prived of its legitimate Sovereign, and under the despotic sway of an usurper.

The Emperor's reply was dignified and decisive.—He assured the deputation that he would consult the interests of the two nations, and not endanger their mutual independence, which he was fully determined to maintain. But "I have resolved to act in such a manner as to show the world my determination to fight for the rights of my daughter, your Queen, and to enter into no compromise with the usurper of the crown of Portugal."

It is supposed that his determination will be followed by an immediate declaration of war against Don Miguel.

Portugal.—Advice from Lisbon to the 8th instant, have been received. On that day, five officers were implicated in the designs of Moreira, in being Moreira himself, were hanged, and their heads afterwards exposed upon the gallows on pikes. Two other persons who were brought out of prison with them, were obliged to witness the execution of the five. One of these was a son of Moreira, a mere boy. They are to be sent to Africa in chains. The court sentenced these unfortunate to be transported for life; but their blood only would satisfy Don Miguel; and instead of using the prerogative of mercy, he insisted upon a sentence of death, and the Judges complied. More executions were expected both at Lisbon and Oporto. Teceira has been ordered to be blockaded; and on the 4th and 5th instant, troops were embarked at Lisbon to attempt its reduction. They were reviewed by Don Miguel, on the Quay of Balem. He rode on horseback.

The Lisbon Gazette of the 14th instant contains an edict of the Board of Trade, dated 27th ult., declaring the island of Terceira in a state of blockade, by the Diana frigate and Leal da Cunha corvette. Russia and Turkey.—The German papers announce the renewal of operation between the Russians and Turks. It is stated that the Grand Vizier arrived at Shumla the 6th Jan. and had collected about 30,000 men to attack Paravati. Several affairs of Posts had taken place. About 500 Turkish horses had surprised the post of Kolodjik, and the Russian patrols had fallen into their hands. Two Cossacks and a subaltern officer were killed, and the commander of the post and 32 cossacks are missing. The Turks afterwards retired to Shumla. At this the Russians have had the advantage, and we are informed in letters from the Russian head quarters that the Turk, in flotilla before Nicopolis, has been destroyed. The crews were surprised and put to the sword, and out of the thirty vessels and gun-boats which composed the flotilla, twenty-nine were burnt.

Resolved, That the President of the United States be respectfully requested to institute a special mission to the French Government, with the view of requiring a definitive answer to the claims of the citizens of the United States upon that country.

On motion of Mr. James B. Murray, the following gentlemen were appointed a committee to carry the foregoing resolution into effect, by preparing and forwarding a memorial to the President of the United States.

LATER FROM EUROPE.

New York, April 23.—By the George Canning, from Liverpool, we have learned from that place of the 24th March. Despatches received in London from Brazil, import the resolution of the Emperor to maintain the right of the young Queen to the crown of Portugal, against Don Miguel. As the King of England stated in his speech to Parliament that he meant to leave this question to the decision of the head of the house of Braganza, England may, perhaps, aid the Brazilian Empire in establishing Dona Maria on the throne.

We find, with regret, in the London Sphere, the following extract from a French paper :

Deplorable affairs have taken place in Port Mahon, between the sailors of the French corvette Pomone, and the brig Faune, on the evening of the 15th. M. Menard, mishapman of the Faune was cruelly assassinated at the gates of the town, by some American sailors.

The Paris Journal du Commerce of March 18, gives an extract of a letter from Marseilles, dated the 12th, which states that letters had been received from Alexandria, announcing that the Turco-Egyptian fleet had been destroyed by the Mameluke Admiral Heyden, in the Harbour of Suda at the Island of Candia. The French papers, however, doubt the story.

Letters from Alexandria of the 20th of Feb. state that the Porte had required of the Viceroy 24,000 men, and that probably Mehemet Ali, according to his custom, would send half that number.

London, March 23.

The French papers of Tuesday and Wednesday are nearly filled with the reports delivered by Messrs. Dupin and Sébastien, of the committees on the diplomatic and commercial laws, in the Chamber of Deputies on Thursday last.

We received last night Brussels papers to the 21st inst. It is said, in an article from the frontiers of Russia, that the Emperor will leave St. Petersburg on the 4th of May, N.S. that he is to be at Warsaw on the 14th, and that he is to have an interview with the king of Prussia on the Polish frontiers.

We received last night Lisbon papers to the 15th March. Don Miguel is continuing his measures of severity.

The last objects of his vengeance are certain Professors.

Despatches, dated the 6th of January were received this morning at the Foreign Office, from Lords Strangford and Ponsonby, at Rio Janeiro. They have brought the particulars of the audience granted to the Portuguese deputation by the Emperor of Brazil.

The Portuguese Deputation consisted of the Conde de Sabugal and Don Antônio de Magalhães, who were received by the Emperor of Brazil at a public audience on the last day of December. The Conde addressed a speech to his Imperial Majesty, depicting the wretched situation of the country, de-

manding Madam Labassé in promising a truly elegant and interesting amusement to those Ladies and Gentlemen who may honour her by their presence.
