Miss Viola Hlg will receive the property at 923 North Deligny, valued at \$1,500, and certain furniture. Mrs. Hlg will be given \$1,000 and some furniture.

Miss Mary McConnell is left the property at 1908-10 Duverville, appraised at \$1,800, and about \$3,000 in cash.

KIDNAP CHARGE DROPPED: Little Girl Went Willingly With the Daltons, It is Stated. The charge of kidnaping preferred sometime ago against Frank Dalton, a crippled pawn broker, and his wife, was dismissed in district court yesterday on motion of Eugene Staley, assistant district attorney.

The Daltons were arrested in Morgan City a couple of months ago on a charge of stealing 10-year-old May Collins from her home here.

An investigation by the district attorney's office is said to show that the child had begged for the Daltons prior to the time she went to Morgan City with them; that she knew where she was going, and had been promised \$50 a month to beg for them. The child admitted that when she was leaving the city she saw a police officer at the station whom she knew, but that she had not tried to attract his attention.
