CONGRESSIONAL.

WASHINGTON, December 22. The Senate met yesterday for despatch of business at 11 o'clock. Several petitions and memorials were presented and referred to Committees. Among others a petition from certain inhabitants in Butler county, Pennsylvania, praying the stoppage of Sunday mails. A memorial was also presented by Mr Chambers from the corporation of Georgelown, D. C. praying that the main draw in the Toll Bridge crossing to Washington may be enlarged for the passage of steamboats. At 12 o'clock the Senate formed itself into a court of Impeachment to proceed with the trial of Judge Peck. Mr. McDuffie resumed his opening statement, and oecupied the court till near 3 o'clock, when he closed. Several testamentory documents were then read and put in an evidence. The Court then adjourned till 12 o'clock to-morrow.

The House of Representatives met yesterday at eleevn o'clock, and devoted an hour to petitions and resolutions, after which the resolution which was adopted the preceding day, on motion of Mr. Hoffman, was again offered and agreeds o. The House then determined to meet at 11 o'clock to-day, and then went into Committee of the whole, Mr Chambreleng in the chair, and repaired to the Chamber of the Senate to attend the trial of Judge Peck.

December, 23. The Senate met yesterday at 11 o'clock. The first hour was occupied in considering resolutions submitted yesterday, and forwarding various bills already introduced through their var.ous stages. The Senate then formed itself into a Court of Impeachment to proceed with Judge The first witness on the part of the House of Representatives, Mr E. L. Lawless, was called, and his examination continued till the Court adjourned. His cross examination will be resumed at 12 o'clock to-day.

In the House of Representatives, after the preliminary business of the House had been dispo sed of, a resolution was moved by Mr. Dwight, that the House do not attend the Senate daily during the trial of Judge Peck, but it was neg atived by a vote of 87 to 84. The bill to authorize the establishment of certain post offices &c. was laid on the table on motion of Mr. Daniel. Abill for the relief of Barnard Kelly, on which some discussion took place, was then taken up in committee of the whole, reported, & finally ordered to be engrossed & read a third time to-day. Mr. M'Duffie, from the selelect committee to which the subject was referred, reported a joint resolution relative to the amendment of the Constitution recommended by the President in his message. - Nat.
