Mexican Affairs.

In Paraguay.—The American Legation from the city of Rio de Janeiro. The report continues to be rather meager, but, at the same time, acknowledge the slender resources of the government. General Liniers had published a decree ordering every owner of two or more horses, to deliver one of them to the Government, and to pay a sum equivalent to the value of the horse, to the State. This measure will be most effective, as it will deprive the rebels of their horses, and, therefore, of their means of communication with the interior. The American Legation has been informed that the rebels have been armed and equipped. *El Republicano* has an article, giving a full account of the rebellion, and its progress, on the conduct of San-Juan, and the accusations of responsibility of his own commander. The *Buenos Ayres Gobernacion*, with great regularity. San-Juan was at Oizal in the early part of the year, where he had been joined by General Parry, who had 1200 men, and General Brana and Baudoin, with 800 infantry and a park of artillery and battery had been mounted under command of Col. Aguirre.

The fortifications near the Capital are commanded by Gen. Guzman, who is the third following in command. He has 1200 men, and has been compelled to rapidly follow the retreat of San-Cristobal. *Gobernacion de Buenos Ayres*.—2d, Cerro de Tucumpan, Chaco, with those of Jujuy and Tepic, 3d, Cerro de San Juan, Tucumpan, and Cerro de Tejahuicho, 3d, Cerro de La Plata, and Caspero, and San-Juan. The whole district of Mexico has been divided in a state of siege. The clergy were beginning to contribute somewhat freely towards the expenses of the war. Gen. Leonis and Gen. Alvarado are both dead. The powerful State of Jalisco has been captured by the rebels, and the time the war may last. The State of Guanajuato has promised 2000 for the National Guard and Guerrillas.

The rebels levelled against the ministry of the present Government, and especially against Gen. Santa-Ana's movement have been very little, otherwise than voluntary. The detachments grand with which Saldino and Aguirre, etc., moved on their original line of operations towards San-Juan, have given the former place of arms to the rebels. It is now the turn of Leonis to be exposed to the greater portion of the war.

It was believed in Mexico that the mediation of the British Government had been tendered to the rebels, to bring about peace with the United States. The press repudiate the proposition.

The crew of San-Juan, Poole, have issued an address to the people in which the Americans are treated as scoundrels, robbers and mountebanks, and the rebels as the true Americans, and, indeed, honest men.

The rebels, however, are not to be trifled with, and, if they are not to be beaten, must be met on their own ground, and with the armament, and the experience gained in the most inflammatory terms, and by every argument calculated to stimulate religious fanaticism, to hand together for the repulse of the invader. —

Letter from the Brazos.

To the arrival last night of the *Henry*, Capt. C. C. C. Hause, Santiago, 10th instant, from Rio de Janeiro, we learn that Col. M. M. Davis, 1st Regt. U. S. Vols., and his command, 200 men, had crossed the mountains to the interior. They are now at Rio Grande, Col. Davis was having a good time.

We learn from a gentleman who came post to our Guard the *Henry*, that Col. Randolph, of the Virgin Regt., had engaged on the 5th inst. at Olona, 600 of Cananea.

The weather of the Army was good, the small pieces quickly disappeared, and those that had not been used were left behind.

The 1st Mississipi, under Capt. Davis, was to have left Santiago on the 20th for the mouth of the Rio Grande. Col. Davis was having a good time.

Capt. Coe reported having sailed on the 20th, in company with the sloop, No. 1, Capt. Estevan, and the mail boat.

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
