GOLD MINES OF CALIFORNIA.

The papers from California, received by the Cherokee at New York, furnish very interesting information in relation to the discovery of regular auriferous veins on the western slope of the Sierra Nevada. The gold is found in masses of quarts, which, when properly treated by mechanical and chemical means, yield a proportion of the precious metal, for execution the precious metal, for execution the secution. tion of the precious metal, far exceeding the the Pacific News, some facts in relation to this new revelation of the amounding minera wealth of the gold tegion:
