CITY AND STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

Faculties for the evening schools were selected at a meeting of committees of the School Board Wednesday. It also was decided to close the schools on October 17, Women's Registration Day, so that every opportunity would be given women to register. The establishment of an evening school for foreign adults was authorized. This school will be open Monday, Wednesday and Friday evening, the same as the other evening schools, and will be conducted in the Normal School building, 1532 Calhoun street.

The Liberty bond campaign is making steady progress, it was announced Thursday, by the local committee through the amount of subscriptions to date has not been announced. Blanks for handling the subscriptions and other printing are being prepared.

As a result of developments Thursday, little doubt now remains that Wilson and Company will select New Orleans over Mobile for the parking of beef cattle imported from Latin America, with the probability of the ultimate erection of a plant to cost \$2,000,000 or more.

Henry Barker, 60 years old, employed by the Department of Public Works, died suddenly at 9 a. m. Wednesday while dressing to attend the funeral of his brother, Victor Barker, 58 years old. There were three Barker brothers, the eldest being only three years older than the youngest.

With a force of twenty-five trained men and additional experts from other sections of the country, J. Y. Fauntleroy, internal revenue collector for the Eastern District of Louisiana, inaugurated a systematic campaign throughout his district Thursday, with the object of ascertaining as nearly as possible the exact amount of taxable liquor and tobacco held in stock by manufacturers, jobbers wholesale and retail dealers.

The postponed meeting of the Federal Auxiliary to the Catholic Army Club will be held Monday October 8, at 4 p. m. Jesuits Alumni Hall, 140 Baronne street. All interested in the welfare of the soldiers at Camp Nicholls are invited to attend.

Five hundred negro laborers are needed for work in the aviation camp at Lake Charles, La. These

men will receive good pay and good treatment. The wages are \$2.75 a day for ten hours' work in loading and unloading cars, road construction and ditch digging.

While Mr. Hebert, of Oak Lawn, was in a tree gathering moss Thursday he was shot and killed by a hunter who mistook him for some wild animal. The hunter was some distance away and could only see something moving in the tree before he fired.

The First Baptist Church of Lake Charles which was to have been host to the 1000 delegates to the Louisiana state Baptist convention to assemble here October 20, 21, 22 and 23 has accepted the invitation of the First church of Shreveport to allow the convention to go to that city for this year in view of the crowded condition of homes and boarding houses, due to the presence in the city of several thousand men busy in the construction of the Lake Charles aviation camp.

Peter White, carpenter, living in Joliet, near Jeanette street, is near death in the Toussaint infirmary, as the result of a fall in which he received a fractured skull. He was at work on the second floor of the Tulane Newsroom building, and evidently mistook a plate-glass window between the ceiling of the first and second floors for solid wood.

As a result of the accident in which Johanna Beecher, a girl of seventeen, lost her life, action for \$20,000 damages was begun in the Civil District Court Friday against Frank C. Marshall and Company and Walter E. Hobson by the mother of the girl, Widow Carl Beecher.

Mrs. Nancy Bridges, aged 65, was arrested at Amite City and turned over to the federal authorities, for trial on a charge of trying to influence boys of her neighborhood not to respond to the selective draft call after they had received official notice to report for training at Camp Pike.

One of the first New Orleans physicians to enter service in France was Dr. Louis Genella, who has been for several months on the firing line. Dr. Genella was wounded slightly in a battle July 15, and again August 5, this time more seriously, and is at present convalescing from the effects.
