New-Orleans, April 16th.

By the Correo we have received Mexican papers of the 2d April, from which we have made the following extracts:—

On the 22d February, His Excellency Mr. Poinsett, Minister from the United States of N. America, the present President of the Mexican Republic, the Minister of State, Bocanegra, the Governor of the State of Mexico, Zavala, the Deputies Condra, and Zerco, the Commissary Generals Valdes, and Yunceta, and a great number of citizens of the highest respectability assembled at Tacubaya for the purpose of celebrating the anniversary of the birth of the immortal Washington. The topics given on this occasion satisfactorily show the friendship existing between the citizens of the two Republics, and their common respect for the name of the great hero of the North American Republic.

On the 1st of April there arrived at Tampico de Tamaulipas, 800,000 dollars, and 19 lingots of silver, sent from Zacatecas. Not a single guard accompanied this caravan, which certainly proves the entire confidence that government places in the spirit of the people. Commerce becomes more active and the expectations of commercial men become every day more confirmed.

From Bell's Weekly Messenger, Feb. 1. The speech of the King of France, delivered to the Chambers on Thursday last, has had a very salutary effect in this country, and produced new confidence and strength in our public securities. We refer our readers to the speech itself, as one of the most able papers which we have lately read. As France is the nation with whom our political connection is of most importance, the tone and temper of that government are always to be anxiously regarded. We consider this speech of the King of France as an anticipation of what we may expect from the speech of our own King, so far as respects the political condition of Europe. When the French King tells us, that the relations between himself and foreign powers continue to be friendly, we may be assured that England participated in this state of foreign harmony. If France be quiet, England need seldom be uneasy. When we are informed, also, that the assurances of the allies of France offer a pledge that notwithstanding the events which have disrupted the East, peace will not be disturbed in the rest of Europe—when we are told by the King of France, that the fire, kindled in a remote part, will not spread to the centre of the Continent, we may reasonably expect that these words are deliberately spoken, and that Russia and the Porte will be compelled to submit to the mediation of the neighboring powers.

[From the Messenger des Chambres of Jan. 8.] "Duchesse, Jan. 8.—For some days past great movements have been observed among the Russian troops who are assembling on the Danube. The Turks have thrown considerable reinforcements into their fortresses, and appear disposed to commence operations against the two principalities.

"We hear of a letter from Tshagan Oglu to General Count Langeron, which formerly announces this intention, and it is said to have caused the assembling of the Russian forces. This letter is reported to be conceived in the following terms:—
"Sir—You have taken me from the time of my captivity; you must therefore know that my word is sacred; I inform you, that it is my intention to attack you, and to exterminate your troops, and with this view I shall penetrate at Tournaul, opposite Nicopol, at the head of 12,000 cavalry, to keep my word, and to clear the two principalities of the presence of your troops." "Count Langeron, who was formerly taken prisoner by the Turks, has had an opportunity of making himself acquainted with the character of Tshagan Oglu. Accordingly, as soon as he received this letter, he lost no time in taking all the necessary measures to resist the attack thus announced to him.

"In fact, a large body of the enemy's cavalry has arrived at Tournaul, and more are expected. The measures taken by the Russians leave no room for alarm, and commercial affairs go on as usual; nay, since the arrival of Russian

regiments within the last week from Volhynia and Wallachia, and since the garrison of Bucharest has been reinforced, business has become more active. The hardships caused by the war are counterbalanced by the sale of provisions and merchandise, by which the inhabitants gained considerably.

"The commissioners appointed to enquire into the abuses in execution of the contracts for the supply of the army, have terminated their labors, and Diebitsch is gone to St. Petersburg to lay their report before the Emperor. It is affirmed that many individuals employed in high offices connected with the army are implicated in this report."

The Frost.—At Paris the cold has been more intense than in London. The French papers mention, that on Thursday night and Friday morning the thermometer of Chevalier fell upwards of five degrees and a half below zero, which is equal to more than ten degrees of Fahrenheit below the freezing point.—London paper Jan. 24th.

[From the London Times of Jan. 24th.] The Amphitrite frigate had arrived at Toulon two days after the Galathee, and had brought a second detachment of several hundred men from the army in the Morca. According to letters from Navarin of the 27th ult. the evacuation of the Peninsula would be so complete, that in a few months a small number of the miners and engineers would be the only foreigners left, with the exception of the Philhellenes, in the immediate service of Greece. The fortresses were to be repaired and to be placed in the hands of the native troops, whose instruction and regulation (if the word may be allowed) had been resumed by Col. Fabvier, who has returned to his favorite duties with the same zeal as before, and better prospects of success. Lord Cochrane, on the contrary, had really retired from his command, and not having performed all that had been anticipated, had, in his arrangements with the Greek Government, consented to resign 20,000 sterling of the sum for which his services had been engaged, on condition of his being allowed to retain the title of Grand Admiral of Greece. His Lordship had reached Malta, and was expected at Paris, in eight or ten days.

(From the Quotidienne.) BELGRADE, Jan. 8.—The Turkish fortresses on the Danube have received considerable reinforcements. According to an authentic list, the garrison of Widin, was composed, prior to the 1st of December, of 15,000 infantry, 1,000 cavalry, and 1,200 artillerymen. Since this period, rations have been distributed for 20,000 infantry, 6,000 cavalry, and 1,200 artillerymen. Nicopol, which is only an open town with a castle, contained, on the 20th November, 6,000 infantry, 2,000 cavalry, and 400 artillery. Part of these troops came from the camp of Shumla, where the supplies of provisions were, from day to day, attended with more difficulty. Remondria contained, on the 15th Nov. 4,000 infantry, 600 cavalry, and has since the 1st of December, received an addition of 2,000 infantry. At Rudshuck, provisions were distributed for 16,000 infantry, 4,000 cavalry, and 2,000 artillerymen; and on the 8th of December, for 22,000 infantry, 6,000 cavalry, and 2,500 artillerymen. These latter reinforcements had come from the army on the Balkan. The state of the garrison of Sillistria is not known, because it is supplied with provisions by transports from the interior, whilst the other fortresses raise their provisions by the Danube. The troops are in pretty good condition, as far as Turkish troops can deserve this praise, and expect with anxiety the order for crossing the Danube, and for resuming offensive operations, to which they generally annex the idea of pillage. The Russians have likewise reinforced all their positions on the left bank of the Danube.

Accounts were received this morning from Terceira, stating the arrival of the first division of the Portuguese refugees at that island. The refugees have in many instances eluded the vigilance of ministers, engaging American vessels. The voyage being a legal one, the Yankee captains have engaged to deliver them safe at Terceira, with one exception, which they seem to treat as next to an impossibility, that an Englishship of war should interfere to prevent them, in which case they are prepared to haul down the American colors, and let their respective Governments settle the affair.
