The proprietors have authorised Mr. Dennis. A. Smith, of Baltimore, to dispose of these hands, with the privilileges, &c .- Mr. Smith proposes to form a company to purchase these lands-the consideration money for the whole grant is \$400,000; less than one cent per acre. As soon as subscriptions to the amount of 200,000 are obtained, the stockholders are to convene and appoint seven trustees, to employ surveyors, and make the other necessary arrangements. No subscription less than \$10, nor more than \$100, to be received from any one person-\$10 will entitle the subscriber to a cer tificate of 1000 acres; \$100 to a section of 10,000 acres.-The Mexican proprietors are entitled to be stockholders for \$200,000 of the purchase money.


