WASHINGTON, April 14.

In the Senate yesterday, a resolution was offered by Mr. Hendricks, and agreed to, instructing the Committee on Roads and Canals to inquire into the expediency of making an appropriation to open a road in Arkansas.

In the House of Representatives several reports were made in private cases by the Committee military pensions;

and the Committee on Private Land Claims was discharged from the further consideration of John Laveak's case, which was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

WASHINGTON, April 13.

Nearly the whole of yesterday the Senate sat with closed doors, upon the nominations by the President, which have been so long suspended.

We observe that, at the Election in Massachusetts last week, Alexander H. Everett, our late Minister to Spain, was chosen a Senator in the State Legislature.

A branch of the United States Bank has been established at Burlington, Vt. of which Heman Allen, late minister to Chili, is appointed President.

The Dublin Evening Post contains the following account of Mr. O'Connell's maiden essay in the House of Commons, from a private letter, dated London, the day after the opening of Parliament.

'You will naturally desire to know the impression produced by Mr. O'Connell upon his Parliamentary debut. It was decidedly favorable. There was nothing particular in his speech, but it was delivered in a civil, cheerful, fair and easy manner, and plain Englishmen seemed to ask each other, 'Can this be the agitator of the Catholic Association?'

Arctic Expedition.—A Paris paper states that Captain Ross's expedition to the Arctic Pole has safely reached the 67th degree of north latitude. The steam boat has traversed the most dangerous seas of the globe.
