THE RUSSIAN REVOLUTION

Many people do not correctly gauge the world importance of the revolution in Russia, looking upon it as a sort of side development of the war.

The revolution is not the outgrowth of the war, although its development has been hastened by war events.

For most persons the most important new information from the book will be that the Duma was not in active charge of the revolution.

The Duma represented the conservative element in the country. But it could not endure the mismanagement and treason of the czar's government.

But under the stress of privations growing out of the war, and the deliberate failure of the government to meet the situation, a general strike began with rioting.

It will be recalled that when the first news of the revolution was published to the world it was announced that a regency would be established with a grand duke in charge.

This provisional government included the two discordant elements—the radical representatives of the council which had actually accomplished the revolution.

GOTHAM'S RAPID TRANSIT MARVEL

New York, June 15. Twelve tracks on five different levels and half of them underground on three different levels, is the transit marvel now nearing completion at Borough Hall, Brooklyn.

The whole complicated structure amounts to a skyscraper seven stories in height, but buried in the earth except the top third or so.

Over the street run the four tracks of the Brooklyn elevated. On the street level are two busy trolley tracks and an immense wagon and motor car traffic.

Beneath the street is the usual maze of water, electric, gas, telephone and sewer conduits, and right below will pass the swift Manhattan-bound trains of the new Interborough lines.
