Marzipan. — A New Dainty.

In connection with a Shakespeare festi-  
val, the making of the old time dainty marzipan was revived by an enterprising hostess. There are several re-  
cipes for it in old books, not exactly like those of the modern baker. The genuine marzipan or marchpane (literally "Bread of Mars") probably dates from Roman days or even earlier. The little cakes or cookies are made of flour, sugar, ground almonds, and filberts, and a little orange flower water or rose-water, mixed to a stiff paste, rolled very thin, cut into fancy shapes and baked in a very moderate oven. The original confections were probably baked before the fire or in the sun. Confections (sugar mixed with rose-water) is used for icing. With two or three pretty enameled ware cups this can be done in the living-room, as, in old days, it probably was.COMMERCIAL.
