MANILLA.-Capt. Kotzeube, the Russian navigator, in an account of his Voyage round the World, recently published, gives the following account of the notive products and commercia commodities, of the capital of the Philipine isl-

"The whole world, (says Capt. Kotzebue, does not afford a more advantageous station for commerce than the town of Manilla, situated as it is in the neighborhood of the richest countries of Asia, and almost midway between Europe and America. Spanish jealousy had formerly closed her port; but since the revolt of the American colonies, it has been open to all nations, and the Philipines are consequently rising rapidly to importance. As yet, their export trade has been chiefly confined to sugar and indigo for Europe. and the costly Indian bird's nest and trepangs for China. The latter is a kind of sea-snail withou a shell, which, not only here, but on the Lad rones, Carolinas, and Pelew Islands, even as far as New-Holland, is as eagerly sought after as the sea otter on the north west coast of America,-The luxurious Chinese consider them a powerful restorative of strength, and purchase them as such at an exorbitant price. But what an inexhaustable store of commercial articles might not these islands export! Coffee of the best quality. cocoa, and two sorts of cotton, the one remarkably fine, the produce of a shrub, the other of a tree, all grow wild here, and with very little cultivation might be made to yield a prodigious increase of wealth. These productions of nature are, however, so much neglected, that at present no regular trade is carried on in them. A great abundance of the finest sagu trees, and whole woods of cinnamon, grow wild and unnoticed in Lucon.
