## FRANCE.

Paris, February 11. An express arrived to-night, confirming the news of the insurrection of a part of Italy. A letter from Rigo announces that an engagement took place between four regiments of Polish cavalry and sixteen Russian regiments, in which the

latter were overthrown. Numerous naval and military armaments are on foot in France. An extraordinary activity prevails in the arsenals of Toulon and Brest. A naval board is to examine the condition of the vessels. which are now lying in the port of Toulon, and to urge on the repairs of the vessels now in the docks. The government have ordered 15,000 bomb shells, from M. Festigiere's foundery; Mr. Lescore is also employed in the manufacture of those missiles, ordered by the government. It is reported that these preparations are connected with the armaments now making at Toulon.
