Causes for the late legislative session.

Our file of the London Globe and Traveller, up to the 29th of April, came to hand yesterday.

In the absence of any thing of greater interest, we lay the French journals under contribution for a publicistic article.

The trial of Colonel Taylor, upon the charge of having counterfeited the bills of the bank of the United States.

The bill for the final adjustment of land claims in the south eastern district of Louisiana, has passed its third reading in the senate.

On the 23rd ultimo, one hundred shares of the New Orleans Canal and Banking Company were sold at the New York exchange for 110.

The body of an infant and the head of a man about 25 years of age, were discovered in a bale of hay that was discharged from the ship Apollo from Portsmouth.

The New York papers characterize the news by the late arrivals from Europe as altogether unimportant.

But aside from these considerations, which alone may change the whole policy of the French government, it is evident from the accounts that a powerful party is already organized.

Our mind, we repeat, these rumors of war—taken in connection with the sudden augmentation of the Austrian army—the rapid march of military transports—the flight of Adige—Mantua, &c. put upon the war footing—65,000 men.

Among the acts from Washington, is a scuffle between Mr. Plummer of Mississippi, and Mr. Blaine of Maine.

By schooner Pelicano which arrived in this port yesterday from Vera Cruz via Tampico, we have received, by the compliance of the captain, the Tampico Gazette of the 22nd ultimo.

The number of acts among the ministerial army at the time of its precipitate flight was 600, and many of the soldiers who were converted, were unable to endure the fatigues and starvation.

At Puerto Nacional more than 100 persons have died, and the military has been there in order to expedite the march to Jalapa.

Mr. City's report on the subject of the disposition of the public lands is highly interesting.

It is a fact that the price has risen. In some quantities have been in market.

The report shows conclusively, we think, that the sale of the lands cannot be considered as the disposition of a tax.

The reduction of the price is not necessary to accelerate the settlement and population of the states within which they are situated.

At the close of the year 1830, there were 1,000,000 inhabitants in the United States.

The aggregate population of the United States, exclusive of the territories, increased from the year 1830, to 1836, from 9,070,878 to 12,716,097.

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By voluntary compact between the new states respectively, and the general government, the public lands, included within their limits, are appropriated for internal improvements.

The tendency of such an appropriation will be not only to benefit those states, but to enhance the value of the public lands.

The second question discussed in the report is, the expediency of ceding the public lands to the several states in which they are situated.

It has been a position, that cessions to these states would certainly be followed by similar cessions to other states.

There is no reason for this transfer, unless the new states can dispose of the lands to better advantage than the general government.

Such a transfer would establish a new and dangerous relation between the general government and the new states.

It would create between the distant states a common feeling, and a common interest distinct from that of the Union.
