New Orleans will send 126 men from its thirteen districts to answer the call on Sept. 5 for five per cent of the men drafted for the National army.
Three of the negro soldiers who were concerned in the Houston riot are supposed to be hiding in western Louisiana. They were seen in the neighborhood of Sulphur Monday.
The North American Steamship Co. of New York will inaugurate a new freight and passenger steamship service the latter part of the week between New Orleans, Tampico and Vera Cruz when the steamer Yarmouth sails on the initial voyage. The company expects to maintain a fleet of five ships in the service.
For selling liquor to members of the Coast Artillery, Henry Biggio received a 90-day and Ed. Marrero a 45-day jail sentence in Federal court Tuesday.
Commissioner Stone has introduced before the commission council an ordinance prohibiting the parking of any kind of vehicle for more than one hour any where in the business section bounded by Rampart, Camp, Bienville and Howard avenue. The ordinance goes over for discussion.
Mrs. H. P. Terrebonne of 1817 North Roman street was overpowered and bound by a negro robber Tuesday afternoon who robbed her of a small amount of money.
Lightning struck Dr. L. M. Prody's home, 821 Broadway, during Tuesday's daily afternoon storm, doing \$20 damage.
The will of Christian Botte, filed Tuesday, leaves the bulk of his estate to a niece in Middlesand, Germany. The German Protestant home for the aged and the First Evangelical church are to receive \$2,000 each.
Mrs. Augusta Reith has sued Robert L. Marx for \$20,000 damages. The suit arises from the killing of her seven year old daughter by Marx's auto in Napoleon avenue. The petition charges the auto was running

down the wrong side of the street at a rate of 30 miles an hour.
Projects were made at the school board meeting Tuesday night against the conversion of McDonough school No. 13, at Rampart and Girod into a school for negroes. Those protesting stated that the adjacent population is 90 per cent white and that the neighborhood is steadily improving.
R. L. Yarnado of Kentwood, a special I. C. officer, was found lying in Poeydras street at Locust Tuesday night with a bullet through his thigh. Yarnado and his companion were lazy as to how the shot was fired, but it appears to have been accidental. The wound is serious.

Over Mount Etna.
The astronomical observatory at Mount Etna, which is 9,000 feet above sea level, has no protection by lightning conductors. The observatory is near the summit of the volcano, and the stream of vapor constantly rising from the crater acts as a natural conductor, draining the electricity out of the clouds, so that lightning is seldom seen there.
