COTTON CROP OF THE UNITED STATES. COTTON CROP OF THE UNITED STATES.

The production of Cotton has certainly been everrated, at the commencing of the season. Many were induced by the fine weather in the fall, to estimate the crop for this year at 1400,000 or 1800,000 bales. It was thought the Adantic States, and in fact all the Southern States, would produce beyond all former calculations. But these estimates had no better foundation than russors.

There is between a crop of 1250,000 bales and that for the next year approaching 1,500,000 bales so great a difference that it is utterly impossible to realise this increase, unless the number of hands are also increased in a ratio with the production. As this was not the


