United States Daily Mail Line from New Orleans to Mobile. The United States Daily Mail Line, established by the United States Government, for the purpose of carrying the mail from New Orleans to Mobile, has been authorized to operate. The line will consist of the steamship "United States," which will sail from New Orleans on the 10th of April, and will arrive at Mobile on the 15th of April.

Bank & Company's Notices. NEW ORLEANS AND CARROLLTON RAIL ROAD. The New Orleans and Carrollton Rail Road, which was chartered in 1834, has now been authorized to operate. The road will consist of a line of 10 miles, from New Orleans to Carrollton, and will be operated by the New Orleans and Carrollton Rail Road Company.

John is about 25 years of age, and is of a dark complexion. He is wearing a blue coat and a pair of brown trousers.
