MEMORANDUM FOR Commander, United States Southern Command, 3511 NW 91st Avenue, Miami, FL 33172.

SUBJECT: Transfer Recommendation for GTMO Detainee, Mohammed Saghir,  
ISN: US9PK-00143DP

1. (S) **Personal Information:** Mohammed Saghir is a Pakistani national born on 1 January 1952 in Kohestan, Pakistan. He is in good health.
2. (FOUO) **Detention Information:** Subject detainee worked as a farmer and missionary in his hometown. Detainee's missionary trip to Afghanistan with nine other missionaries was the first time he left Pakistan. After receiving his spouse's permission, detainee traveled with this group to several locations throughout Afghanistan where they planned to preach from two to four months. General Dostum's forces arrested detainee while he was fleeing Konduz toward Pakistan after the bombing campaign started. He was turned over to U.S. forces and later transported to Guantanamo Bay Naval Base, Cuba, arriving on 17 January 2002. The detainee was transferred to Guantanamo Bay detention facility based on his knowledge of General Dostum's treatment of captured personnel transported in metal containers from Konduz to Sherheghan, Afghanistan. The detainee was cooperative, but JTF 170 considers the information obtained from and about him as not valuable or tactically exploitable.
3. (S) **Assessment:** Based on current information, detainee ISN: US9PK-00143DP is assessed as not affiliated with Al Qaida, and as not being a Taliban leader. Moreover, based on the detainee folder, the knowledgeability brief (KB), and subsequent interrogations by JTF 170, the results of which are available on the JTF 170 detainee database, the detainee has no further intelligence value to the United States, and will not be seen for further intelligence purposes. Subject detainee has not expressed thoughts of violence, or made threats toward the U.S. or its allies during interrogations, or in the course of his detention. Based on all the above, detainee does not pose a future threat to the U.S. or U.S. interests.
4. (S) **Recommendation:** In view of the foregoing, I recommend subject detainee be considered for release or transfer to the control of another government. The government of
