NOTICIA EXTRAORDINARIA DEL GOBIERNO.
Agosto 6 de 1829.
Por el correo de Méjico, llegado esta tarde ha recibido S. E. el gobernador la noticia oficial de que el día 23 de julio se movieron por Nuzco nueve embarcaciones, y el 24 otra, que todas caminaban con dirección á Acapulco, á donde el patriotismo y denodado valor de los mejicanos del Sur se disponía á castigar esa nueva invasión española.

Vera Cruz 15 de Agosto.
Por el bongo S. Cayetano que llegó ayer de Tuzpam, se han recibido cartas que alcanzan hasta el 13 del corriente; y de ellas extractamos lo siguiente:

En los días 11 y 12 llegaron las tropas de Méjico, y el día 13 salió parte de ellas para Méjico; y para el 14 es de esperar que del resto de la división quedará en el punto, con el general Santa-Anna.

Méjico 7 de agosto.—En la sesión de ayer se presentó el siguiente proyecto de ley, y nos apresuramos á imprimirlo para que se vea en toda la república la opinion dominante de la cámara de diputados.

PROYECTO DE LEY.
Art. 1.º Se faculta al gobierno para que por el término de cinco meses pueda obrar extraordinariamente en todo lo que pertenezca á los ramos de hacienda y guerra, siempre que lo crea necesario para la conservación de la independencia y federación mejicana.

2.º Dado este decreto se cerrarán inmediatamente las actuales sesiones extraordinarias.—Méjico 5 de agosto de 1829.—Aguilera.—Isidoro Reyes.—Amache.—Manuel Garcia de Tato.—Palomino.—Solana.—José Ignacio Basadre.—Isidro Gondra.—Romulo del Valle.—Manuel Primo Tapia.

Méjico, 8 de Agosto.
En la sesión del día 5 se leyó y pasó á la comision de guerra de toda preferencia un proyecto de decreto, presentado á la cámara por el Sr. Casares y suscrita por los Sres. Reyes, Duque y Ulloa; cuyo contenido es el que sigue:

Art. 1.º Todos los españoles ó extranjeros de cualquiera clase ó condicion que sean, y fuesen aprendidos con las armas en la mano en el territorio de la república, por cualquiera de los gefes de nuestras divisiones de operaciones contra el ejército invasor, serán irremisiblemente fusilados en el mismo punto de su aprension, sin dárseles mas tiempo que el muy preciso para proporcionarles los auxilios espirituales, si se pudiere.

2.º Solo serán exceptuados de lo dispuesto en el artículo antecedente, los que voluntariamente se presenten ó entreguen á las filas del ejército nacional, en que tal caso serán considerados y tratados como prisioneros de guerra, recomenándose á su favor los principios de la mas generosa humanidad, siempre que no pertenezcan á los capitulados en la última guerra de la independencia.

3.º Cualquiera de los antiguos capitulados, sea de la clase que fuere, que viniendo incorporados al ejército invasor ó que hayandose en la república, se le incorporase despues de su desembarco en ella y fuere ya aprendido con las armas en la mano, ó ya que se presente ó entregue voluntariamente, será fusilado segun se proviene en el artículo 1.º sin otro requisito, en el segundo caso, que el de la identificacion de su persona y la de haberse asegurado el gefe á quien sea presentado bajo su responsabilidad, que perteneció á los capitulados en la última guerra de la independencia.

4.º Lo dispositivo de los artículos 1.º y 3.º comprenderá absolutamente á cualquiera español de los avecidados ó residentes en el territorio de la república, ó á cualquiera mejicano por nacimiento que conspire contra la independencia, tomando parte en las filas del enemigo.

Admiral Laborde will leave this place to-morrow, with the battallion of La Corona. Those troops will embark on board of the two transports which will be towed from the Balize up to the English Turn.

