CRIMINAL COURT.

The Criminal Court during the session has judged several suits for assault and battery, and several persons accused of robbery, and other crimes, and has condemned the following persons:—

June 2—Isaac Morris, an American free negro, of having attacked a white man, to an imprisonment of 30 days, and the costs of suit.

June 5—Peter Galliard, of having stabbed (but without causing death) Eschiel Porte, to 3 years imprisonment at hard labor, and costs of suit.

June 10—Thomas Francis, a free negro, of having carried off a negress slave, to an imprisonment of 3 years at hard labor, and costs of suit.

Garret Theobald, of having perjured himself on the 19th of this month, before the Criminal Court, in the suit of the State of Louisiana, against William Walpole alias Red Head, accused of theft, to 5 years imprisonment at hard labor, and to the costs of suit.

James Ruciel, of having stolen a horse, to one year imprisonment at hard labor, and costs of suit.

Alexandria, May 29. As the water has continued to rise during the past week, with considerable rapidity, we are told, as it were, in "du-rance vile," by an inundation, unparalleled in this section, to be told for more than a quarter of a century. Many of our citizens are thus driven prematurely to their summer residences; and business of almost every description necessarily suspended. It will be a heavy blow for the planters along the margin of the river.

From late English Papers. America.—The Arab transport, Lieutenant J. Hyett, arrived on Monday at Portsmouth from Jamaica, left that port on the 4th February. The last season had been very sickly in that colony, and the mortality among the troops unusually great; nearly 700 soldiers and 21 officers, including five of the medical staff, having fallen victims to the fever.—Those who escaped from the yellow fever were visited with a rheumatic one, which inhabitants denominated the "broken wig," and which indicates that the contagious fever has ceased; with this the Admiral and the General had been partially afflicted. It is a satisfaction, however, to learn, that at the departure of the Arab, health was restored to all the Europeans. The Sugar crop had commenced, and a luxuriant harvest was anticipated; but the coffee plantations yielded very short of their usual supply. The Merchants of Jamaica, at their meeting on the 23d January, determined that the freight of Sugar to England should be reduced from 5s. 6d. 5s. The only man-of-war of the squadron which had suffered from fever, was the Magnificent, and her crew as fast recovering, having been sent to the Key, off Port Royal, for change of air.

The squadron in the West Indies was disposed as follows: Barbam, at Turk's Island; Magnificent, Druid, Valorous, Scylla (first for England,) Union, and Nimble, at Port Royal; Bustard, at Chagras; Espigle, at Carthagena; Ferret, and Pickle, cruising; Harlequin, at Port-au-Prince; Victor, at the Bahamas. The Nimble was repairing damages which she had received in a severe action with a slave brig of 14 guns, off the Bahama Bank. At the Leeward Islands there were the Aurora, Slany, Arachne, Fairy, Skipjack, and Monkey.

Trinidad, Feb. 8.—The Lord Bishop of Barbadoes and the Leeward Islands, came into our harbour last night in his Majesty's ship Aurora, Capt. Austin, and landed at the King's Wharf, at eleven o'clock this morning, accompanied by his Lady, Sir Francis Ford, Colonel Youngusband, R. A. and Captain Nicol.

Accounts have been received from the Blossom frigate, Captain Beechy, stating the arrival of that ship at St. Blas, in December last, from Behring's Straits. Capt. Beechy entered Kotzebue's Inlet, and sustained very severe and bad weather, which prevented the Blossom penetrating so far as she did in the summer of 1826, in search of Captain Franklin and his party. Capt. Beechy fell in with some natives who were extremely hostile, and from whose conduct fears were entertained that the party he was in quest of had been destroyed by those ferocious people. After remaining as long as possible, the Blossom left the coast, and proceeded to the southward, and may be expected home in the course of the summer. Captain Beechy, his officers, and crew, were all in good health.

