increase of the popula
 tion of the city of Natchez for the last
 ten years, that of the county must now
 be estimated at about 16,000; two-fifths
 which are composed negroes.

NATCHEZ.—The population of this
 city, in 1810, was 1511. In 1820,
 2184. In 1826, 2500. If this increase
 of the given years be correct data, the
 population of the city at the present
 time is about 3000.

COMMERCE.—There have been ship
 ped from the Port of Natchez twenty
 nine thousand bales of cotton. The
 amount of imported merchandize has
 not been ascertained.

NAVIGATION.—The number of boats,
 entered at this port, during the past
 year, is eighty-six. The aggregate
 number of arrivals is five hundred and
 twenty-two. Of this number we be
 lieve ten or twelve boats have been
 lost. The number damaged is very
 numerous. There is little doubt but
 more accident have occurred during the
 past year, than any other, since the
 commencement of the steam navigation
 of the Mississippi.

HAGERSTOWN, (Md.) May 7.—Geo.
 Swearingen, lat. Sheriff of Washington
 Co. (arrested in New Orleans) arrived
 in one of the Baltimore stages on Mon
 day, in charge of Mr. Thompson, a
 constable Riggs, of Baltimore. Mr.
 Thompson was an executive messenger,
 authorized to deliver him to the
 Sheriff of Alleghany County. Swear
 ingen remained ironed and guarded at the
 Globe Tavern, from the time of the
 arrival of the Eastern until the departure
 of the Western stage, in one of which
 he was taken on. It is said he looks
 well and is in tolerably good spirits.
 He has engaged William Price and John
 McMahon, Esqrs. to defend him. It
 is yet uncertain whether he will be tried
 at a called court, or whether he will
 wait until the regular Fall Term, and it
 is equally uncertain whether he will
 stand his trial in Alleghany or remove it
 to Washington County.

CASE OF STEPHENSON.—Mr. Wil
 son, the gentleman who was dispatched
 to this country with the necessary docu
 ments for the arrest of Rowland
 Stephenson, has received orders from
 the Commissioners of Bankruptcy in
 London not to pursue the fugitive any
 farther; they being convinced that he
 has no property with him. The 1000
 reward has been recalled, and all pro
 ceeds against him arrested, except those
 at the instance of the Ex-Sheriff Par
 kins. We understand that previous
 to Mr. W's return to England, it is his
 intention to visit the most interest
 ing portions of the Union. N. Y. pap

At the late term of the St Clair (Ala
 bama) Circuit Court, six Negroes were
 condemned to be hung for being con
 cerned in the murder of Major JAMES
 TAYLOR of that county. Three Indians
 were also sentenced to be whipped and
 branded for horse stealing.

GOLD.—It is stated in the Cheraw,
 (S. C.) "Radical" that at a boat launch
 in that place on the 2d inst. a solid lump
 of N. C. gold, moulded somewhat in the
 shape of a man, in an erect posture,
 was exhibited on the deck of the said
 boat, to the wisful eyes of large number
 of spectators. The rich mass is said to
 weigh one hundred and thirty eight
 pounds worth about thirty five thousand
 dollars! The whole was taken from a
 mine in Montgomery county, and the
 owner was several years in gathering
 the small particles of which the mass is
 composed.

New York, May 19.
 On Saturday last, the greater portion
 of the licenses for the sale of liquors
 expired, and we are pippy to know

that in several cases the Mayor refused
 to grant a renewal—it being shown that
 the applicants keep irregular or disorder
 ly houses. On the "Five Points,"
 some of the persons who were deprived
 of their licenses seem to have considered
 them an useless qualification and contin
 ued the sale of liquors in open defiance
 of the law. Three of the number
 were yesterday brought before the Po
 lice and ordered to find bail in the sum
 of 500 dollars each in default of which
 they were committed to prison.

[From the Buffalo Journal of May 14.]
Lake Erie Open.—Knowing the an
 xety of business men, generally, upon
 this subject, we hasten to say that the
 navigation between Buffalo and Detroit,
 and other western ports has commen
 ced.

The schooner Eagle, from Sandusky,
 yesterday made her way into our harbor,
 though with some difficulty; and this
 morning so little ice remained that the
 Pioneer steambot left port for Dunkirk,
 and soon after noon the William Penn
 sailed for Detroit. The quantity of ice
 now remaining is so small as to offer no
 obstruction, and even this little will
 probably all pass down the river in the
 course of the ensuing twenty four
 hours.

Boat from Albany are arriving in rap
 id succession, and their cargoes if des
 tined for the west, will be despatched
 immediately, as we have many vessels
 in port, that will delay sailing no
 longer than is necessary to receive on
 board.

OSWEGO CANAL.—We have had at
 length, says the Oswego Gazette of 23d
 instant, the pleasure of announcing that
 this canal is completed and is now in
 the full tide of successful navigation.
 Large quantities of merchandize have
 arrived in this place consigned to dif
 ferent ports on lake Ontario.

 Lord Nelson at Copenhagen, says
 General Stewart, "when he wrote the
 note to the Crown Prince of Denmark,
 proposing terms of arrangement. A
 cannon ball struck off the head of the boy
 who was crossing the cabin with a

 said his Lordship. I observed that I
 thought it might be very well sent as
 it was, for it would not be expected that
 the usual forms could be observed at
 such a moment—That is the very
 thing I would wish to avoid, Colonel,"

 manner of sending this note, it might
