NEW MINISTRY IN FRANCE.—By the annexed extracts from Paris papers of the 18th ult. which we find in this morning's Gazette, it would seem that Admiral de Rigny had in reality declined the office of Minister of Marine, and that the utmost discontent was prevailing with the new appointments.

The Journal des Debats of the 18th holds this strong language: The ministers continue their course amidst the maledictions of France and the felicitations of England. Repelled by Admiral de Rigny, and worthily reinforced by M. Mangin, they march, paving the way for illegal violences by prosecuting the press, and trying to debauch men of honor with pensions which are dug back in their faces.

The generous protector of the Greeks in the Levant—the saviour of the garrison of Athens—the victor of Navarino—could he consent the re-establishment of the censorship, and other arbitrary proceedings, with the man who signed the perfidious protocol of London; or with the other individual, who drew up the categories of 1815? Could he prop up with his glory the vacillating honor of M. de Bourmont, and the sinister insignificance of M. de Courvoisier? And mark this well, and see in it the incurable wound of the ministry: had M. de Rigny, in a vertige of ambition, or from a blind deference, which is not fidelity, accepted the alliance that was offered to him, he would have sacrificed himself, without benefiting the ministry—his glory would have been buried in his shame.

The Paris Globe, in concluding a long article on the new French Ministry, says: "The Ministry will pass away like a storm, which leaves after it the sky more pure and more brilliant. The authority of the laws, the resistance of opinion, and the mediocrity of the statesmen who form this Ministry, will cause its ruin before it has time to do any irreparable mischief. Much may be desired, much attempted, against a nation which appears weak because it is prudent; but nothing decisive can be done, nothing durable be accomplished.

The John Bull, of 23d, has a story of a letter from Mexico, which represents, that the American Minister, in that country, has offered, on behalf of the United States, to loan that Government between 10,000,000 and 12,000,000, for a term of years, taking Texas and the peninsula of California as security; and in case the money is not refunded at the expiration of that period, "the possession of those rich and extensive countries is to vest in the United States."

Under any other Administration than this which now governs these United States, there could be no hesitation in pronouncing this story to be wholly groundless. But as it is, this rumor from Mexico, by the way of England, taken in connexion with the supposed design of which some indications have lately leaked out here, to acquire Texas

Paper, published in Paris, says, "Resignations succeed each other with such rapidity that the boldest of the Ministers are in a state of consternation. Glory to the citizens who sacrifice personal interest to that of the public. Insulted national honor does not retrace its steps; it is already avenging itself by contempt."

LONDON, Aug 21.—We see by the Gazette de France, that the French Ministers have taken a step which refutes one of the worst calumnies launched against them—that they were determined to sacrifice public liberty and the charter to the interests of bigotry and the Jesuits. They have ordered a Parisian Journal, the Apostolique, to be prosecuted for having published, in their defence, an article ascribing the late change to the interposition of Providence, and saying that "Religion in tears, after 40 years persecution, claimed a new order of things, &c."

TOULON, Aug 12.—The Estafette schooner, arrived here this morning from Navarin. It is said to have brought very important despatches, which were immediately sent express to Paris.

VIENNA, Aug 9.—The mail from Constantinople of the 25th of July, which has just arrived here, brings word that the most unfavorable reports were in circulation there respecting the Turkish army in Asia. A great battle near Erzeroum was spoken of in which four Pashas, and 10000 Turks were made prisoners, and many cannon, with ammunition, &c. are said to have fallen into the hands of the Russians. As the date of this battle is not stated, it is not certain whether these are the same mentioned in the Russian Bulletin from Lillies, received here yesterday; or whether the report spread in Constantinople, according to which Erzeroum itself is said to have fallen into the hands of the Russians, refers to later events. Trebizond was bombarded on the sea side by a division of the Russian fleet. The fortress of Vaa, situated on the lake of the same name, is reported in Constantinople to have been delivered up to Russians, through the treachery of the schismatic Armenian.

It seems that at the time when the mail came away, the passage of the Russians over the Kametchik, and their appearance on the Balkan, were not known at Constantinople, or that the Porte had kept the news secret. The military preparations on the part of the Turks were going on with increased activity, and the Sultan had given orders to fortify without any loss of time, Adrianople, Kirk, Kilia, Sophia, and Nissa. The Porte had received intelligence that the Pacha of Scutari had arrived in the vicinity of Widdien with 20,000 Albanians. A Russian fleet of 16 sail had been cruising for some days off mouth of the Bosphorus.

The result of the Russian campaign against Turkey, is determined ere this—Constantinople is a Russian city, on the fleets of England and France have interfered for its protection, at the hazard of a general war in Europe. This seems to us the unavoidable inference from the last advices from the seat of war. For our own part we doubt the power of Nicolas, supposing him to be ever so well disposed for peace, to rest his armies when they shall once have descended from the summits of the Balkan into the plains of Roumelia. On the other hand, it seems to us equally clear, that England especially, and doubtless France and Austria, must oppose the overshadowing accession to the Russian Empire, which the expulsion of the Turks from Europe would afford.

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at any rate, is well calculated to arouse the interest of American politicians. We shall doubtless hear more of this.
