Sixth-To enact all police regulations of a general nature, the operation of which shall be uniform in all parts of the city: Provided, however, That no appropriation of money can be made by the saidely council, and all reecipts and expenditures must be under the sole control of the councils of therespective manicisalities wherein they originate, or are required to be made. All incidental expenses, such as the salary of the mayor, and secretary of the general council, shall be paid by the moncipalities, pro rata with the tax on real estate, within their respective limits.
