—We are authorised to state that Mr. JOSEPH BARRABINO will be a candidate in the approaching election, for representing the 5th District in the City Council.

—Yesterday, a meeting of the Officers of the Louisiana Legion, took place at the office of the Adjutant-General for the purpose of nominating a Major for said Legion; when on counting the votes it appeared that C. Cuvelier, Esq. (a former Major of that corps) was unanimously named to that highly honorable and distinguished command.

[From the London Courier, Jan. 21.]

According to the French papers of Sunday the Russians have altered their plans for the next campaign, and have adopted one, the folly and impracticability of which we point out when the subject was first mentioned. They are to leave the fortresses of the Danube, the entrenchments of Choumleu and the passes of the Balkan on their left, instead of profiting of the advantage which the possession of Varna presents for an advance in that quarter, and to push through Servia and Bosnia into the interior of Turkey! For this purpose, we are told, the cors of General Geimrr, before Widdin, has been considerably reinforced, preparatory to its becoming the grand army of operations, and those which were actually engaged last autumn, are to remain on the defensive and in observation. General Dieltisc, by whom those new combinations have been made, is said to have off for St. Petersburg to insure their adoption. Prince Metternich, it is added, had expressed much apprehension of a system of hostilities which would bring the war to the borders of Hungary and Transylvania. Should these statements be correct, it is not likely that the Emperor Nicholas would sanction a plan of operations which offers still less probability than the last, and which, besides, might involve him in differences with a power whose neutrality is of such great advantage to him. The Sultan no sooner heard that the war was likely to take a new course than he caused the fortifications of Sophia to be put in a state of defence, and a camp of 50,600 men, chiefly cavalry, to be established before that city. At Constantinople itself, fortifications were forming of so extensive a nature as to secure the possession of the wells and aqueducts by which the city is supplied with water, and to cover a force of 200,090 men, should the Sultan be compelled, like the last of the Constantines to fight for empire and life under the walls of his capital.

Extract of a letter received at the Baltimore Gazette office, dated,

CALLAO HARBOR, Nov 3 1828.

The Colombian army is now lying at Guayaquil under Gen. Flores, the Peruvian forces consisting of 10,000 men, at Puira, under General La Mar. An invasion has been hourly expected, but from a Courier arrived from Guayaquil it appears that Plenipotentiaries have arrived at that place, empowered to negotiate the differences between the two nations in an amicable manner, and are only waiting passport to proceed to the Government of Lima so that these clouds that had mustered with ominous bodings, are likely to dissipate, without bursting from collision.

It is said that the army of Puira received their General, who lately set out from Lima to join them, with great enthusiasm, and confidently rely on their abilities to sustain their positions at Puira.

A new Constitution has been formed in Chile; it is liberal in all its political principles, and a spirit of intolerance pervades its moral provisions, inasmuch as it guarantees exclusively the Catholic Roman Apostolic religion.

ANCONA, Dec. 26.—We are daily more and more convinced that an arrangement between the Cabinets of London and Paris, and the Porte, is preparing, and that the affairs of Greece will be shortly settled. It is affirmed that every facility is afforded to the Porte, to enable it to come to a decision, and to the return of Messrs. Stratford Canning and Guilleminot, to Constantinople. Couriers hastening fr. London & Paris, to

Poros, are said to have conveyed most important instructions to the Ambassadors. The Admirals too, and the Lord High Commissioner at Corfu, are said to have received new orders, accompanied with the strictest injunctions to avoid every thing that might afford the Porte grounds for complaint.

"The report of an attack made by the Turks on Bazardjik, which I mentioned in a former communication, as needing confirmation, seems to be wholly unfounded. The contagion in Wallachia is said to have greatly abated in consequence of the very severe cold that has set in.

"A letter from Vienna says, that Prince Lieven, the Russian Ambassador at London, declined to ratify the Protocol fixing the new boundaries of Greece, until he should have received further instructions from his Court.—[Hambourg Reporter Jan. 13.]

"From the *Virtute*, Dec. 26.—There are many reports about notes said to have been presented by the Great Powers, and even of an ultimatum, delivered by the English Ambassador Extraordinary. We can, however, affirm on good authority, that all these reports are who is unfounded; the most perfect understanding prevails between the Allied Cabinets, and it will not be interrupted.

Duel between Mr. Lawless and Mr. Gregg.

—Yesterday forenoon considerable sensation was excited by the rumor that a hostile meeting was about to take place between Mr. Lawless and Mr. Gregg, in consequence of the letter of Mr. Lawless which appeared in Thursday's Northern Whig. The circumstances connected with the event as far as we have been able to collect them, (without any communication with the parties principally concerned,) are as follow:—On Thursday night, at a late hour, Mr. G. Halloran, on the part of Mr. Gregg, called at Kenu's hotel, upon Mr. Lawless, who referred him to Mr. John Sinclair, as his friend. Mr. Halloran and Mr. Sinclair, in consequence, met yesterday at ten o'clock, when arrangements were made for a meeting to take place at two, in a field, a short distance from town, on the Falls road. In the interim, it would appear that Mr. Halloran withdrew from the affair, and Mr. Charles Barnett took his place, as friend to Mr. Gregg. The parties accordingly met at the hour appointed. The distance was measured at twelve paces we believe, and an exchange of shots took place without effect on either side. A reconciliation was then attempted. Mr. Lawless was asked to apologize for the above mentioned letter, but he declined to do so, unless M. Gregg would, as the first aggressor, apologize for his publication in the Guardian; this Mr. G. declined, when the parties again took their ground and fired, happily without effect, except that Mr. L.'s ball passed through the skirts of Mr. G.'s coat. No further explanations were made, and the seconds interfering, refused to sanction further hostilities, and declared that both the gentlemen had conducted themselves like men of honor and courage. The parties then left the ground. [Belfast Commercial Chron. Jan. 17.]

Distressing Fire.

—The Wheeling Gazette informs, that a fire broke out on the night of the 8th ult. in the dwelling house of Mr. Jacob Harris, in Pike township, Perry county, Ohio—the parent were absent at the time. Their five children were asleep, but the eldest, a son, of twelve years, was awakened by the flames and the roof falling in; he immediately carried out three of the youngest children and hastened in for the fourth, but was prevented from a completing his noble purpose by a fragment of the roof falling on him, and was barely able to crawl out, so dreadfully burnt, that he died in two hours afterwards. He retained his senses to the last, and expressed his willingness to die, but regretted that he had not been able to save his little brother! The distracted parents arrived at time to witness the last moments of their heroic son.
