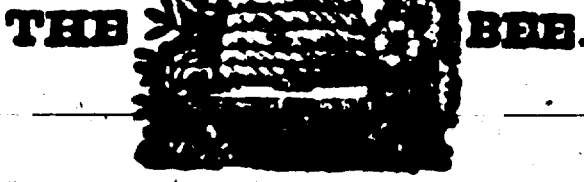

versions upon the learned and pious clergy of the Cathedral. Mr. Maubault solemnly swears that both of those statements are unfounded and unjust.

On the Sunday referred to, it is true that whilst he was in the pulpit and about to commence his sermon, he saw some young men, in his church, with their backs turned towards the altar. Now it was this position, and this position only, that led him, according to right and duty, to request them, not to order them, to abstain from standing with their backs towards the altar.

So far from his having ever uttered any injurious expressions against his most worthy coadjutors of the Cathedral, it has ever been his delight to do their pious labors justice; and sooner would he submit to the loss of speech than to employ it against them.

Mr. Maubault, a native of Ghent, came young to the United States; but not to young to bring with him strong and flattering recommendations. And since his residence among Americans, in different States, he has universally gained their good-will, by his practical piety, the liberality and tolerance of his principles, and the suavity and mildness of his disposition and manners.

Nothing indeed could be more satisfactory to me than the expressions in which your petition conveys your respect and attachment for the Rev. Mr. Maubault, and the dread of his being removed from your congregation. His exertions meet with universal approval.

Such is the man, and such is the priest, who, for politics representing a compliance with the rites and regulations of his church, his private satisfaction, is assailed with rancorous vituperation; and, on Sunday evening last, when returning home, from the faithful discharge of his pious duties, was for the same cause attacked with a cry, from a surrounding group, exhibiting swords half drawn from their canes.

UNITED MEXICAN STATES. Extract from a private letter addressed to the Editors. Mexico, February 25 1850.

I see in the President and the rest of the ministry but good intentions, but the Republic is reduced to the lowest stage of national weakness; it appears that the Mexicans want union, discipline and disinterestedness and more education.

What is now remarked in this Republic is the total disregard concerning for the future. It is said that the partisans of Guerrero are organizing themselves into bodies; if so, the evil will be great, for it is the signal of discord and despotism.

From the National Gazette. We give the following intelligence as authentic and important:

Extract of a letter dated Caracas Feb. 18, 1850. "Every thing goes on well. The whole of ancient Venezuela has declared against Bolivar. Maracaibo was the last, but she at length declared. There are upwards of 6000 troops on the Tachira, the divisionary line of Venezuela and Cundinamarca, under Medina and Masero—in Valencia there are already upwards of 4000, which, with 2000 more coming from Maturin, are to march immediately under Bermudez and Gomez. Pöha is appointed Minister of the Interior and Justice; Urbaneja of Foreign Affairs and Finance; and Soublette secretary of War and Marine; Santos Michelena is under Secretary of State; Lecuna, Intendant. Congress is to meet at Valencia on the 30th of April.

A letter from La Guayra, Jan. 31st.—Troops have been sent to the frontiers. Gen. Bermudez is on his way here with about 2,000 men, so that if Bolivar should arrive here, he will in all probability meet with a warm reception; and he is not likely to let the brightest gem (Venezuela) fall from his diadem, without a struggle. Yet should he arrive suddenly before the gates of Caracas, there are numbers who would hail him with joy; it is impossible to tell who are faithful and who are not. For I strongly suspected—is the affair of the separation, he has neither by word or deed committed himself in any way so as to offend Bolivar.
