The Tariff.—The Southern members of Congress will, no doubt, strain every nerve during the approaching session of Congress, to procure the removal of that monster, the Tariff law of 1828. This, however, will be a difficult task. The friends of General Jackson who voted for it, cannot, without manifest discredit, vote against it.—If they do, they will confirm the reproach fastened on them by Gov. Forsyth, of having voted for a measure ruinous to the Southern States, together popularity for their Presidential candidate.

We read in the Daily Advertiser of this morning, that, according to the Philadelphia Gazette, "placards are posted in different public offices, giving notice that after the 1st of January next, bank notes of a less denomination than five dollars cannot be received. The above paper calls upon the bankers and other market people to co-operate with the state authorities, and hereafter have nothing but silver as a medium of retail trade."

We are much in hopes that the example thus set by our neighbors in Philadelphia, will be followed here. It is the holders of small notes, mostly under the denomination of five dollars, that are invariably the chief sufferers by forgeries and fraudulent bankruptcies.

General Lafayette.—There must, we apprehend, be some error in the paragraph circulating in most of the papers, imputing to our venerable veteran the intention of revisiting this country next month. We ourselves have letters from him of a recent date; in no manner alluding to such a purpose, and have, moreover, conversed with persons just arrived, by the Edward Queen and Francis I. from France, who had lately seen him, and to whom he would most certainly have mentioned such design, if entertained by him. They, however, never heard of it.

Singular fact.—The Georgia Messenger, in noticing the recent murder of a Mr. Early, in Texas, by Isaac B. Desha, says, it is supposed that Early was the son of Governor Early, of Georgia, the same who, about two years since, murdered an individual in that State. He made his escape, and the fact of his murder is the first that has since been heard of him. It is singular that both Desha and Early should have been the sons of men filling the highest office in their respective States—that both should have committed murder—that both should have eluded justice—and that, afterwards in a distant country, one should fall by the hands of the other. It is a literal fulfillment of that passage of the Bible which declares, that "Whoso sheddeth man's blood, by man shall his blood be shed." There is something too, like retribution in one murderer's becoming the victim of another. It is "even-handed justice, returning the poison'd chalice" to the lips of one who had himself administered it to his fellow-being.

berator. A pastoral letter has been written by the Archbishop of Bogota, to all his curates and other priests, to inculcate from the pulpit the importance and duty of union, and obedience to the government.

Chili.—Our Bogota papers contain the following information concerning Chili, under dates from their papers to the 5th of September. The new Constitution is to certain the principle of limited legislative powers. The Roman Catholic religion is to be supported, but a furious intolerance, like that under which the country has heretofore suffered, is not to be introduced. (What degree of intolerance they design to have we, are not informed.) The government is to be of the popular representative form.

The National Gazette has a letter from Vera Cruz, dated Oct. 3d, an extract from which follows:—"Santa Anna has taken Puente, del Rey. There was a ship skirmish fought near Zalapas, in which Robles was killed, and 3 or 4 Vera Cruzans wounded. We have a report that Rincon has taken possession of Perote after Santa Anna had left it. There is also another flying rumour that a severe action had been fought, in which Rincon was defeated. We know not which to believe.

The London Morning Herald of the 17th October, says:—"The hounded corn in our ports have been purchased in considerable quantities, for the purpose of being exported to the North of Spain. Freights of corn have been offered to-day, both to Bilbao and St. Antonio. Great quantities of flour have lately been shipped from this latter port, to the Havana. This would appear extraordinary, seeing that the U. States present a much cheaper market; but the fact is, the duty of flour and corn, from the States to the Havana, is so heavy as to amount to a prohibition.

Sale upon a grand scale.—The Baltimore papers advertise for sale 48,000,000 acres of land in the provinces of Cheoile and Texas, in the U. States of Mexico. This land is stated to have been granted by the government of Mexico, to certain individuals in the city of Mexico, upon condition that the proprietors do, within six years from the month of May, 1826, settle 200 families thereon, in conformity with the general colonization laws of the Mexican government. The proprietors have authorized Mr. Dennis A. Smith, of Baltimore, to dispose of these lands, with the privileges, &c.—Mr. Smith proposes to form a company to purchase these lands—the consideration money for the whole grant is \$400,000; less than one cent per acre. As soon as subscriptions to the amount of 200,000 are obtained, the stockholders are to convene and appoint seven trustees, to employ surveyors, and make the other necessary arrangements. No subscription less than \$10, nor more than \$100, to be received from any one person—\$12 will entitle the subscriber to a certificate of 1000 acres; \$100 to a section of 10,000 acres.—The Mexican proprietors are entitled to be stockholders for \$300,000 of the purchase money.