It appears from the report which was given to us, on board of the Hercules, respecting the departure of the expedition of general Santa-Anna was erroneous, at least so far as regards the means of transportation. The Louisiana Advertiser has published that the expedition had departed in four american merchant vessels, and one government schooner. We have the proof of this fact. The following is extracted from the Censor of the 14th. of August.

Port of Vera-Cruz, Office of the Captain of the Port.
Aug. 11. Entered, the american brig Splendid, capt. Aaron White, having carried the troops of the division under the orders of his Excellency the general commander in chief Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna.

The american hermaphrodite brig William, capt. John Stughes, also on his return voyage for the same object. The american hermaphrodite brig Ursula, capt. Mayo, also on his return voyage for the same object.

General Santa-Anna having been informed that the Spanish squadron had landed the troops at Cabo-Rojo, immediately gave orders that the Mexican troops should march against the enemy. On the 3d and 4th August the infantry were embarked on board of the following American vessels: brig Splendid, capt. White, hermaphrodite brig William, capt. Stughes, and hermaphrodite brig Ursula, capt. Mayo. There was another transport and a Mexican schooner of war in which Santa-Anna went.

The cavalry took their march along-side of the coast on the 4th. Information was received that the governor of San-Luis had ordered 800 men of cavalry and 2000 of infantry to march on Tampico, and they were expected at Valle-del-Maiz on the 4th.

A contribution of 20,000 dollars was raised by order of Santa-Anna, on the inhabitants of Vera-Cruz, to meet the expense of this expedition.

The Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Méjico has made a donation of ten thousand dollars to the Mexican nation to support war.

Vera-Cruz, August 15.
By the sloop San Gayetano, which arrived here yesterday from Tuzpam, we have received letters of the 13th instant, from which we extract the following:

"On the 11th and 12th the national troops, which left this place, arrived at Tuzpam; on the 13th a part of the division marched against Tampico; and on the 14th the rest of the division were ready to march to the same place with general Santa-Anna. (Censor)"

Méjico, August 8.
This day has been rejected in the house of representatives, by a majority of twenty three votes against nineteen, the proposition to engage the government to EXPELL Mr. POINSETT from the Republic: will the presence of this man be of more interest than the harmony between the mexicans for which object an extraordinary session has been convoked? Washington! rise from thy tomb, and present to the twenty three of the opposition, thy written maxims:—how ominous is foreign influence to every free system, particularly the republican. (Elsal.)

ANOTHER SPANISH EXPEDITION AGAINST MEXICO, BY THE SOUTH SEA.

Puebla, August 6.—By the Mexico mail arrived this afternoon, his Exc. the governor has received official news that on the 23d of July, nine vessels were seen off Nuzco, and on the 24th they were directing their route for Acapulco. The Mexicans of the south whose valor and patriotism are well known held themselves in readiness to chastise these new spanish invaders.

New York, August 12.
SEVEN DAYS LATTER FROM EUROPE.

By the packet ship Manchester, Captain SKERVAL, from Liverpool, whence she sailed on the 1st ult. we have received Liverpool papers and letters of the above date, and London papers of the 30th June.

The French and English ambassadors have returned to Constantinople. The most important intelligence is an account of a severe engagement between the Russians and Turks, before

Schoomla, in which the former were victorious.

Paris papers contain a telegraphic despatch from Toulon, announcing the arrival of Marshal Maison at that port. A private letter from that city, dated the 17th, mentions, on the authority of a vessel which had arrived the day before from blockading squadron before Algiers, that an English vessel had brought on order from the Sultan to the Regency, to conclude an immediate peace with France, and that the Regency was determined to obey the mandate.

It must be regarded as a proof of the desire of the Porte to propitiate France as well as England, that she has used all her influence with the Dey of Algiers, to induce him to give the satisfaction which France requires.

Lisbon Gazettes, to the 29th June, state, that the expedition against Terceira sailed on the evening of the 16th. One of the vessels, however, was obliged to put back on the 19th, having lost its mainmast on the day of sailing.