Sufferings at Sea.—Extract of a letter from Havre de Grace.—"Whilst I was in Dublin a French ship, from America brought in here the crew and passengers of a vessel bound from Cork to New-York, who had suffered the most dreadful hardships before falling in with the French vessel. They had been more than ninety days at sea, lost the greater part of their rigging and masts in a gale of wind, and sprung a leak, which no efforts could get under; so that their misfortunes their provisions were exhausted many days previous to their seeing the Frenchman. The day before they saw him they divided amongst them the only eatable thing on board, which was an unfortunate dog, and which, when fairly divided, as told by one of the sufferers, gave each of them (thirty-eight persons) four ounces of the most delicious food they had ever tasted. At the moment the French vessel bore in sight they were casting lots to see who should be killed and eaten by the survivors. The French captain, who had himself a very bad passage from America, and whose provisions were almost exhausted, at first refused to take more than half of them from the wreck; however, on receiving the first half of them on board his ship, he was so affected by the cries of those left behind, that he sent his boat, and took them all on board, where they had not been ten minutes when the ship they quitted went down. On their arrival here they were all in a most hapless plight not being able to get from the wreck their clothes or any other property whatsoever. They were, however, amply relieved by an Irish priest here, of the name of Kirby, who not only gave them I verily believe, every shilling he had in the world himself, but made a collection for them of 2000 francs (80l. sterling) and procured, through his influence here, a passage to America for each of them as chose to prosecute their voyage. The King of France has ordered a splendid gold medal to be given to the French captain, as a reward for his conduct in saving their lives, &c."

Political economy runs mad.—We do wish that some member of this section of the union would propose a repeal of this duty—that, on cotton of 3 cents per lb.—as says the Charleston Patriot. We presume to say that we wish no such thing; for, we believe it would complete the ruin of the cotton planter. So then, the cotton planters may, constitutionally, be saved from ruin by protecting duties—but the cotton and wool spinners may not. Now the Editor of the Charleston Patriot, in proposing a repeal of the protecting duty on cotton, is at least consistent with his principles—but he will find that his brother of the Camden Journal is nearer the mark of interest—which, like affection,

A Halifax paper of the 15th ult. in alluding to the reports, that some U. S. troops, had received orders to march to the Eastern Boundary Lines, remarks, "if so some of ours will probably do the same, and the usual collisions will follow."—Gaz.

Bank Notes.—At the half yearly meeting of the Proprietors of the Bank of England, it was stated by the Governor, that the amount of bank notes in circulation was about twenty and a half million pounds—and that the bank held besides, deposits from private bankers and others, of between five and six millions.

Poor Rates.—A paper has been published by order of the House of Commons, exhibiting the startling fact, that for the year 1827, a year of profound peace and of no peculiar pressure, the sum levied and expended in England and Wales for the maintenance of paupers and of those who manage them, amounted to seven million eight hundred thousand pounds sterling! (about thirty five million dollars,) more than the whole revenue of England fifty years ago, and equal to half of the entire national debt of the United States.

Letters from Caracas to the 20th ult. mention no news of interest. A report of the recent attempt at insurrection in Carthagena had been received, and a ship of war was ordered to proceed to that place from Porto Cavallo, with troops.

We have received Caracas papers to the 17th ult.—Preparations were making for the reception of the Liberator.

From the National Gazette. Washington, having received three thousand pounds sterling from Murray, the London bookseller, for his life of Columbus.

The deficit in the French revenue was announced, on the 18th March, to be 215 millions of francs. It is charged to the mismanagement of the late prime minister Bille, by his enemies.

The amount of claims liquidated or acknowledged under the French Emigrant Indemnity Law was, in Feb. last, nearly 650 millions of francs.

The Marquis de Duora, eldest son of the Duke of Wellington is said to have been sent to Vienna, on an important political errand.

A bit.—A horizontal board, with spikes, has been lately placed over the railing in front of Senator Stanford's house, on the public square. On being asked the reason thereof, a person replied that it was to prevent people from getting on the fence.—Al. Daily Adv.

THE great Panoramic picture of the Kingdom of France is now exhibiting in the building on the public square of Rampart street.

The view is taken from the roof of the south end of the palace of the Tuilleries; the spectator must therefore imagine himself placed on this elevated situation which commands an extensive prospect over the whole city.

Immediately under the eye of the spectator is a northern direction, to the roof of the King's apartments, and on the right that of the long picture gallery stretching eastward as far as the Louvre;—This gallery bounds the place de Carrousel on the south side and the new gallery on the north, in the centre of this square is seen the triumphal arch. On this square Bonaparte was wont to review his battalions previous to their departure for their respective destinations, and here oft the walls resounded with the clang of martial music. On the west side of the palace the spectator looks down on the Garden of the Tuilleries, and beyond that in the distance is seen the palace of the Grand Dauboules, and the woods of the Champ Elysees in the distance.

When we consider that Paris has been the theatre of so many great political events which have convulsed the rope for thirty years past, few, if any subjects of equal interest for a picture could be offered to the public. Admittance—30 cents. New Orleans, April 20, 1828.
