Reported Siliance between Prussia and Russia .- The Courier of the 14th, says, "The Hamburgh steur,boat, which arrived yesterday, has brought a letter Breslaw, (in Silesia) which states that an alliance has taken place between Russia and Prussia, and that the Prussian army stationed in the Dutel y of Posen has received ord as to enter Russian Poland, and to advance on Warsaw. On Saturday, M. de Belleyme, as President age. of the Tribunal de Premiere lustance, delivered the following judgment in the case of M. Dumonteil, who after having been admitted into holy orders, quitted the church and wished to marry, but was opposed by his father, and refused the ceremony by the civil magistrate-