Tiflis, May 8 (20)

The following report has been received from Prince Rebutow, Commander in the Pachalik, addressed to the Count Paskewitsch:—Achmed Pacha, of Aschar, and Cutschuk Pacha, who had collected a corps of 5000 men, entered the Sandiakale of Pozshow, and fortified themselves near the village of Zurykabi. Immediately on the receipt of this news, Col. Burzow, who, with his detachment, was at Azihour, marched against the enemy, and totally defeated them on the 1st of May. They were compelled to fly with precipitation to Schawskit and the Turks having made an obstinate resistance, their loss was considerable; 50 prisoners were taken when the despatch was sent off, and the detachment sent in pursuit of the enemy continually brought in more.

The following is a translation of the abstract with which we have been favored by our Correspondent at Caracas, of the manifest of the members of the new Congress, from the Province of Caracas mentioned in our paper of yesterday.

1.º Whereas the instability of our institutions proceeds from the weakness of the political constitution of the Republic, and whereas from particular circumstances it is often necessary to invest the officers of Government with extraordinary powers, the Government should be clothed with all the vigor and energy necessary to sustain the constitution and the laws without the slightest alteration—preserving the popular representative form of Government.

2.º Whereas the shortness of the periods for which the high officers of the State are elected, has produced a vacillation in the nature of the laws; a want of system in legislation, an induced inattention on the part of the officers in the perfection of useful regulations—their terms of service should be prolonged.

3.º Whereas it is manifest that the liberty of the Press is one of the strongest safeguards of representative government and as, in order to enjoy its benefits, it is necessary that it should be devoted to the advancement of objects important to the commonwealth—its liberty ought to be secured as an inviolable right; in all cases, however subjects to be governed by certain regulations—in order that it may never degenerate into an instrument of abuse or be made to serve the purposes of party.

4.º In order to facilitate the immigration of foreigners in a manner calculated to improve our population and with them to advance agriculture, commerce and the arts, means ought to be adopted to encourage their settlement in the country without any restriction on account of their religious creed.

5.º Provides that the income of the Government shall be under the sole charge of the administration, who shall make provision for all the expenses of the nation without the imposition of burdensome taxes.

6.º Provides for the security of person and property and the mode of punishing violations of the Constitution and Laws."

The Tariff.—The following paragraph, which we copy from the Free Trade Advocate, shows strongly, but with a degree of mournful correctness, which cannot be refuted, a part of the intricate complication of evils in which this country is doomed to be involved, unless the cause shall be speedily removed.

The American System in Mexico.—Under this head we published in our last paper, the recent decree of the government of that country, shewing the march of mind amongst a class of people, who have not only imitated our form of government, but even our policy. If the other Spanish American states should prove as apt schoolers as our near neighbors, our statesmen will before long have the glorious satisfaction of seeing the "American System" adopted throughout the western continent, accompanied, as it will undoubtedly

be, by the total annihilation of our commerce with the inhabitants of the vast and fertile regions which compose it. This decree is to go into operation on the 22d of November next, and as flour was prohibited by former decrees, we shall, after that date, have scarcely occasion to load a vessel in a year. Even our usual supplies of specie must be cut off, for, if the Mexicana will take neither our agricultural nor manufacturing productions, in exchange for the productions of their mines, how can we become possessed of it?

Ingenious Invention.—We have seen an operation of a simple and valuable piece of mechanism, invented by Messrs. Job White and Phineas P. Quimby of this town, for sawing "vennering" (of any thickness) from logs of all sizes and lengths.—The vennering, taken off by the saw, is as smooth as it could be made by the smoothing plane, and requires scarcely any preparation for immediate use. Messrs. White and Quimby have been long engaged in perfecting this machine, and have had it for some months in operation. It resembles, in some respects, "Barnard's veneer cutter" (the principles of which Messrs White & Quimby suppose were taken from them.)—but our ingenious fellow townsmen have introduced some additional improvements. At present we are unable to do justice to their ingenuity and trust, that they will hereafter receive it in a more substantial form. They have taken measures to secure a patent.—Belfast Me. Farmer.
