The War.—We have been informed by a gentleman direct from the army, that the Indians have escaped from their supposed strong hold on the Withlacoochee, and have fied to the Yahoo awanip, which is said to be only eight miles distant from the former place, or have dispersed in small parties through the country. The army, on entering the enemy's camp, discovered signs of fifty Indians, who, however, also escaped. An old superanuated negro, who was unable to fice, was captured. He sated that the enemy had taken reluge in the Yahoo awanip, and were determined to fight to the last.

General Call was with the Tennessee Brigade, at the Cove, on the Withiucoochee, but was expecting to march on the 15th inst. in pursuit of the enemy—It was his intention, we learn, to proceed immediately to the Yahoo awanip, where it is hoped he may yet fall in with the main hody of the Indians.

General Jessup arrived at Tampa on the 18th inst. and will immediately assume the command. What may be the result of the present campaign, is yet a matter of doubt. Let us not despair.
