Prussians Crossing the Rhine Near Mulhausen.—It is reported from the frontier that the German army has crossed the Rhine at several points near Mulhausen, with the intention of invading France. The French army is reported to be in a position to meet them.

Proclamation by the Ministers.—The French ministers have issued a joint proclamation to the nation, declaring their loyalty to the Republic and their determination to defend the country against foreign aggression.

Letter of M. Guizot to an English Friend.—M. Guizot has written a letter to an English friend, in which he expresses his views on the current situation in France and the world.

Denial of McMahon's Death.—A rumor that McMahon had been killed in action has been denied by the French authorities.
