## LATE FROM EUROPE.

As we had surmised, the British barque LONDON Capt. The intelligence from Poland is still 'vague; the information of intestine discensions among the particles at Warsaw is not confirmed. On this head the Morning Herald of the 1st holds the following language: We received at a late hour last night, the Dutch papers dated yesterday Aug. 31st. This arrival we had expected with some impatience, as, from the critical position of the armies near Warsaw, we had hoped, but yet feared, that they would be the heralds of some conclusive and frightful intelly. he the heralds of some conclusive and frightful intelligence. probably rather assuring than otherwise.

The GLORE of the 2d asserts with confidence that the French ambassador, near the cabinet of St. Petersburgh, has received positive instruction from his government, to expostulate with the czar, and urge the necessity of the great Powers' interference in behalf of Poland, if the often proved moderation of the Emperor should not be manifested in the approaching issue of the sanguinary contest in Poland.
The more especially, as it might no longer be in the power of governments, that of France in particular, to oppose the wishes of their people; and they would then be compelled to afford effectual assistance to a generous people, engaged in a mortal strife brought about by a complication of crying

vrongs.

The English Cabinet also, is said to have intervened in behalf of the Poles; it is affirmed that it has caused a note to be transmitted through Lord Palmerston, in which the bases of the ratifications of 1814 are recapitulated, and the inviolability of the privileges, which they ensure to the Poles, is assumed as a principle.

This interference of France and England is said to have made a deep impression at St. Petersburgh, and excited the attention of all the diplomatists, who are of opinion that negociations may be enterd into respecting Polandas well as Belgium.
According to accounts of 20th August the Rus-

sian head-quarters were on that day still at Nadarzyn, to which place they had advanced on the 18th. A conference of the Ambassadors and Ministers of Russia, Austria, France, and Prussia, and Viscount Palmerston was held on the evening of the 1st September at the Foreign Office. The Russian and Austrian ministers extraordinary attended the con-ference, which lasted about three hours

France has proposed to the British government to France has proposed to the British government to garrison Antwerp, should they misteust her intention. The editors of the English papers seem to entertain no doubt of the honesty of the French ministry, and apprehend no sinister intention on the part of France, in the temporary retention of a portion of her troops in Belgium. The important question of hereditary peerage was not yet decided in the Chamber. "If England, France and America are firmly united, they may not only preserve liberty for themselves, but gradually extend its benefits to all countries in which its blessings are not enjoyed and it seems to us to be the duty or every good citizen to use all the means, in his power, to maintain the good understanding, which at present subsists between these great and rising countries." ## POLAND.

LONDON, Sept. 2d. A Rotterdam Paper received, contains an arti le dated Berlin, August 25, which reports some infavourable skirmishing on the part of the Poles, and the death in battle of some general officers. ## FRANCE.

LONDON, September 2. The Tribune Constitutionnelle, a new German paper, published in Bayaria, states that the Emperor of Austria has it in contemplation to

The counsel for the prisoner contended that the indictment cught to e auashed, in as much as the document produced in evidence was not a note purporting to be of the U. S. Bank, but of a mere thee , drawn by the President of the Branch Bank at Louisville, connersigned by the Unstaer voon the principal Cushier of the Bank residing in Pladelphia. It was agreed, however, that the case should be referred to the Jury, and the man was convicted. His counsel then gave notice that they would move for arrest of judgment-and the case lay over till the 28th ult. when as we learn by a letter published in the Globe of yesterday, the motion was made and the point argued and it was decided by the Court that the indictment had not been sustained, and the prisoner was liberated.
