NEWS IN BRIEF

T. Semmes Walmsley, who resigned from the Federal Appeal board because he was within the draft age, has entered an officers training camp at Charlottesville, Va. William H. Byrnes, Jr., has been named as his successor.

Mrs. Carrie Reems was acquitted in criminal district court Tuesday evening of the murder of Arthur Behan. The jury was out only twenty minutes. Mrs. Reems was her own strongest witness and the jury evidently believed that she acted in self-defense.

The membership of the board for the improvement of Jackson square has been increased to seven by Mayor Behrman, the names of Messrs. George Denegre and Samuel M. Weiss being added to those already appointed.

The will of the late Archbishop James H. Blenk was filed in civil district court Tuesday. The amount of his estate, after the payment of debts, will not exceed \$500. He pledged a \$5,000 insurance policy and devoted the proceeds to the campaign to restore the St. Louis cathedral.

Manuel Romero, aged 15, son of John Romero, bridge tender at Harvey's canal, lost his life while trying to save Sam Martino, aged 11, from drowning. Martino and two companions were playing in a boat which capsized. Romero, who was passing, plunged in and rescued one of them, then went after Martino. The latter seized him in a death grip and both were drowned.

Adjutant General Metcalf is investigating reports of irregularities in the handling of exemption claims by Louisiana boards. In one case it is alleged that a man was exempted on account of politics and in another that the clerk of court charged fees for making out exemption papers.

J. L. Phillips, a wealthy Georgia lumberman, purchased the Roos lot, corner of St. Charles avenue and Eleventh street Tuesday for \$30,000 and will build a fine residence thereon.

Seventy-five kilns for the drying of sweet potatoes will be completed in the state by the time the crop is gathered. Six of them will be built by the Great Southern Lumber Co. of Bogalusa.

On account of the demand for rolling stock for troop movements, the Sunday and Wednesday excursions out of New Orleans may be annulled in a few days as a war measure.

Indications are increasing that natural gas will be piped to New Orleans at no distant date from the gas fields in Terrebonne parish. R. B. McCormick, manager of the company controlling the supply, conferred with New Orleans business men Wednesday. The chief difficulty now is obtaining the necessary iron piping, as the entire output of the country is being used by the government, but an effort will be made to obtain the piping from the council of national defense, on account of the saving of fuel that may thereby be effected. It is stated that the three plants of the American Cotton Oil Co. at Gretna are ready to contract for the gas.

C. C. Graves, construction foreman for the Thomas Cusack company, was killed by a fall while erecting signs on the West End shell road Wednesday. His neck was broken. He resided at 1317 Coliseum street.
