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Women Come Into Own in Business Because of War

Washington, June 17.—There is one outgrowth of the war on which all observers of conditions in England and France agree—that through the war women have come into their own in the industrial and business world, and more than their own.

This phase of the war, and the part women may have to play in this country in the industrial and business life of the Nation, has impressed itself very strongly on the country yet.

But the real labor pinch isn't here yet, such as exists in England and France. It probably never will exist in the degree abroad, although the striking feature of the June report on industrial conditions is the country by the federal reserve bank board was scarcity of labor throughout the country, and the United States is just getting mobilized for war.

When the million young men are called to colors and withdrawn from the labor market, the government expects, in a modified degree at least, a repetition of the experiences of England and France. Women, while not called upon to replace men in the degree they have in Europe, will be used in forms of employment commonly regarded as "men's work" now.

The women's committee of the Council of Defense is already on the job. While it has many other functions, particularly enlisting the housewife in the food economy campaign, yet not a small part of its work is preparing for the entrance of women into many new fields of labor and employment.
