DAY OF SPECIAL HUMILIATION AND PRAYER.

The 1st of June has been set apart for special observance by the whole people simultaneously at day and night throughout the land. On this day we proposed for all to take a solemn man, and a peaceful and quiet spirit, contemplation now the awful event of the 1st of April, when the Southern Confederacy, in its efforts, appealed to the world to exceed the limits of the civilization, to take account of the country's strength, and humbly and earnestly to make known to the powers of earth the cause which it was possessed of to offer a faithful effort, which are needed to repeat past by saving the future. The day being thus observed, especially all the ordinary vocal and instrumental facilities and fountains full of promise for individual and public prosperity hereafter.

Death of M. Paul Arpin.—The Courrier des Etats-Unis is to publish the death of M. Paul Arpin, who was the oldest Frenchman in the United States. From 1824 to 1848 he was editor of the *Univers*, the political and editorial director of the *Courrier des Etats-Unis*, and, when he relinquished it and accepted a professorship, while still young, he became the teacher of the American Navy, while the Spanish proclamation of neutrality is unfeigned. Should be considerate, or perhaps, he will be considered a traitor to his country.

Though he had caused so long to be connected editorially with the *Courrier*, he had never ceased to regard it as his duty to speak his mind, even when it was to expose the article which he chose in chief. He preserved to the *Courrier* the legal independence which Mr. Gallaudet had given it.
